**BRADY IS PROGRESSIVE**

COUNCIL ORDERS NAMING OF ALL STREETS.

Houses Also to Be Numbered—Work to Commence at Once and Completed in 30 Days.

An important step in the progress of Brady cityward was taken by the city council at its last regular meeting at which time an ordinance calling for the naming of all the streets in the corporate limits and the numbering of all the business houses and residences was passed.

The matter has claimed the attention of Brady citizens for the past year or two—in fact, ever since Brady began to have a look-in on free city delivery of mail. With this decisive step by the council, all that remains is the building of good sidewalks—a move that is spreading rapidly—and the necessary postal receipts to justify Uncle Sam in establishing the free delivery service.

**COTTON STATISTICS.**

McCulloch County Ginned 12,641 Bales Past Year.

The following statistics on the cotton crop last year have been prepared especially for The Brady Standard by the Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association, Washington, D. C.:

The United States Department of Commerce and Labor has just issued its report on cotton ginned in Texas in 1911 by counties. There were 4,107,152 bales ginned in the state, which is an increase over 1910 of 1,157,184 bales or 28.2 per cent. Ellis county ranks first, with 136,427 bales ginned. McLennan second, with 120,801 and Hill third, with 117,221 bales ginned. McCulloch county has a total of 12,641 bales ginned during this year, which is an increase over the previous year of 3,250 bales.

Texas produces 28 per cent of the cotton grown in the United States and 21 per cent of the world's crop.

The Texas Welfare Commission is investigating the production of and the methods of marketing cotton and will discuss this subject at the next session which will be held in San Antonio on June 10th.

For the past two or three years he has been making his home in Sabine, where he has had charge of a drug store for his brother. **ANOTHER OIL WELL.**

Lohn Oil Co. Brings In Well On Foster Lease.

Another good well is reported in the Lohn community, having been brought in on the Foster tract Monday by the Lohn Oil Co., at the head of which is J. A. Copeland. The first oil indications were had Saturday, and the well was brought in Monday. The oil was found at a depth of about 300 feet in a porous rock, and the gas in the well was sufficient to force the oil to within thirty feet of the top.

The formation of the rock in which the oil was found and the oil indications are said to be exactly like that found at a depth of 940 feet at Electra, where gushers were brought in at a depth of approximately 1,040 feet. This makes prospects for oil at Lohn appear all the better, and every driller in the field is greatly encouraged by the finding.

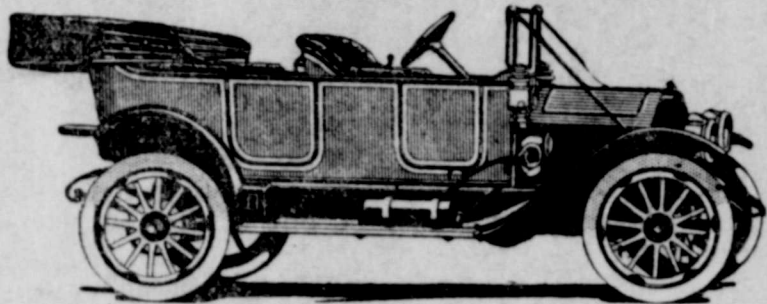

"My Lord, ain't they high? Say, Mr. Jones, you got any black-eyed peas?"

"Yes."

"What are they worth?"

"Well I am selling 15 pounds to the \$1.00, or \$4.00 per bu."

"In the name of Moses, how are people to live and stuff so high?"

"Got any navy beans?"

"Oh, yes."

"What are they worth?"

"They are worth 10 pounds to the dollar, or \$6.00 per bushel."

"Lord have mercy, I can't live at such prices."

"Got any Irish potatoes?"

"Fifteen cents a peck, or \$1.75 per bushel."

"Yes."

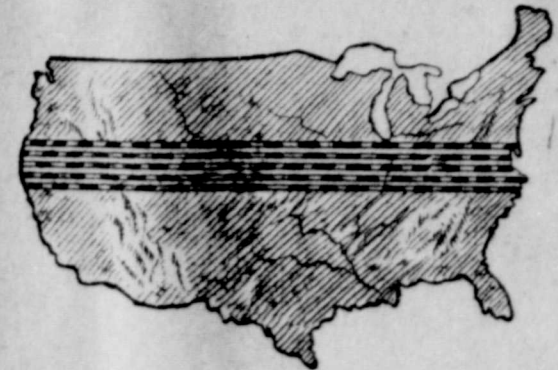

No wonder the farmer leads a life of poverty; no wonder he is oppressed; no wonder the blight has fallen on the manhood and womanhood of the South; no wonder they have been made to drink the dregs of poverty. The South is cotton MAD. The people are cotton maniacs. It has dethroned their reason. They have but one god, and that god is cotton. They kneel daily at its throne. It has enslaved them,

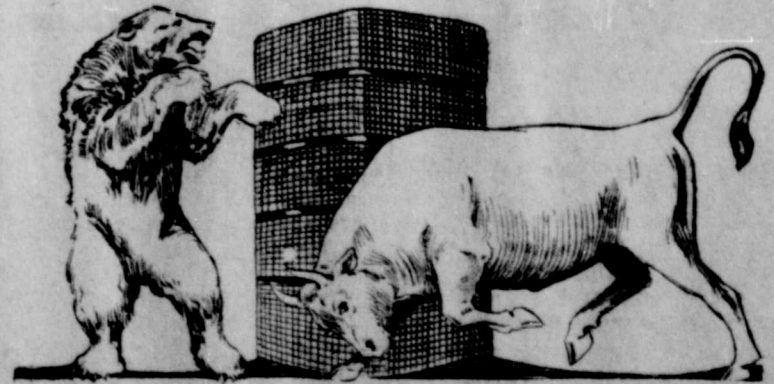

## AN ORDINANCE

Providing for the Naming of Streets and Numbering of Houses Within the Corporate Limits of the City of Brady, Texas.

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Brady, Texas, that all streets appearing on the maps thereof in general use, said streets having names attached thereto, be and they are hereby, and shall forever be known and recognized by such names, and wherever mentioned in this ordinance it shall be understood to refer to the streets of the same name on said maps, and all streets running north and south shall commence on Main street and shall have the words North or South prefixed to their locality north or south of said Main street; and the numbered streets in like manner shall be known and recognized by their numbers as they appear on the aforesaid maps; provided, that all streets crossing Bridge street shall have their beginning point on said Bridge street, and those streets lying east of said Bridge street shall have the word "East" prefixed to their names, and those streets lying west of said Bridge street shall have the word "West" prefixed to their names.

And it is hereby made the duty of the owners of houses inside of the corporate limits of the city to place or cause to be placed in a conspicuous place on or near the front door of such house the city number of the lot on which such house is situated, said number to be furnished by the owner or agent of said house by the authority of the city council.

And it is hereby ordained that the city of Brady post the names and numbers of all streets, placing signs thereon showing plainly such names and numbers.

And the street committee is hereby instructed to immediately advertise for bids to do the work of counting and numbering all the lots in the city, and notifying the owners of the numbers of their respective lots and the names and numbers of their streets, and a report of such counting and numbering shall be submitted to the city council for its examination and approval before proceeding with the notification of the owners; and the contract for said work shall be awarded to the lowest and best bidder, to be judged of by the city council, and the council reserves the right to reject any and all bids; and it is further ordained that each bid shall be accompanied by a good and sufficient bond, payable to the city of Brady, in double the amount of such bid, conditioned that the work shall commence at once, and be prosecuted continuously until completed, not to be longer than thirty days from the date of awarding the contract, and that the work shall be correctly done, such bond to be approved by the council.

And it is hereby ordained that the numbering shall begin with Lot No. 9 in Block No. 11 on the corner of Main and Bridge streets, numbering the lots fronting south on main street and allowing twenty-five feet for each lot from Bridge street west to College street, and the

first lot shall be numbered 102 and the second 104, and continuously in like manner until lot No. 1 in Block No. 2 on the corner of Main and South Church streets is reached, then number the first lot fronting north on Main street, giving it the next odd number higher than the even number given to the first lot in said Block No. 2; numbering all lots fronting on West Main street. Then commence on northeast corner of Lot N. 9 in Block No. 12 on the corner of Commerce and South Bridge street, and number all lots fronting Commerce street west to College street in the same manner as Main street, giving the first lot the number 101 and continuously until Church street is reached; then give the even numbers to lots fronting south on Commerce street. Then number East Main street in the same manner as West Main and West Commerce from the southwest corner of Lot No. 1 in Block No. 7 on the corner of East Main and South Bridge street to Pecan street; then commence on northwest corner of Lot No. 1 in Block No. 8 on the corner of East Commerce and South Bridge streets and number east to Pecan street; then number South First in the same manner as Main and Commerce, commencing on South Bridge and numbering out each way. 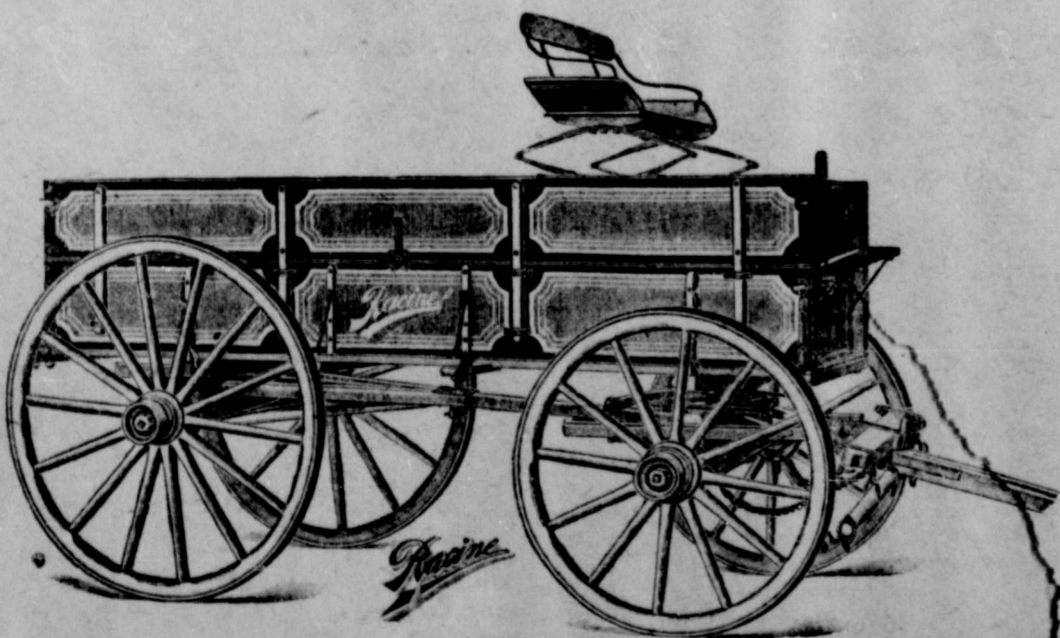
