MASON HAS BAD FIRE.

Former Brady Boy Among the Losers.

Fire last Friday night destroyed the two-story rock building at Mason occupied by Holden & Bickenback's drug store, and with it the entire contents. The flames were discovered at 1:30 p. m., and only to the fact that the high walls of the building prevented the flames from spreading is due the saving of the entire town from the flames.

The heaviest losers were Holden & Bickenback, their entire stock and fixtures being destroyed. Oscar Doell, formerly of Brady, lost his entire stock of jewelry and watch repair outfit. Dr. Thompson, who had office rooms on the second floor, also suffered a total loss. The building was owned by Mrs. McDougal, and in its destruction she suffers a severe financial blow.

Aside from \$2000 carried by Holden & Bickenback, there was no insurance carried by any of the parties.

Pure Food Show in August.

Brady will have a pure food show and industrial exhibition the early part of August, provided a suitable location can be obtained and proper arrangements made for holding the same. Mr. G. B. Clark, an expert in this line of work, will be here next week to arrange for the exhibit, and the Brady merchants should be prepared to assist Mr. Clark in every manner possible. Mr. Clark has held successful exhibits of this nature for the past three years in all parts of Texas, and is highly endorsed wherever he has undertaken the work. He anticipates having the exhibit in readiness the early part of next month.

Oil Operations.

Work on the Willie White ranch well was begun Monday about noon. The rig used in this well has attracted attention from citizens and oil men alike, being a monster in size and overshadowing by far all other rigs so far in the field. The rig is capable of drilling any size hole, from 4-inch to 16-inch.

The well at Whiteland is down 260 feet, and work is progressing steadily.

Work on the Meers well has been suspended awaiting the arrival of a slush bucket. It is expected that the drillers will be able to resume operations today.

The Senatorial Situation.

Brown County has, for the past fourteen years, furnished the State Senator from this, the 26th District, including Erath, Comanche, Brown, Coleman, Runnels, Concho, McCulloch, San Saba, Mills and Llano counties, and has now several candidates for other state and district offices. Prior to these fourteen years, Comanche County had furnished the senator ever since the district was created, and now has two candidates for Congress, one already a congressman.

At the present time, both Brown and Comanche have candidates asking for the office of State Senator again.

Erath County has never furnished a Senator since the district was created, and is now asking for this honorable and important office for one of her citizens, the Hon. C. G. Foust of Dublin, whom her people are urging with-~~over~~whelming indorsements, and who is entirely capable and worthy.

We do not believe the voters of this district, not even of Brown and Comanche, would willingly monopolize political honors for one county, nor permit it to be done, but would accord and concede to the citizens of other localities the privilege of participating in the welfare of state, and would admit the right of rotation in office, which is recognized as sound public policy. It is particularly sound and applicable here, in view of the fact that our senatorial districts are very large, and require a long time for the varied interests and localities to be properly represented.

Mr. Foust is in the prime of vigorous manhood, a man of affairs, gifted, fearless and ruggedly honest. He is highly educated, an able debater and a broad-gauged business man of experience. His type is needed in active constructive legislation.

We believe, therefore, that we are asking for only a fair and reasonable division of public honors for our county in soliciting the votes of every county in the district for our fellow-citizen, Mr. C. G. Foust, in the democratic primary.

To the School Patrons of McCulloch County:

All orders for transfers of children from one school district to another, must be made by the 1st day of August, 1912.

Census trustees may now receive pay for taking censuses. The law provides that pay for taking the scholastic census should not be made until the consolidated roll is approved by the State Department of Education. This roll has now been approved and these census vouchers can now be approved.

The law provides that no teachers' contract can be approved until after the state apportionment is made, which will not be sooner than the 1st day of August. Proposed Amendment.

The amendment proposing the levy of a special tax to create a pension fund for the benefit of the Old Confederate Soldiers and Confederate Widows, and for the better support of the Confederate Veterans' and Widows' Homes at Austin.

John B. Hood Camp of Confederate Veterans has addressed a strong appeal to the people of Texas asking for the adoption of the constitutional amendment to levy a tax of 5c on the \$100 valuation for paying Confederate pensions, for the support of the Confederate veterans and the Confederate widows' homes at Austin. The appeal is made through a committee of some of its most prominent members, and is as follows:

To the people of Texas, and especially the Confederate Veterans, their sons and daughters: Whereas, the John B. Hood Camp, U. C. V., at Austin, Texas, at a regular meeting thereof, appointed the undersigned committee to prepare an address to the voters of Texas, urging them to vote for the adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment authorizing the levy of a tax of 5c on the \$100 worth of property in Texas for the purpose of creating a pension fund for old and helpless Confederate soldiers and widows and for the better support of the Confederate homes for the veterans and widows at Austin.

We desire to say that in our judgment no more patriotic and commendable proposition has ever been submitted to the vote of the people of the state.

Every Confederate organization should urge its adoption, as should every patriotic individual citizen of Texas take active interest to secure its adoption.

Our residence at the capitol and connection with the Confederate home enables us to know as a fact that there is great destitution and urgent need of aid among the old soldiers and widows of Texas, and relief should be immediate, otherwise it will be everlastingly too late.

The noble old men and women who fought and sacrificed so much for the cause dear to every true Southern heart, now destitute, are only receiving a pension of \$3.50 per month, which is wholly inadequate for their absolute necessities, driving hundreds of them to seek the protection of the Confederate home, where, unfortunately, there is now no room for them. This is a reproach to the manhood and patriotism of this great state.

The home, provided for the most helpless and destitute, has now 425 inmates, 100 more than was ever admitted to the home before, and these are all who can be supported within the \$100,000 constitutional limit, and yet there are a great number of old soldiers who have made their last fight for bread, and by reason of age, disease and poverty are begging for admission to the home, and are sorely in need of it; and while our hearts bleed for them, nothing can be done for want of sufficient funds. The present management of the home by the aid and advice of our governor, has taken into the home every applicant whose application has been approved, until the last three months, when it has been compelled to stop for want of funds. This leaves a very distressing condition.

If we can secure the adoption of this proposed amendment it will raise a fund sufficient to pay all the destitute and helpless old heroes and the widows of such at least \$10 per month, which will comfortably take care of such as are not physically helpless and such of them who cannot wait upon themselves by reason of physical

firmities can no longer support their homes, because we are content a great many inmates now in the homes would go out and live among their friends and relatives if they could get a pension of \$10 per month and thus make room in the home for such as could not take care of themselves on \$10 per month.

It cannot in the nature of things, be but a few years until these old patriots who deserve so much of love and gratitude, will all have left us to rest with our glorious dead.

We appeal with confidence to the generosity and patriotism of the people of Texas to vote for the adoption of the proposed amendment and thereby secure to the unfortunate survivors of the most heroic struggle in the history of the world this relief they are so sorely in need of. We earnestly request that every candidate in the state of Texas, from constable to governor, will call the people's attention to the importance of this amendment and use their influence to get them to vote for its adoption. We believe its importance only needs to be fully understood to insure its overwhelming adoption.

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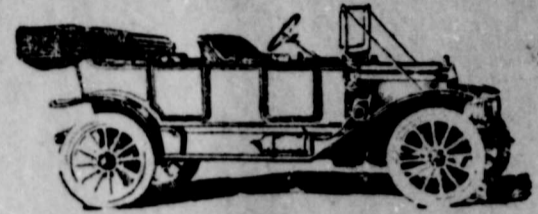
