A message to Miss John Crump Monday from Tucumcari, N. M., announced that her brother, Grover Crump, was very low at that place, and a later message received here yesterday morning announced his death, and stated that he had been buried Monday afternoon. No particulars have, to date, been available.

Grover Crump visited here a few months ago, leaving here for Oklahoma, and going from there to Tucumcari, where he was working at his trade of painter and wall paper hanger. He was about 28 years of age. His sudden death comes as a shock to his relatives here, and in their grief they have the sincere sympathy of their friends.

COURT SETS TAX RATE

11c FOR COUNTY—22c FOR ROAD DISTRICT.

Considerable Reduction From Rate For Last Year—Rabbit Scalps Coming In Fast.

Commissioners court yesterday set the tax rate for McCulloch county at 41c. The following is the apportionment:

Ad valorem	20
Road and bridge	12 1/2
Court house bonds	1 1/2
Bridge bonds (old)	1
Bridge bonds (new)	4
Jury fund	2

The rate for Road District No. 1 was set at 22c. The rate for Road District No. 1 last year was 33 1-3c, and the county tax rate was 47 1-2c, so the rate this year will be considerably lower.

The commissioners also re-deemed some 5,223 rabbit scalps for the month. The scalps were in the proportion of about 2,750 jacks and 2,500 cotton tails. The number redeemed last month was about 1,900. A total of about \$275 has thus far been paid out of the \$500 set aside for this purpose.

McCULLOCH TAX VALUES

SHOW INCREASE OF NEARLY \$100,000.00.

Good Showing Made This Year As Compared With That of the Year of 1912.

The totals of McCulloch county's assessed valuations as just given out by the Tax Assessor's office, show a gratifying increase over last year. The total this year is \$7,833,811.00 as compared with \$7,738,129.00 in 1912 an increase of \$95,682.00.

While property renditions were lower this year than last, the increase in the total is easily accounted for by reason of the great increase in railroad property in this county following the extension of the Santa Fe and Frisco.

Quite a serious accident befell the family of Willie Freeman near Voca Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. Freeman, accompanied by their three children and Mrs. Baze, were enroute from their home at Camp San Saba to Voca to attend church. The mules driven to their hack became frightened and in their endeavors to run the breast yoke was broken, allowing the tongue of the hack to drop. The frightened animals first ran the hack into a fence, pitching Mrs. Baze and two of the children out, and then straddled a tree, the jar throwing Mr. and Mrs. Freeman and the youngest child out. The latter, a babe of six months, was severely hurt internally in the fall, and its life has been despaired of, although latest reports were to the effect that it was some better. Mrs. Baze received a cut on her face and the remainder of the party received bruises, none of which, however, are serious.

LIKE SPARTAN BOYS OF OLD

North Canadian Youths Are Taught Endurance Through Exposure to the Cold.

Whipping and exposure without clothes as a training in endurance of cold for the North Canadian native boys has curious points of resemblance to the training of their boys of ancient Sparta. He thereupon rose and kicked it away, saying sternly, "No effeminacy, boy!"
