HOG RANCHING ON BIG SCALE

G. W. Vierling Talks of Plans for Kimble County Ranch

1,000 ACRES OF ALFALFA UNDER IRRIGATION

An Immense Project by Former Bradyite--Traction Engine and Turbine to Supply Water for Alfalfa, Milo Maize and Other Crops

G. W. Vierling has been trying to make us envious by telling all about the wonders of his ranch down in Kimble county, and he very nearly succeeded. Mr. Vierling is so taken up with his improvements on the farm that he can talk of nothing else, and with the completion of the improvements now contemplated will have one of the finest ranches in the state.

At present he has sixty acres under irrigation. Owing to the great amount of work necessary to put the old irrigation plant in operation, he was late in getting started with his alfalfa crop, and instead of the usual seven cuttings of alfalfa he will cut five times this year. The irrigation ditch had filled in, and the entire system fallen into disuse when he bought the ranch. Nevertheless he has a thousand bales of alfalfa stored away in his immense barn, waiting for winter and spring sale, when the market will not be glutted, as at present.

In addition to the sixty acres under irrigation, fifty-five acres of new land were put in milo maize this year, and this winter fifty more acres will be cleared and put in milo maize. Another huge task that will be undertaken is the plowing up of all the old alfalfa for the purpose of re-seeding. Mr. Vierling is determined to put the place in A1 shape and thinks a good way to begin is by starting out with a fresh sowing of alfalfa. For this purpose he has purchased a big 40-horse power traction engine and a big gang steam plow with which he can turn up thirty acres a day. Eventually he expects to have 1,000 acres in alfalfa, and all of it under irrigation. A big dam will be built sufficient to irrigate this acreage, and a turbine wheel put in, and in addition the traction engine will come in in good turn to run a big pump.

In purchasing the ranch Mr. Vierling had in view the opening up of a hog ranch on a scale never before attempted in this section of the state. It is estimated that one acre of alfalfa will keep twenty-six head of hogs, and with 1,000 acres in alfalfa it will be an easy matter to care for 2,600 head. With this plan in operation, he feels that he can safely estimate his annual sales at \$400,000.

In addition, he will stock his farm with fine mares and full-blood jersey cows, finding diversion from hog raising in the raising of jacks and jerseys.

So far, there is but one obstacle that might interfere with the complete success of his plans, and that is the lack of marketing facilities. However, he is confident that the next two or three years will see a railroad building from San Antonio through this section, and possibly connecting at San Angelo. Several roads have been projected through that section, and all of them must traverse Mr. Vierling's land in order to find an outlet between the mountains, which would put his ranch directly on the right-of-way.

Mr. Vierling says that his undertaking is no mere child's play and requires constant work and attention. The constant putting of water on alfalfa land in the course of time packs the soil down which calls into use the renovator, a contrivance to loosen up the soil around and between plants without tearing

them up. Also when the soil becomes packed huge cracks are developed in the earth unless the water is kept constantly upon it. When Mr. Vierling first took charge of the place he found this to be the case. When he turned the first water on the land it flowed into the big cracks and could be heard running along down in the earth like an underground river.

The ranch is one of the finest bodies of land in this section, and is naturally adapted to hog ranching, and Mr. Vierling was not slow to realize and take advantage of the opportunities offered.

BRADY SCHOOLS OPEN

BUSY WEEK OF GETTING WORK OUTLINED.

Opening Attendance in Neighborhood of 450—Supt. W. L. Hughes Assigns Faculty.

The Brady schools opened Monday what is confidently expected one of the most successful school years in its history. The work of arranging the classes and the studies, and making out lists of school books required occupied the first two days of the opening week, but already the pupils are settling down to the routine of school work. The attendance is in the neighborhood of 450, and this number will be considerably augmented by new pupils entering all during this month.

The advisability of transferring the high school department to the North Ward school has come up for discussion and has aroused favorable comment upon all sides. It is pointed out that the segregation of the high school department would tend toward greater efficiency in class work, and put this branch upon a higher plane than can possibly be obtained while conducted in the same building as the lower grades. The North Ward building is admirably adapted for high school purposes, and it is very likely that some definite action toward making the change will be taken in the near future.

COTTON SHIPMENTS.

Special Fast Trains Carry Cotton to Galveston.

J. G. Fitzhugh, division freight agent for the Santa Fe, who visited Brady the first of the week, reported that all the roads were making special efforts to put cotton into Galveston in record breaking time. The shortage of steam ships is responsible for this action. Chief among the roads to adopt the new fast trains is the Santa Fe which has put into operation a special cotton train which makes the run from Temple to Galveston in fifteen hours. Hereafter twenty to twenty-five hours was considered making good time. A special train from Brownwood also connects with this train.

Mr. Fitzhugh was very optimistic regarding conditions, and stated that the Santa Fe was enjoying a good business, and that cotton was moving faster than he had ever seen it at this time of the year. Mr. Fitzhugh is one of the most affable of the Santa Fe officials, and is always a welcome visitor in Brady.

COTTON MOVING LIVELY.

Yesterday Banner Day at Public Cotton Yard.

Cotton is coming in at a lively rate this week, and the ginners are happy and wishing it might continue at the present rate all during the remainder of the year. With continued fair weather, however, practically all cotton will be out in the course of the next thirty days or so.

Yesterday was a good day for business at the public cotton yard, something like 115 bales having been received. Likewise all the gins have been doing a lively business the greater part of the day.

The following is the number of bales ginned up to 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon:

Of this number 606 have been shipped out from the cotton yard and 292 from the Farmers Union warehouse, while 30 bales were shipped without weighing.

RESTORING WELLS.

Four Wells on Meers Tract Again Producing.

Following the cleaning out of the four shallow wells on the Meers tract at Lohm, it is announced that the production of all the wells was just about back to normal again. These wells have produced from 15 to 40 barrels each per day, but of late the production has been greatly diminished owing to the wear on the valves and the choking up with paraffine. This trouble has now been remedied, and it is a source of gratification to all interested to see them again producing.

Efforts have been for the past two weeks to plug the deep well on the Meers tract. It is planned to plug the well at about 235 feet to cut off the salt water from below, and then "shoot" the well in the expectation of bringing in a good producer. When the well was being drilled a good flow was found at about 230 feet, the estimated flow being from 25 to 50 barrels.

The plugging of the well is no easy task. A pine plug is made just a trifle smaller than the casing and this is driven down to the desired depth. The first plug in the Meers well was but an eighth of an inch smaller than the casing, and when it struck the water it swelled so rapidly as to become firmly lodged in the well before the desired depth had been reached. In an effort to drive it down, the drill was driven through the plug, and considerable difficulty was experienced both in getting the plug and the drill out. The second plug was made a quarter inch smaller than the casing to allow for expansion. The plug was set this week, and efforts are now being made to pump the water from the well, preparatory to shooting.



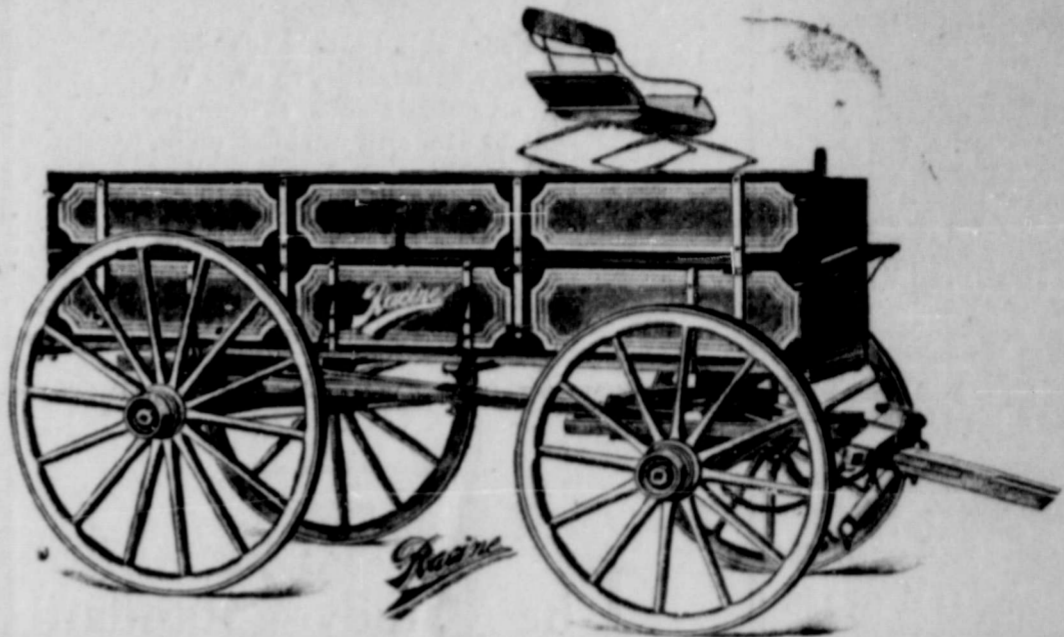

CITY DADS MEET.

City Marshal and City Secretary Make Reports.

The city council met last Tuesday night in regular session with all members present, and with Mayor Richards presiding.

The monthly report of City Marshal J. M. Anderson was presented, approved and ordered filed. The report shows the following collections for the month: Delinquent taxes, \$29,31; fines \$7.20; dog license tags, \$7.00; occupation taxes, \$60.00.

The monthly report of the city secretary and treasurer was also approved, showing the following condition of the treasury: General fund (overdraft), \$38.99; street fund, \$19.49; bond fund, \$5,186.55; officers' fund, \$135.15; waterworks sinking fund, \$2,318.11; waterworks bond fund, \$13,778.07.

The finance committee of the council was instructed to take up the matter of interest on deposits with the city depository and have the amounts credited to the account of the city.

The sum of \$100 was ordered transferred from the general to the street fund.

An order was passed instructing the tax assessor and collector to make correction in the rendition of S. R. Sellers on the 1911 rolls.

A permit was granted Mann Bros. to put in a septic tank in the alley back of the east side of the square, provided the consent of the owners of property abutting on this alley be secured.

Three interesting features distinguish the article: First, the plowing of the land by dynamite; second, the subsoiling, and third and most important, the fertilization of the land. The article reads:

"There are in the section visited some of the finest crops we ever saw. Mack Neel, north of Carrollton, has a field of corn that will yield over 100 bushels per acre. W. W. Beavers' crop is equally fine, but those of S. D. and W. A. Nixon excelled them all. They broke up their land with dynamite, afterwards subsoiling by deep plowing. The corn rows are three feet apart, and they are planted thick. Good judges estimate that the crop will yield 200 bushels of corn per acre, and from two to three bales of cotton. These farmers use a ton of fertilizer to the acre. Col. Adamson has a patch of cotton that cannot be matched anywhere."

* COMMERCIAL CORNER *
* By the Secretary. *

There are several towns that have not responded to our urgent appeals to assist us in our common interest in trying to retain our present freight rates. The trial will be the latter part of this month. This suit will be stubbornly contested before the members of the Interstate Commerce Commissioners somewhere in Texas.

The main argument that will be used against us will be that there are a number of cities and towns that are not taking any action to retain the present rates and by their indifference to the issue it will be claimed that they are in favor of the raise in tariff rates. They will justly claim that such important towns as Mason, San Saba, Richland Springs, Rochelle and others of similar wealth and population are against the present rate because they are not listed and are not taking any interest in the issue. We are of the opinion that the above towns are not in favor of the raise, but we are sorry to state that they are not asking to be listed and are not taking that fellowship that would make our contest an easy one for our consumers.

I believe that our contention is a just one, and if we win, I do not think it is the proper thing for two or three towns to fight the entire battle and then hand the others an equal share of the profits. So it has been decided by the committee in charge of this matter that all the towns that contribute to the expense fund in any way will be listed in our petition before the Commission, and those who refuse to do anything at all will be left off the petition. I think that all will agree as to the justice of this decision.

Some complain that the expense is too much. This is the way it looks to us, but we cannot help it. If we could reduce the expense account we would gladly do so at once. Usually when we are forced into any sort of litigation, we are not consulted as to the expense of that suit. What we would like to see is this entire section of the state now under consideration to be made differential territory all lined up on the same side demanding justice. By all taking some fellowship in some way, the arguments referred to above could not be made to our hurt.

Again, there are some of our merchants who are not willing to assist the others who are bearing this burden. A short time ago, two of us undertook to raise \$200 that was then due the lawyer for his work for us in this case, and we found business men—just a few—who turned us away without even a kind word. Such men are willing to reap the benefits provided others will, at great expense, bring it to them. No comment here. You do that.

At this critical moment we want the fellowship of all classes in order that we can go before the Commission with a solid delegation. That of itself will materially assist us in the lawsuit.
