WIND AND HAIL STORM

DOES GREAT DAMAGE TO PROPERTY AND CROPS.

Cotton Stripped From Stalks and Beaten Into Ground. Buildings Are Damaged.

A disastrous wind, hail and rain storm visited the north and northeast part of McCulloch county last Thursday, practically wiping out all cotton remaining in the fields, besides doing great damage to property.

The storm covered a strip of country from Coleman in Coleman county to Richland Springs in San Saba county, Santa Anna, Winchell, Milburn and Mercury being in its path. At Coleman the damage was estimated at \$10,000 in the city alone. Awnings and smoke stacks were blown down, buildings were partially unroofed, plate glass windows were broken and a number of buildings blown off their blocks and wrecked. Cotton fields in the path of the storm were entirely destroyed, the cotton being knocked out and washed away.

At Santa Anna nearly every house in town had window lights broken out by the hail, and several buildings were peppered full of holes. The estimated loss of cotton in the Santa Anna territory is 600 bales. The rain following the storm filled the tanks and gave a good season for winter grain.

At Winchell the greatest amount of damage seems to have been done in McCulloch county. The Methodist church was completely demolished, and the Baptist church was moved off its foundation and split in two. The Cravens Mercantile Co. suffered the loss of their plate glass window front and their stock of goods was damaged by rain. Hundreds of bales of cotton were beaten into the ground and washed away.

At Milburn the Methodist church was damaged, as well as a number of other buildings. Telephone and telegraph wires were blown down, and much cotton destroyed.

At Mercury the warehouse was demolished and more or less damage done to the gin, while numerous houses and outbuildings were blown off their foundations or damaged.

HEAVY RAIN FRIDAY.

Brady Gets One and Two-Fifths Inch Downpour.

Rain falling in sheets, such as had not been observed in over three months, was the sight to which Col. J. Pluvius treated Brady folks last Friday afternoon. A dust storm of unusual severity preceded the rain, which fell in torrents for about forty minutes, the government rain gauge showing a precipitation of 1.25 inches in that length of time. Telephone reports show that the rain extended along the line of the Frisco from Brownwood to Brady, and Mason and intermediate points also report a like heavy downpour. In the northwest and west part of the county, where the ranch and stockmen have been in great need of water for stock and for winter grain, no rain was had. A good fall was had about eight miles out of the Coleman road, and beyond this as far as Lohn but a slight shower fell. The rain was as much lighter out on the London road, although sufficient to give some much-needed stock water.

QUARTZ NEAR BURNET.

Barney Harmsen Developing Mines There.

Burnet, Sept. 14.—The quartz mines on the Thomas & Barringer properties west of Burnet some five miles are being developed. Twelve men are now at work on them, and if the further development of the mines prove that quartz in paying quantities is found, then mills and larger shafts will be put in. The quartz assay considerable to the ton, but just how much is not known, as the work was done in the North. Barney Harmsen, trustee, is deepening and developing this mine.

The White Eagle copper mine is also being developed on the same scale. The gentleman in charge believes that there are great quantities of quartz and copper in this section, and an assayer here at the mine, says that if this proves valuable, as he believes it will, a large shift of men will be put to work at once.

W. V. Day was here from Placid last Friday and reported great damage done by the wind and hail throughout the Mercury, Milburn and Winchell communities. The warehouse at Mercury was blown down, the gin was put out of commission, the house of George Morris was blown off its blocks and a number of other buildings blown down or damaged to some extent. At Milburn, the Methodist church was damaged, and at Winchell two church buildings were wrecked, one being blown in two.

BRADY HAS THE MARKET.

Out Tops Neighboring Cities in Prices.

The San Saba News boasts that the highest price paid for cotton seed in San Saba last week was \$20.50, with a "fierce cotton seed war" on at that. The Brownwood News reports cotton seed bringing \$17.00 per ton last Thursday. At the same time the Brady market for cotton seed was \$21.00. Brownwood's quotation Thursday for cotton, middling basis, was 11.20; Brady's, middling basis, was 11.25. Alfalfa hay brought \$14 in Brownwood; in Brady, \$16.50. Oats in Brownwood, 30c to 35c; in Brady, 40c to 42c.

Brownwood's cotton receipts up to Thursday were 3521; Brady's receipts, 3377.

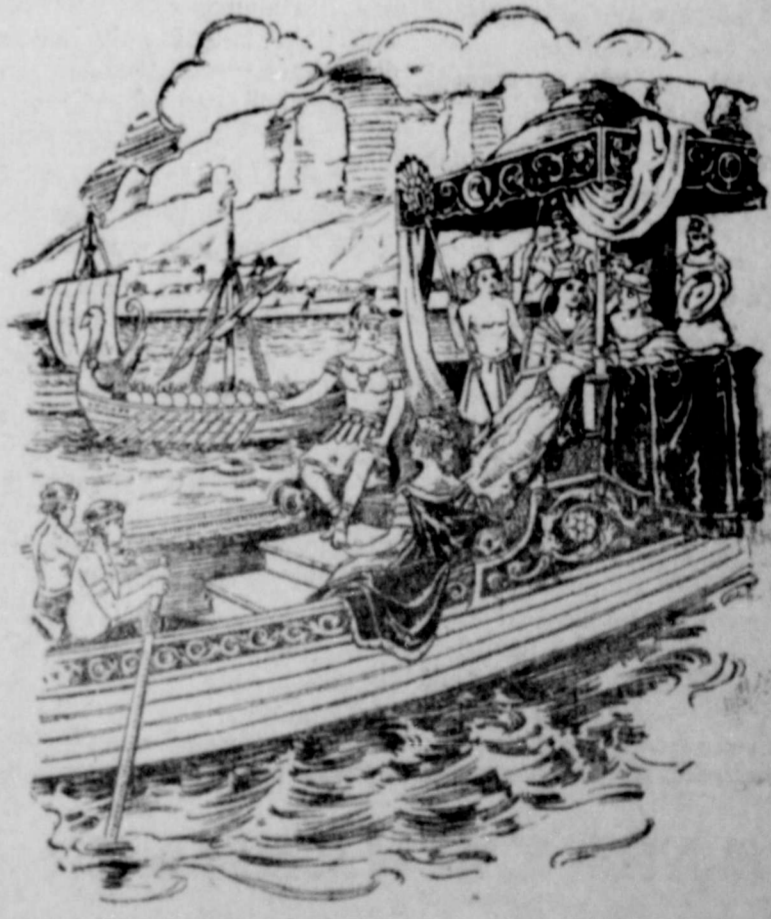

For a quarter of a century some of our enterprising citizens worked and planned and hoped to turn the waters of the San Saba river out into the valley for irrigation purposes. It has always been believed that the people who owned the land desired irrigation. This time the proposition was put squarely up to them. They said no, and said it emphatically.

The Lampasas Leader reports that many horses are dying in the north part of that county and in Coryell county from charbon, or anthrax. All the stock belonging to one family had died and there is much uneasiness among the people. Rigid precautions will be observed to prevent the spread of the disease.

The Mexican war breeze is a small affair compared to the cotton seed war which waged and raged in San Saba. Bright and early Saturday morning A. J. Gatlin put out posters raising the price to \$17.50 a ton. An hour later he put out a second on the street corners and in the wagons raising the price another dollar, making \$18.50 a ton. About 1 o'clock Low & Urquhart followed with posters saying they would "Pay More for Cotton Seed." The war was on, all day the battle raged, but instead of the rattle of musketry and roar of cannon was the jingle of the coin into the farmer's pocket. So far as the News is informed the "red flag" still waves, there is no truce, and the farmers will do well to come to San Saba to sell their cotton and cotton seed. \$20.50 was the highest price paid. How is that?
