HAS PLENTY WATER.

E. W. Harris is Not Worried by Dry Spells.

E. W. Harris was in from Broadmoor Sunday night and reported a light rain at the ranch Sunday. Mr. Harris says he doesn't want rain until he gets his cotton out, and gives no thought to the water question, as he has amply fortified himself along this line. Mr. Harris estimates that he has spent between \$7,000 and \$8,000 in building tanks, and has some fifteen or sixteen on his place, several of them costing over \$1,000 to construct. His present water supply would run him a year without another drop of rain. Besides the tanks, Mr. Harris has two wells with, practically an inexhaustible supply of water. From one of these wells he watered 3800 head of sheep from Christmas until July. The well is 24 feet deep, and the supply did not seem to be diminished to any extent all during this time.

One of the latest improvements is a silo just completed. This silo has a large capacity and Mr. Harris has already formed a high opinion of its value in preserving feed and will, very likely, construct others in the near future.

HAIL STORM DAMAGING.

Terrible Wind, Hail and Rain Last Week.

Charles E. Baughman, who has just returned from a trip through the Mercury country, says Brownwood people have no idea of the amount of damage done by the storm last week in that vicinity. He estimates that the loss will total more than \$125,000 in that community. He makes this estimate after spending several days in the vicinity and talking with parties who have a good idea of the amount of damage done. The greatest loss from any one source is on cotton in the field. The heavy losses are as follows:

Mr. Baughman says that he found a great number of farm houses were blown down and many barns ruined. In some instances cattle were killed. It is estimated that the cotton loss alone will reach 1800 bales, though many of the farmers have not reported their losses. There was also quite a lot of feed stuff ruined by the wind, hail and water. It is believed that the merchants of Mercury will have very poor collections this fall on account of the rain.

Mrs. Frank Wilhelm of Brady passed through San Saba Friday enroute to the home of her father, George Markley, at

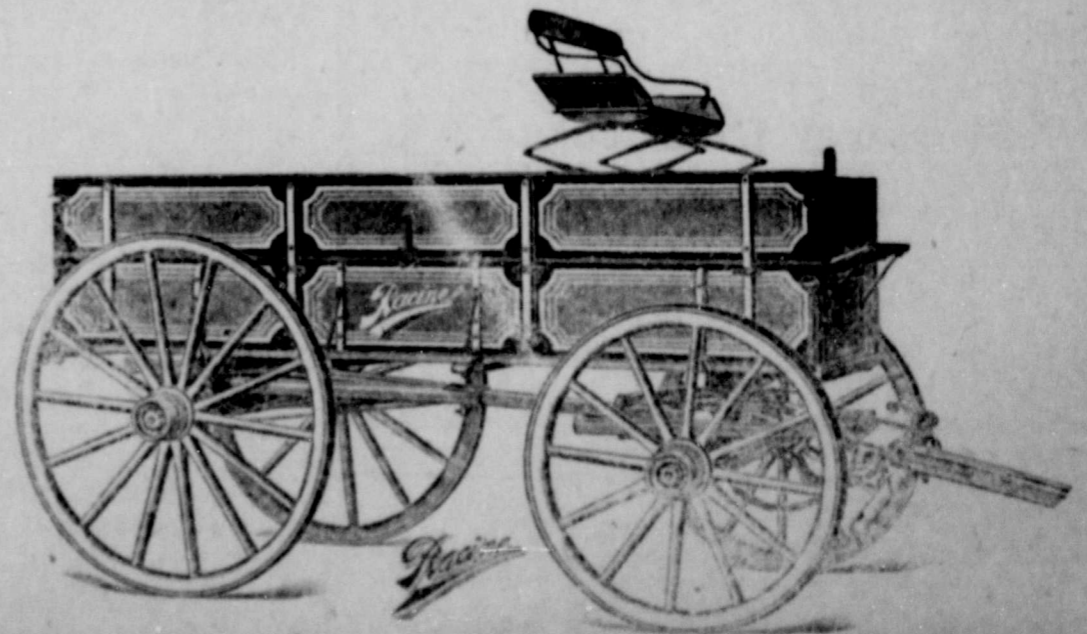
Cherokee.
