ELECTION ON NOV. 16th

CITIZENS TO VOTE ON PURCHASE OF WATERWORKS.

Purchase Price \$42,250—Due in 15 Years, With Interest at 8 Per Cent Per Annum.

Elsewhere in this issue is contained the order of election for the purpose of voting upon the question of the purchase of the Brady Water and Light Co.'s waterworks system and electric lighting plant. According to the terms of the contract agreed to by J. H. and G. R. White of the Brady Water and Light Co. and the members of the city council, \$42,250 will be the purchase price paid by the city, due and payable at the end of fifteen years. Interest will be at the rate of 8 percent per annum and will be payable annually. Past due interest to bear 10 per cent interest. At no time during the period of fifteen years will the present owners of the Brady Water and Light Co., or the holders of the note given by the city to cover the purchase price, be allowed to foreclose upon their lien for any cause whatsoever. The note for \$42,250 is to be secured by a lien not only upon the present waterworks system and lighting plant, but upon the waterworks dam, the filter and all improvements or additions to the present plant.

No tax can be levied against the citizens or property owners of Brady at any time toward the payment of either note or interest, and the plant must pay for itself out of the net earnings. The property is placed in the hands of three managing trustees, one of whom shall be the mayor of the city of Brady, the second to be named by the holders of the note, and the third

to be selected by the mayor and the second trustee, the selection to be approved by the city council. Mayor F. M. Richards, together with E. L. Ogden and J. E. Shropshire are named as trustees in the order of election.

The council has, as yet, not decided the filter plant, pending the making of some adjustments upon the centrifugal pump. This matter will be remedied in the next few days, after which the council will pass upon the plant. Water from the filter plant was pumped into the city mains for the first time Tuesday.

The north abutment of the dam will be cut down to the level of the weir section. P. T. Orlopp, the local engineer, having commenced the work Wednesday. This action has been found necessary owing to the fact that the high abutment caused the water to overflow land adjacent to that purchased by the city for the dam site. The terms of all these purchases stated that the dam was to be built so as to cause the overflow of no land other than that purchased by the city.

CAPT. ED GARLICK DEAD.

Well Known Railroad Conductor Died at Temple.

The death of Capt. Ed Garlick, one of the oldest, best known and most popular railroad conductors in Texas, occurred Monday morning at Temple, following a long illness, death being due to cancer of the stomach. Mr. Garlick was well known in Brady, a brother-in-law to T. J. Bradley of this city, and had visited here and at Fife last June. The following is the report of his death taken from the state press:

Temple, Texas, Oct 7.—The death of Capt. Ed Garlick, a veteran Santa Fe Railway passenger conductor and one of the best known railroad men in Texas and the entire country, occurred this morning at Santa Fe hospital following an illness of some months. Deceased was a personal friend of William Jennings Bryan and entertained the latter at his home on several occasions when the Com-moner visited Temple.

For many years Capt. Garlick attended the Grand Lodge of the Order of Railway Conductors as representative of the Temple division and acquired a national acquaintance as a result. Four years ago, under direction of the National Democratic committee, he performed valuable service among railroad men in Northern, Eastern and Western States. He was a member of the Order of Railway

Conductors, Elks and Knights of Pythias.

Died.

Amos Wright, the 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Wright died Wednesday morning at 5 o'clock at the family home in the Nine community. The young man had been ill about three weeks with typhoid fever, and about a week ago took a turn for the worse, and all that medical skill and loving care could do was unavailing. The funeral was held yesterday noon, services being conducted by Rev. Shan Hull of Rochelle, and interment was made in the Brady cemetery. A large concourse of friends attended the services, and accompanied the funeral procession to the grave.

It is therefore agreed by and between the parties hereto that said company does hereby sell and said city does hereby purchase the said property so owned by said company for the sum of Forty Two Thousand, Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$42,250.00), to be paid in fifteen years from the 22nd day of November, 1912, with interest from said date at the rate of eight per cent per annum, interest payable annually, with ten per cent interest on past due interest, said payment being evidenced by a written obligation payable to the order of said company at Brady, Texas, and signed by said city by and through its mayor and aldermen and secretary and under the corporate seal of said city, the said note being in words and figures substantially as follows: \$42,250.00.

Brady, McCulloch Co., Texas, November 22, 1912. On November 22nd, 1927, the city of Brady, a municipal corporation of McCulloch county, Texas, promises to pay to the order of the Brady Water and Light Co., a private corporation, the sum of Forty Two Thousand, Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$42,250.00), with interest from this date at the rate of eight (8) per cent per annum, interest payable on the 22nd day of November, 1913, and annually thereafter, and all past due interest to bear interest at the rate of ten (10) per cent per annum, to be paid out of the income of the water system and lighting system owned and to be acquired by said city, or the proceeds of sale of said water system and lighting system, as provided in Chapter 112, of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 32nd Legislature of the State of Texas, but the holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and this obligation shall never be a debt of said city, but solely a charge upon the properties encumbered to secure this obligation by a contract this day entered into by and between said city of Brady and said Brady Water and Light Co., said contract of encumbrance is here referred to and made part hereof for all purposes. No foreclosure proceedings under said contract of encumbrance shall be had on account of failure to pay any interest prior to the maturity of the principal of this obligation. In case of default in payment of this obligation and same is placed in the hands of an attorney for collection, or if any suit is brought thereon, or if lien given to secure payment of this obligation is foreclosed in whole or in part, by suit or otherwise, then an additional amount of five (5) per cent on the principal of this obligation shall be added thereto as collection fees. Any part of this obligation may be paid at any time prior to the maturity of this obligation.

It is understood and agreed that said note or obligation shall never be a debt of said city, but shall be solely a charge upon the properties hereby encumbered, and that no foreclosure of the lien here granted on any of said property shall be had for non-payment of interest prior to maturity of the principal of said note or obligation. There is hereby created and acknowledged a valid and subsisting lien upon all of the properties so owned by said city and upon said properties so owned by said company and here so purchased by said city, and the income thereof and everything pertaining thereto and acquired or to be acquired, and all additions and improvements on and extensions of either said water or lighting system, or both of them, to secure the payment of said note.

Sam McCullum of Brady, Texas, is hereby appointed trustee to make sale of all said properties upon default in payment of said note, and in case said trustee, from any cause whatever, becomes disqualified or refuses to act or fails to act as such trustee, then the said company or other holder and owner of said note, or any interest therein, may, by written instrument duly acknowledged and placed of record in Deed Records of McCulloch county, Texas, appoint a successor who shall have all of the authority and powers herein granted to said Sam McCullum.

In case of default in payment of said note at the date of maturity thereof then said trustee, after the giving of the notices provided in Section 5 of said Chapter 112 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 32nd Legislature of the State of Texas, and after advertising such sale of said property for the length of time and in the manner required by law for the sale of real estate under execution at that time, may proceed to sell all of said properties, rights and privileges upon which a lien is here given to satisfy said note and the interest and collection fees thereon, or any part thereof remaining unpaid at said time, said sale to be at public auction at the court house door of McCulloch county, Texas, and such trustee after said sale shall make a good and sufficient conveyance to the purchaser or purchasers thereof and shall convey the proceeds of such sale to the satisfaction of said note, the interest and collection fees thereon, and any balance remaining shall be paid to said city, or its order.

In case said property is sold under any foreclosure proceedings, whether by said trustee under the powers of sale herein granted, or under any foreclosure proceedings in any court of competent jurisdiction, the purchaser or purchasers of such property shall have a franchise for a period of twenty years from and after the date of sale under such foreclosure proceedings, to operate the systems and properties so purchased, within the corporate limits of said city.

Upon the payment of said note being well and truly made, according to the reading and tenor thereof, then the lien hereby created to secure payment of same shall be released by the holder of said note, otherwise to remain in full force and effect. The management and control of said properties during the time the same are encumbered as herein provided shall be placed in the hands of a board of trustees, consisting of three members, herein known as managing trustees, one of whom shall always be the mayor of said city, and herein designated as first member of said managing trustees, and F. M. Richards, present mayor of said city, is hereby named as such member; and said company or other owner or holder of said note shall always have the right to appoint one member of said board of managing trustees, and which trustee is hereby designated as second member of said managing trustees, and E. L. Ogden is hereby named by said company as such member of said board of trustees. J. E. Shropshire is hereby agreed upon as the third member of said board of managing trustees, herein known as third member of said board. Said F. M. Richards shall constitute the first member of said board of trustees while he is such mayor and his successors in office shall thereafter always constitute said first member of said board. Said company, or other owner and holder of said note, shall have the right, at all times, to appoint a successor to said second member of said board. The successor to the third member of said board shall be selected by said first member and second member, subject to the approval of the city council of the said city, and if any successor be selected and such selection be disapproved by said city council then said successor shall not qualify, but another member suitable to said city council shall be selected. Said company or other owner or holder of said note shall, at all times, have the right to remove said second member of said board and to appoint a successor for said second member. Said third member of said board of managing trustees shall be removed and his successor appointed when so requested by the city council of said city.

The provisions herein for the removal of said second and third managing trustees shall apply to those herein named as well as to their successors. All removals of said trustees shall be by notice in writing filed with the city secretary of said city and entered on the minutes of said city council, and all appointments of such trustees shall likewise be in writing filed with the city secretary and entered on the minutes of said city council. All such removals may be done without notice to the trustees so to be removed. Said managing trustees shall receive the same pay for their services that the members of the city council of said city receive, not to exceed pay for more than two meetings per month, but never to exceed five per cent of the gross receipts from said properties in any one year. Said managing trustees shall hold their offices until their successors are selected. Said first trustee shall be deemed a member of said board without any further qualification than that as mayor of said city, but said trustees second and third, before entering upon their duties as such trustees, shall each qualify by taking and subscribing the oath of office as prescribed by the Constitution of the state of Texas, in Section 1, Article 16. Said managing trustees shall have full management and control of said properties as provided and contemplated in said Chapter 112, and shall be subject to all the provisions of said Chapter 112, and shall have authority to make all rules and regulations necessary for the proper management and control of said properties, and shall have all of the authority granted them under said Chapter 112. They shall have authority to employ all labor necessary for the operation of said properties and to make all purchases of material necessary for the operation and improvement of said properties and systems, and shall have authority to select a manager of said properties and delegate to such manager such authority as said managing trustees may think proper. All rules and regulations made by said managing trustees shall be in writing and shall be filed with the secretary of said city, who shall enter them in a book to be kept for that purpose. In the making of all rules and regulations herein provided for it shall be necessary for all members of said board to be present, but a majority of said board may make such rules and regulations. Said board of managing trustees shall have authority to provide for the payment of the revenues arising from said properties, of the expenses of operating and maintenance of same, including all salaries, labor, material, interest, repairs and extensions necessary to render efficient service. Every such proper item of expense shall be a first lien and charged against the income from said properties and shall be first paid by said trustees. Said managing trustees shall keep, or cause to be kept, a complete set of books showing all of the transactions concerning said properties and shall make quarterly reports to the city council of said city, and such other reports as may be requested by said city council, showing fully the condition of said properties, and the matters pertaining thereto, including the acts done and performed by said managing trustees.

After the payment of expenses of operation and maintenance, including all salaries, labor, material, interest, repairs and extensions necessary to render efficient service, as above provided, said managing trustees shall pay, or cause to be paid, the balance of the income and revenue from said properties on the interest and principal of said note. Such payments on said principal and interest, if there be any funds out of which to make such payments, to be made at the end of each year, or oftener, if deemed proper by said managing trustees, or if so directed by the city council of said city. Any rules and regulations made by said managing trustees may be changed or abrogated by the mutual agreement of said city council and said company, or other owner and holder of said note, and any rule or regulation, or rules and regulations, for the management and control of said properties made and mutually agreed upon by said city council and by said company, or other owner or holder of said note, shall be adopted and enforced by said managing trustees. The provisions herein for foreclosure of lien here granted by sale by trustee shall in no wise preclude said company, or other holder of said note, from foreclosing said lien in a court of competent jurisdiction. The franchise under which said company has heretofore operated its water and lighting system in said city is hereby cancelled and abandoned.

Said election shall be held within the corporate limits of said city of Brady and in the northwest room on the first floor of the county court house of McCulloch county, Texas, and J. M. Duke is hereby appointed presiding officer for said election and he shall appoint two judges and two clerks to assist him in holding said election, and he shall, within the time prescribed by law, after said election has been held, make due return thereof to the city council of said city of Brady. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the state of Texas regulating general elections. Only qualified voters of said city of Brady shall be allowed to vote, and all voters supporting the proposition authorizing the city council to enter into the said contract with said Brady Water and Light Co., as above set out, shall have printed on their ballots, the words: "Against the making of the contract and mortgage with the Brady Water and Light Co." Notices of said election shall be given by the city marshal of the city of Brady posting copies of this order, signed by the mayor of the said city, in three public places within the limits of said city, no two of which shall be at the same place, and one of which shall be at the door of the county court house of McCulloch county, and by publishing said notice for thirty days prior to the date of said election in The Brady Standard, a newspaper published in said city of Brady.

A FEARFUL TRAGEDY.

Daughter and Grandson of Rev. Caperton Burned to Death.

Rev. W. G. Caperton returned this morning from Troupe, Smith county, Texas, where he was called by the terrible news of the death of his daughter, Mrs. T. B. Collier, and grandson, Grady Collier, in a fire last Saturday evening.
