COMPRESS RECEIPTS.

To Date Total of 9,303 As
Against 4,521 Last Year.

Through the courtesy of N. H. Hardin, bookkeeper at the compress, we are informed that the total number of bales received at the compress up to yesterday noon was 9,303, and of this number 7,302 had been pressed. At a corresponding date last year 4,521 bales had been received and 3,815 pressed. In spite of this favorable showing over last year, it is not thought that the total of the season's run will reach the total of last year, the present record being due to the fact that cotton came in much more rapidly this year than last. The total number of bales pressed last year was 15,732, the compress running until about April 1st.

WATERWORKS DAM.

Accepted by City Council Last Wednesday.

The city council in called session last Wednesday morning formally accepted the waterwork dam, and other work contracted by John B. Hawley, the water expert, of Fort Worth. This action is the last with reference to the waterworks plant so far as the original \$40,000 waterworks bond issue is concerned, and the future course in the development of the municipal ownership of the waterworks system is dependent upon the action of the voters of Brady in the election just three weeks from tomorrow, when the matter of purchase of the present water and light system will come before the citizens.

Insofar as an abundant supply of pure water is concerned, Brady's problem has now been solved, and her waterworks dam and filtering plant stands as a monument to the indomitable will and enterprise of her citizenship, which has surmounted all the obstacles that have blocked the way of progress. The problem that now confronts the citizens is that of the distribution of the water, and it will come up for solution on Nov. 16th.

Cotton Receipts in Brady.

Despite the fact that this year's wagon receipts were not expected to reach that of last year, indications now appear that the number will not be far short. At the public cotton yard the receipts to date have been 5,063. The total receipts for last year were 6,721. The shipments to date amount to 4,902 bales, leaving 1,061 bales in the yard. Receipts at the Farmers Union Warehouse were unobtainable.

EXPLAINS ERROR.

Joe E. Eidson Nominated Presidential Elector.

Hillsboro, Texas, Oct. 29.—Hon. Walter Collins, chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, this afternoon gave out the following statement and requested its publication:

"From inquiries I have received, and from a communication in The News of today, I learn there is some confusion as to the name of the nominee for Presidential elector from the Eleventh Congressional District. In order that the voters throughout the State may not make any mistake on election day in casting their ballots for this position, I desire to call attention to the fact that Hon. C. W. Taylor of Bell county was the original nominee for that position, but he resigned, and the State Democratic Executive Committee convened in Dallas Friday, October 18, and, in accordance with the election law, nominated Hon. Joe E. Eidson of Hamilton county to succeed Mr. Taylor. I regret to learn that in some counties the name of Mr. Taylor will appear on the official ballot instead of Mr. Eidson's. In view of the confusion, I desire to urge all nominees of the democratic party and all county and precinct chairmen and election officers to make known to the voters that Mr. Eidson is the regular nominee and that it will be proper for his name to be written on the ballot, and that Mr. Taylor's name should be marked out, as it appears on the ballot by mistake. I will request that all weekly papers call special attention to this mistake and that it be impressed upon the voter to make the proper correction."

CONFEDERATE PENSIONS.

Fort Worth, Oct. 18.—Replying to your request that I prepare an article setting forth the main points of the pending amendment fixing a tax for Confederate pensions and that I explain the limits of the measure in order to let all Confederates and all citizens understand just what persons may obtain pensions under the new plan (to be voted on next general election, Nov. 5) that you desire to advocate the same editorially, I subjoin the following brief of the proposed amendment and thank you in advance.

Little attention has been given to this last attempt at benefiting those dependent ones. I find by a most thorough canvass of this measure this summer at fourteen reunions, by those who are availing favors of the public in their own behalf and protesting love in a general way for the Confederates but forget to make this high regard practical by even alluding to it—with few exceptions. I say "last attempt," for if it does not now receive the necessary majority, before the machinery of another amendment can be gotten ready for another referendum, comparatively few will survive its benefit. I have been over anxious to get it before the people and to prevent its going by default, as was the fate of the woman's home amendment, which required the third effort before we were able to incorporate it in our laws.

I quote the proposed measure and on page 288 of the General Laws of Texas by the 32nd legislature of 1911:

"Section 1. That Section 51 of the Constitution of the state of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"The legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1900, and their widows in indigent circumstances, and who were married to such soldiers and sailors anterior to January 1, 1900, to indigent and disabled soldiers who, under special laws of the state of Texas during the war between the states, served for a period of at least six months in the organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raids or Mexican marauders, and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the state of Texas who were in active service for a period of at least six months during the war between the states and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1900, provided that the word 'widow' shall not apply to women born since 1861;

also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for such soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home. That the legislature shall levy an ad valorem tax on property not exceeding 5c on the \$100 valuation as a special fund for above."

The above is the measure you inquired of, condensed, with much of the legal verbiage omitted. It will remain again for the legislature to define indigence, whether an allowance of \$1000 worth of property, and \$150 per year as now, or other definitions, remain for the incoming legislature. It will require a year for the act to be passed and provisions for the levy and collection of the taxes to meet this.

There are 12,000 pensioners now on our state rolls, and of course the new act will greatly increase the beneficiaries; just how much and what the monthly allowance will be, you can see is an uncertain quantity, but it was calculated that it would reach \$10 per month for each. The new provision over the existing pension law advances residence and marriage from 1880 to 1900, also allows the wife to go with her husband to the home, so as not to separate them; it also embraces a new class who served on the frontier and the militia and "women who aided the Confederacy," whether married or not, and whether their husbands served in the C. S. A. or not. I know many who gave their all and are not in this class of widows of Confederates. You will also note a new measure which confines widows to those born prior to 1861, and not since then.

Oh, you Wimbledon Peter, who, what, whence and whither goest thou?—Hamilton Record.

TEXANS AND PISTOLS.

The Brady Standard having noted that on circus day in Brady, although there was a great crowd in town, there was not an act of rowdiness or a violation of law, the Brownwood Bulletin observed that there has been a great change in Texas during the last twenty years in this respect. The Bulletin is correct, and it might have added that the people of Texas are as law-abiding every day in the year as are the people of any other state. If the pistol toting habit can be stopped Texas will have nothing in the matter of conduct by its citizens to be ashamed of.—San Antonio Express.

Good Roads Meeting to Be Held at Waco Nov. 9.

Hillsboro, Texas, Oct. 29.—The following statement was given out today by Homer D. Wade, secretary of the Good Roads Association and general secretary of the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association: "I am directed by J. W. Warren, president of the Texas Good Roads Association, to call a special meeting of the association to be held at Waco Nov. 9th. President Warren especially requests the presence at the Waco meeting of all persons who are interested in the proposed highway from Red River to the Gulf. In case of default in payment of said note at the date of maturity thereof then said trustee, after the giving of the notices provided in Section 5 of said Chapter 112 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 32nd Legislature of the State of Texas, and after advertising such sale of said property for the length of time and in the manner required by law for the sale of real estate under execution at that time, may proceed to sell all of said properties, rights and privileges upon which a lien is here given to satisfy said note and the interest and collection fees thereon, or any part thereof remaining unpaid at said time, said sale to be at public auction at the court house door of McCulloch county, Texas, and such trustee, after said sale shall make a good and sufficient conveyance to the purchaser or purchasers thereof and shall apply the proceeds of such sale to the satisfaction of said note, the interest and collection fees thereon, and any bal-

ance remaining shall be paid to said city, or its order.

In case said property is sold under any foreclosure proceedings, whether by said trustee under the powers of sale herein granted, or under any foreclosure proceedings in any court of competent jurisdiction, the purchaser or purchasers of such property shall have a franchise for a period of twenty years from and after the date of sale under such foreclosure proceedings to operate the systems and properties so purchased, within the corporate limits of said city.

Upon the payment of said note being well and truly made, according to the reading and tenor thereof, then the lien hereby created to secure payment of same shall be released by the holder of said note, otherwise to remain in full force and effect.

The management and control of said properties during the time the same are encumbered as herein provided shall be placed in the hands of a board of trustees, consisting of three members, herein known as managing trustees, one of whom shall always be the mayor of said city, and herein designated as first member of said managing trustees, and J. E. Shropshire, present mayor of said city, is hereby named as such member; and said company or other owner or holder of said note shall always have the right to appoint one member of said board of managing trustees, and which trustee is hereby designated as second member of said managing trustees, and E. L. Ogden is hereby named by said company as such member of said board of managing trustees. J. E. Shropshire is hereby agreed upon as the third member of said board of managing trustees, herein known as third member of said board. Said F. M. Richards shall constitute the first member of said board of trustees while he is such mayor and his successors in office shall thereafter always constitute said first member of said board. Said company, or other owner and holder of said note, shall have the right, at all times, to appoint a successor to said second member of said board. The successor to the third member of said board shall be selected by said first member and second member, subject to the approval of the city council of the said city, and if any successor be selected and such selection be disapproved by said city council then said trustee shall not qualify, but another member suitable to said city council shall be selected. Said company or other owner or holder of said note shall, at all times, have the right to remove said second member of said board and to appoint a successor for said second member. Said third member of said board of managing trustees shall be removed and his successor appointed when so requested by the city council of said city.

The provisions herein for the removal of said second and third managing trustees shall apply to those herein named as well as to their successors.

All removals of said trustees shall be by notice in writing filed with the city secretary of said city and entered on the minutes of said city council, and all appointments of such trustees shall likewise be in writing filed with the city secretary and entered on the minutes of said city council. All such removals may be done without notice to the trustees so to be removed. Said managing trustees shall receive the same pay for their services that the members of the city council of said city and each of them shall receive, but not to exceed pay for more than two meetings per month, but never to exceed five per cent of the gross receipts from said properties in any one year. Said managing trustees shall hold their offices until their successors are selected. Said first trustee shall be deemed a member of said board without any further qualification than that of said city and city, but said trustees, second and third, before entering upon their duties as such trustees, shall each qualify by taking and subscribing the oath of office as prescribed by the Constitution of the state of Texas, in Section 1, Article 16. Said managing trustees shall have full management and control of said properties and shall be authorized to execute and complete in said Chapter 112, and shall be subject to all the provisions of said Chapter 112, and shall have authority to make all rules and regulations necessary for the proper management and control of said properties, and shall have all of the authority granted them under said Chapter 112. They shall have authority to employ such labor necessary for the operation of said properties and to make all purchases of material necessary for the operation and improvement of said properties and systems, and shall have authority to select a manager of said properties and delegate to such manager such authority as said managing trustees may think proper. All rules and regulations made by said managing trustees shall be in writing and shall be filed with the secretary of said city, who shall enter them in a book to be kept for that purpose. In the making of all rules and regulations herein provided for it shall be necessary for all members of said board to be present, but a majority of said board may make such rules and regulations. Said board of managing trustees shall have authority to provide for the payment, out of the revenues arising from said properties, of the expenses of operating and maintenance of same, including all salaries, labor, material, interest, repairs and extensions necessary to render efficient service. Every such proper item of expense shall be a first lien and charged against the income from said properties and shall be first paid by said trustees. Said managing trustees shall keep, or cause to be kept, a complete set of books showing all of the transactions concerning said properties and shall make quarterly reports to the city council of said city, and such other reports as may be requested by said city council. Being fully the condition of said properties, and the matters pertaining thereto, including the acts done and performed by said managing trustees.

After the payment of expenses of

operation and maintenance, including all salaries, labor, material, interest, repairs and extensions necessary to render efficient service, as above provided, said managing trustees shall pay, or cause to be paid, the balance of the income and revenue from said properties on the interest and principal of said note. Such payments on said principal and interest, if there be any funds out of which to make such payments, to be made at the end of each year, or oftener, if deemed proper by said managing trustees, or if so directed by the city council of said city.

Any rules and regulations made by said managing trustees may be changed or abrogated by the mutual agreement of said city council and said company, or other owner and holder of said note, and any rule and regulation, or rules and regulations, for the management and control of said properties made and mutually agreed upon by said city council and by said company, or other owner or holder of said note, shall be adopted and enforced by said managing trustees.
