WATERWORKS ELECTION.

Brief Explanation of Proposition Now Before Voters.

Owing to the length of the order of election for the purchase of the present waterworks and lighting system, as has been published in The Brady Standard for several weeks past, it is probable that not many Brady voters have taken time to carefully read and thoroughly digest the proposition. In order to acquaint all with the facts as set forth in the order, the editor has undertaken to give a brief summary of the main facts to be considered. In this we have endeavored to present the facts in their true light, just as they were agreed upon by the members of the city council.

In the first place, the sum agreed upon as the purchase price of the waterworks property, together with the lighting system of the present Brady Water and Light Co. was \$42,250. This amount was \$1890 less than the valuation placed upon the plant by the waterworks expert, John B. Hawley, of Fort Worth, who had been employed by the city council to make an inventory of the plant and report to the council. The \$1890 was deducted by the city council from the figures submitted by Mr. Hawley on account of the six-inch mains about the square. In arriving at his figures, Mr. Hawley rejected all such machinery, fixtures and supplies as could not be incorporated in the rebuilding of the waterworks and lighting system. In addition to this, he deducted somewhere in the neighborhood of \$8000 for depreciation.

In the second place, the terms of the contract are worthy of close attention. By the terms of agreement, the note for the \$42,250 is to run fifteen years, bearing interest at 8 per cent and past due interest at 10 per cent. Interest is payable annually out of the net profits of the business, but at no time under the fifteen years can foreclosure be had for the failure to pay interest when due, or for any other cause, but right is reserved by the city at any time to retire such part of the indebtedness as may be seen fit and proper. This debt of \$42,250, together with the interest, under the law cannot become a debt against the city, but is solely a charge against the waterworks system. In other words, no part of the principal or interest can ever be raised by taxation, but on the other hand, the net profits of the waterworks and lighting plant must pay both interest and principal.

The present owners of the Brady Water and Light Co. are to be protected by a mortgage on their present holdings, and also upon the waterworks dam and filter plant, and all improvements such as may be made.

The management of the waterworks will be placed with three trustees, the first of whom shall always be the mayor of the city of Brady, the second trustee to be chosen by the holders of the mortgage, and the third to be selected by the first two trustees, subject to approval by the city council. By this means the city's interests, as well as those of the mortgagees will at all times be protected.

The election is set for next Saturday, November 16th, and all qualified voters living within the city limits of the city of

HEARING NOVEMBER 22.

Differential Territory Matter To Be Disposed of at Dallas.

Secretary D. R. Hardison yesterday received notice that the hearing before the Interstate Commerce Commission in the matter of increase of freight tariffs affecting West Texas cities would be held in the Federal building at Dallas beginning at 9 o'clock on the morning of November 22nd.

The railroads operating in the western portion of the state are seeking to raise freight rates on interstate shipments and they are assisted in this fight by the commercial organizations of cities in the Panhandle of Texas, in which territory rates are now as they are sought to be fixed for this territory. The matter of opposition to the raise is in the hands of the commercial clubs of the cities to be affected and they have employed Hon. Sam H. Cowan to represent them before the Commission.

The hearing will be before Commissioner Harlan of Washington, D. C.

WATERWORKS ELECTION.

How are you going to vote in the waterworks election is the leading question encountered all about town. Without trying to force our opinion upon anyone, we will state that we expect to vote for the proposition.

Our position is easily explained. Two years or so ago Brady was face to face with a water famine. The need of an abundant supply of pure water was then realized as never before. To this end \$40,000 water bonds were voted, a dam to impound an abundant supply of water was built and together with it a model and up-to-date filtering plant. This practically exhausted the fund of \$40,000 obtained from the sale of the bonds, and under the law no more bonds for waterworks purposes can be voted. This leaves the city with an abundant supply of water, but no means of distribution, and whatever is done in the matter must be entirely on the credit of the city. So far the only solution that has been offered is that of the purchase of the Brady Water & Light Co.'s plant.

The purchase price and the terms of agreement have received the careful consideration of the members of the city council, all of whom are men of the highest integrity and who have the best interests of the city at heart. They have based the agreement upon the figures submitted by a waterworks expert in their employ, making such deductions from his figures as in their judgment they saw fit.

There have been objections to the contract, but no better one has been offered, and no more feasible way out of the problem has been submitted. As it is, the city has on its hands a white elephant in the dam and the filter plant. If the city stands a reasonable chance to make the amount required to pay off the mortgage in the next fifteen years without another cent of investment, then we are in favor of the proposition to be submitted to the voters Saturday.

Claude Callan advises that by marrying we might be able to cut expenses. A safer bet would be that we would have to cut expenses.

The Republicans a few weeks ago, decided to discard the word Hon. in speaking or addressing one another, which action, in the light of the election returns, seems to have been a most timely one. We Democrats, however, are going to fray the designation to the very ends before we agree to relinquish it.

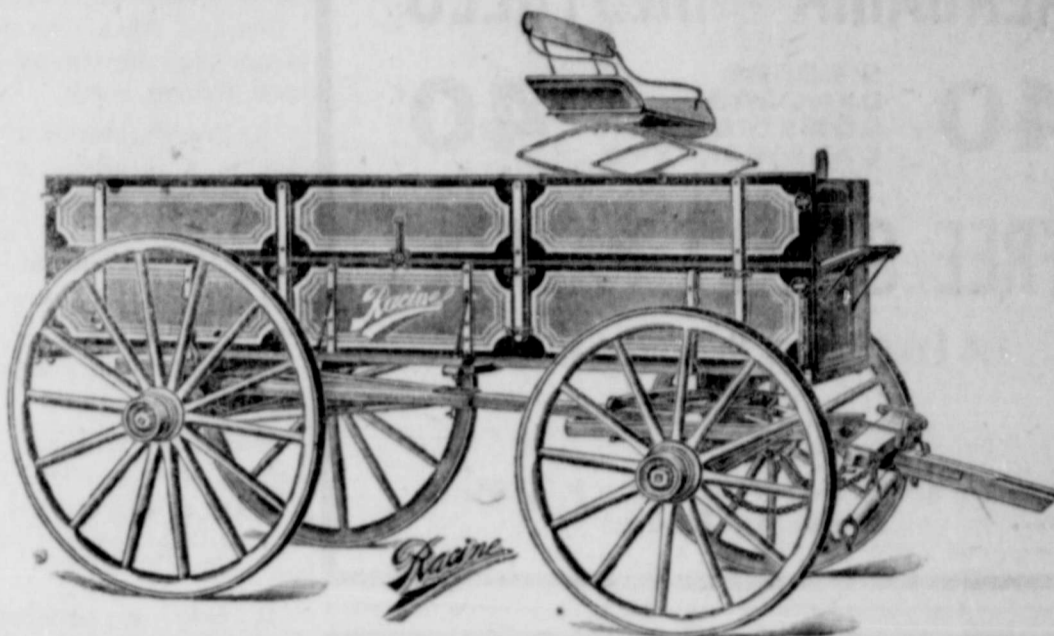
