Commissioners Court.

Quite a stir was created last Friday when the commissioners court made reductions in the salaries of several of the county officers. The court justified its action by a statement that in line with the efforts to reduce the tax rate, they considered the reduction in salaries quite as imperative. The matter was again taken up in the afternoon, and the court reconsidered its action, putting the salaries back to the old figures, with the exception of that of county clerk, the ex-officio salary of this office being reduced from \$300 per year to \$150.

The one per cent commission on all funds paid out from or paid into the county treasury, which has constituted the salary of that office, was raised to 11-4c per cent both on outgoing and incoming funds. This action was made necessary because of the fact that under the old commission the office would no longer pay now that the \$75,000 road funds has been practically used up.

Are you providing good, elevating form of amusement and recreation, such as will develop his mind in the right channels, instead of stunting his mental and moral growth? The lyceum course was arranged for by the Commercial club largely with the object in view of providing healthy and inspiring amusement at a nominal figure for the children, as well as the grown-ups.

Another thing—the school auditorium. Here is another great need that could be met with but little effort. And with an auditorium a gymnasium is not hard to provide.

These thoughts should be the subject of serious consideration by the patrons and friends of the school children of Brady. Think of all the pleasure that you can give the future citizens of McCulloch county through only a slight effort on your part.

Give the children a better chance to combat the trials of life by starting them right.

CONTEST FOR TREASURE.

Suit Involving \$423.25 Found Under House.

The following press report from Austin gives an account of a peculiar suit involving the sum of \$423.25 found when a house was torn down. Charley Wood, one of the principal figures in the case and who now has the money in his possession pending settlement of the suit, is a son of W. W. Wood of this city, and a brother of John Wood, who works at Broad Mercantile Co.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 20.—After repeated delays the trial of the so called "hidden treasure" case was taken up yesterday in the Fifty-third district court. There are no fewer than four claimants to the cans of Mexican and American coins dug up in March, 1910, by men who were removing an old house from a lot on East Fifth street, between Brazos and San Jacinto.

Charley Wood, who it appears was standing near when the treasure was unearthed by Henry Larrimore, a negro subcontractor, is alleged to have taken possession of the gold or at least part of it, and later deposited it in the American National bank pending settlement of ownership. W. B. Brush, as independent executor of the estate of S. B. Brush, who owned the property during the civil war, filed suit for the money, and later interventions were filed by Larrimore and M. Casey, who had the contract to remove the old house and level up the ground. The terms of his contract, he said, were that he should have everything he removed.

The amount deposited in the bank is said to have been \$423.25, one of the witnesses yesterday saying that this represented the contents of three cans. The testimony has developed the whereabouts of the coins contained in the other two cans.

The contention of Mr. Brush is that during the civil war he and his father were in Mexico and sent a considerable amount of money home to the family. For safekeeping during those unsettled times his mother hid the treasure under the house, and later it was lost sight of. His sister, Miss Laura Brush, testified yesterday afternoon to these circumstances, she having been present at the time.

The case is only fairly well started and will probably last a day or so longer. Lawyers in the case are as numerous, relatively, as the litigants.

THANKSGIVING TURKEYS.

About 4,000 To Be Shipped By McCully Co.

That Brady is rapidly developing into a big poultry market is evidenced by the statement of H. P. Roddie, manager of McCully Co., to the effect that the shipments of turkeys this year will exceed those of the past three years by a large amount. Already something over 2,000 dressed turkeys have been shipped since Wednesday of last week, when the dressing of the turkeys was first begun, and the output averages 250 per day. This average has been greatly exceeded the past three days. The dressing will continue in full force until Monday, the 25th, which will wind up the shipments before Thanksgiving.

In speaking with Mr. Roddie concerning the raising of turkeys, he states that a wonderful improvement in the breeding of turkeys has been noticeable since their first year of business here in 1909. At that time the average run of turkeys was seven to eight pounds, and, in fact, that average still holds good with the ordinary breed of birds. Now, however, the raising of Giant Bronze turkeys has resulted in the average of this breed running 11-12 pounds. In fact, this breed rarely falls below 10 pounds for spring turkeys, and from this weight up to 14 pounds. This latter is the banner weight so far this season, being that of a small bunch sold by Lee Shuler.

Mr. Roddie impresses upon all his patrons that the Giant Bronze is the turkey to raise, for the reasons as above outlined. The turkeys weighing above 10 pounds are much better sellers than those weighing less, and accordingly command better prices. Where the average run of ordinary turkeys will weigh from 7 to 8 pounds and bring around 75c, the average Giant Bronze will weigh 11 to 12 pounds, and bring the raiser \$1.10 or better, and one bird is as easily raised as the other.

Just how the better breeds will average up in weight in big bunches may be seen from the record of two bunches received by McCully Co. One bunch of 63 averaged 11-14 pounds, and another bunch of 72 averaged 10-14 pounds—both bunches being spring turkeys.

If you want to increase the value of your herd of turkeys by one-third, just take this advice from Mr. Roddie: "Raise the best—raise Giant Bronzes; change your gobbler every year; improve your herd instead of letting the birds decrease in size; spend a little more money for better stock, and watch your profits grow."

SOME BIG FISHING.

P. P. Phillips Sends Account From Coast Country.

P. P. Phillips, Brady's evangel of good cheer, who has torn himself away from old friends and scenes here to go down to the coast country, there to scatter his gospel among the benighted citizens, while incidentally doing artistic hand painting upon their wharves and 3-masted schooners, sends us the following clipping from the Port Aransas Post telling of the catch of a 400 pound flounder. P. P. doesn't vouch for the article, but we believe it anyway.

"The record flounder catch was made here Monday night by Edgar Dryer and Oscar Rodgers. For some time floundering has been ranking well with other methods of fishing, but the high water mark was set when Messrs. Dryer and Rodgers brought in 400 pounds; Monday night. The flounder is considered very choice fish and really has but few equals as a pan fish. They bring 5c per pound here and find a ready market.

"But few people know how flounders are caught. Fishermen find a great deal of sport in taking them. He is equipped with a spear, attached to a handle some three or four feet long and a torch which is suspended from his shoulder, and hangs close to the water. Thus equipped, he wades into the water and begins his search. Flounders are found in shallow water and under the rays of the torch they are plainly silhouetted against the white sand bottom. It then only remains to the skill of the fisherman to land his prey. As the fish are speared they are put into a bag which hangs over the back and drags in the water. A hoop holds the mouth of the bag open. It is very fascinating and many follow it for sport."
