OPERATION PERFORMED CUERO TURKEY TROT.

Monday on Constable Mann—He May Recover.


Nace Mann, constable, who was accidentally shot in the left jaw Friday while hunting in Menard county, was operated upon at St. Joseph's infirmary yesterday afternoon and was reported to be resting well late last night. It is declared that the wound, though serious, is not as bad as at first thought.

The jaw bone was broken in several places and steel plates were put in to strengthen it. A good part of the flesh on the left side of the face was shot away.

Constable Mann, in company with George Fry and T. K. Smith of the Northern Texas Traction Co., left a week ago last Saturday for Menard to spend about a week in the mountains. Several friends went out with them from Menard, among them a young man who never before had handled a gun. They were preparing to return home when the accident happened. When they started back to Menard they lost their way. Mann had killed a big buck deer and was carrying it. He became so tired that he thought he would leave it behind, as it grew heavy and the going was bad in the rough country. In a little glade two more deer came close to him, but, as he had no way to get them to town, he did not shoot them.

Mann fell in with the young man who knew nothing about guns and together they came to a steep slope. The young man went down first and turned to receive Mann's gun before he descended. It was an automatic shotgun. He must have thrown off the safety and pulled the trigger and the gun was discharged in Mann's face. The young man pulled the gun back quickly and again it exploded just in front of his coat. The young fellow then turned the gun down the slope toward a big tree and let it shoot itself out, as he didn't know how to stop it.—Fort Worth Record.

18,000 Turkeys Parade Streets—Colquitt Leads.

Cuero, Texas, Nov. 27.—People of Cuero and this vicinity witnessed a novel "turkey trot" yesterday, when 18,000 turkeys, representing as many Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners, paraded through the streets here, headed by Gov. O. B. Colquitt and his staff in full uniform. Turkeys, turkeys, and more turkeys. Buff, bronze and here and there a white turkey of dinner size in marked contrast to the thousands which swarmed ahead and behind.

In the last three days the turkeys have been driven to Cuero. Farmers have been holding their turkeys in preparation for the big event. The droves came from every direction, the largest arriving from Myersville, when Rudolph Egg arrived with 8300 birds. He has been holding his turkeys all fall. The drive from Myersville is fourteen miles and the trip to market requires thirty-six hours.

GETTING PRESS NOTICE.

Further, a foot ball game was played on Monday—was it Monday?—and the Bulletin gave some two or three columns to the reporting of it. It gave ten or fifteen lines to the reporting of the dramatic reading, and about six to the reporting of the Home Mission meetings for the week. Now, The Parson does not criticize the Bulletin; it probably gave what space it thought was needed to each of these affairs. It considered them as news items, and gave its patrons such accounts of each as it thought they would prefer. The Parson does not fight foot ball nor dramatic readings, he simply says that the sense of values is absolutely wrong side up in the minds of many people, if these indications are to read naturally.—"The Parson," in Brownwood Bulletin.

We dare say that every newspaper man has, at some time, received a complaint similar to the above. Some time, did we say? Every now and then, would be nearer correct. Everybody sees a thing of this kind from his own view-point, much as the minister wonders why everyone doesn't go to church; the editor thinks everybody ought to take his paper, and so on, ad infinitum. But the above is easily explained. The foot ball game was the event of the season—a contest where two bodies strove for supremacy—a game that calls for men with rich, red blood in their veins. As such it was deserving of more than ordinary notice. People like to read such news—it is news that the readers want. No doubt the reporter was on hand to take the event in—and then again, maybe some foot ball enthusiast offered to report it. On the other hand, the Home Mission meeting above referred to was a weekly occurrence, one that perhaps had been noted time and again before. Possibly the reporter had run out of adjectives in reporting the meetings; and again maybe no one called his particular attention to the affair. At any rate, no one who attended the meeting had enthusiasm enough to report the meeting; so, quite naturally, six lines was all that was required to tell all the reporter knew about it.

The above is offered in the same spirit in which "The Parson" made his criticism. We merely want to emphasize the fact that the newspaper man cannot be present at all affairs and all functions, but must depend upon those who do attend for information. If the party

giving the information is enthusiastic over the affair, he will inspire enthusiasm in the reporter and the result will be a good, intelligent, readable article of interest to the reading public. A live press reporter, selected from among the members, can do more to promote the interests of the club or meeting than a dozen non-interested newspaper men.

PORK OR COTTON.

The story is being told in the Texas press of two Tennessee farmers who located in East Texas several years ago, one of whom today is one of East Texas' wealthy citizens, while the other is barely eking out an existence, mortgaging his crop to tide him over from year to year. The reason for the difference in circumstances is obvious; the one has prospered in the raising of hogs, an occupation that has been sadly neglected, and the result is a fat bank roll, while the other engaged in cotton raising, an industry that is already overdone in Texas and as a result the wrong side of the ledger for him! The story points a moral which every Texas farmer should profit by and be guided accordingly. We ship out of Texas annually 3,450,000 bales of cotton, while we import 60,000,000 pounds of pork. Does it pay to raise pork or cotton?

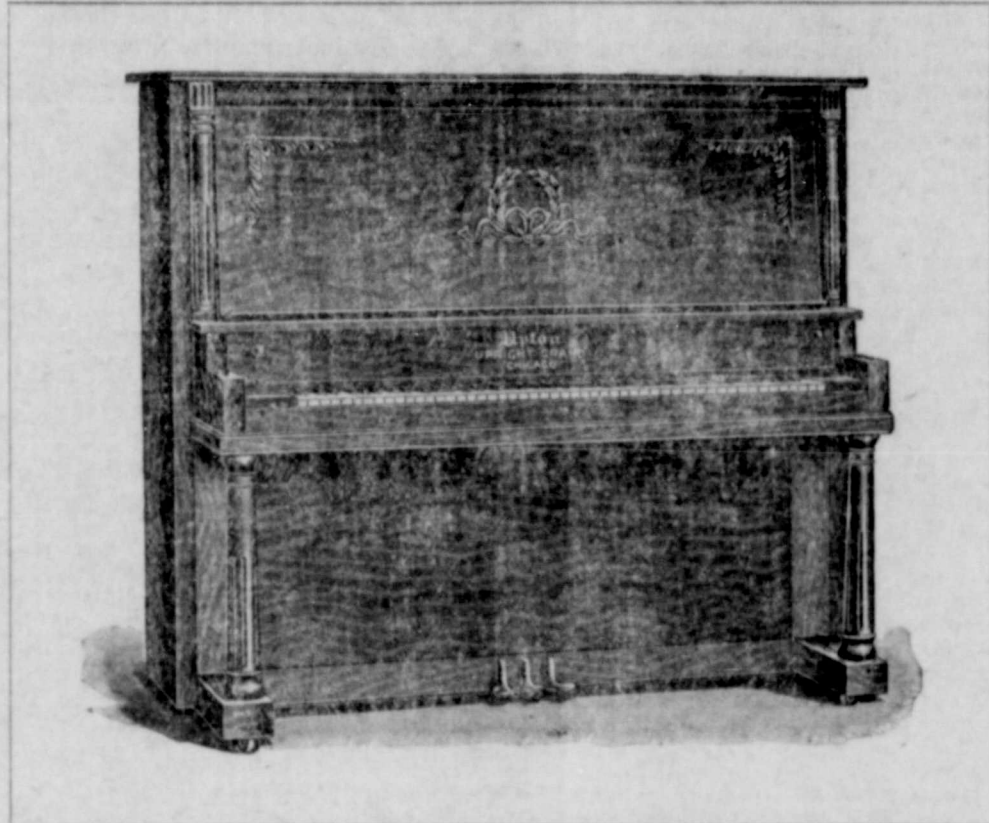

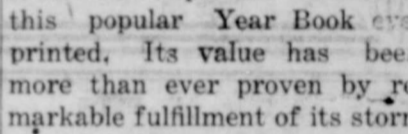

COMMERCIAL CORNER

By the Secretary.

The examining trial over the common point matter was held in Dallas last Friday and Saturday in the Federal building. Judge Harlan patiently heard both sides and the testimony was carefully taken down by a stenographer. This matter will be taken to Washington and after a careful examination before the Commission, a decision will be handed down. So far, everything looks good for us to be retained, as we think from all that we can gather, the railroads failed to show why our tariff rates should be increased. The city of Amarillo took quite an active part in the proceedings. The recent actions of that city brought on all this controversy that has cost us so much money, time and uneasiness. Amarillo claims a perfect right to be transferred from differential to common point. She claims that when certain conditions had been fixed, that the railroads would give without trouble this much desired reduction. Now, after a lapse of months and all conditions had been complied with, she is still without the rates desired. But, as she now cannot get the reduced rates, she petitions that this western division be put back with that city in order to place us all on common footing. It seems to us that it is a little selfish. But that is the condition of affairs and we will have the railroads and our "Queen City" of the Panhandle to fight for a little time.

Brady has been exceptionally blessed for many months with the absence of typhoid fever. There are several cases developing and there is much uneasiness that more will develop. It cannot spread to much extent where good, pure water is used and in the absence of all filth. Now, while our city fathers are opening up all the drains and sewers, it would be a good time for us to take notice of some of the side streets, alleys and back doors so that the trash that is accumulated there will not fill up the drains immediately. We call attention to this important matter.
