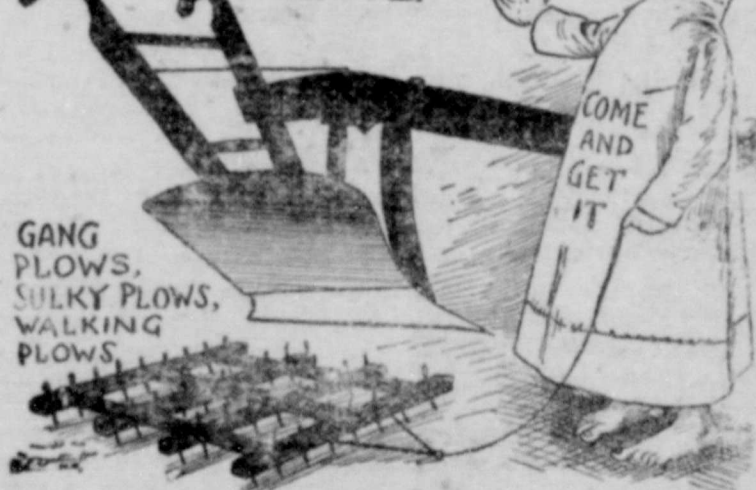

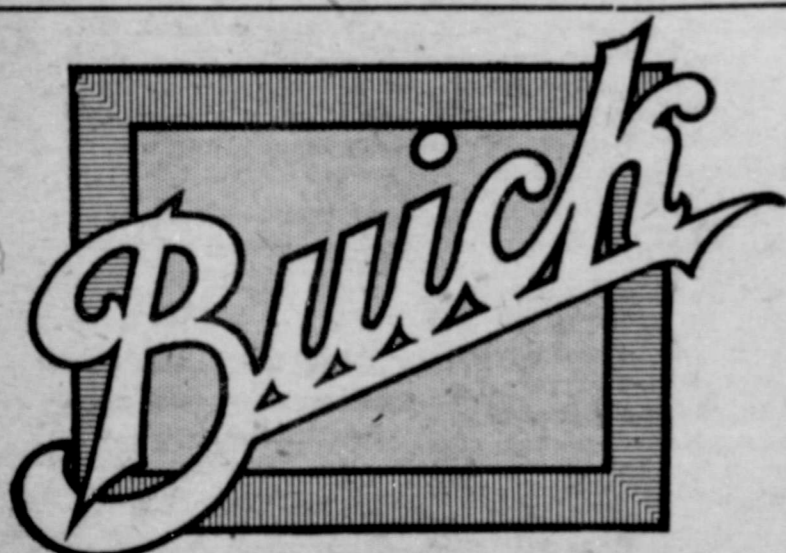

County Judge's Election Order.
Whereas, upon the petition of more than fifty legally qualified voters and freeholders in a subdivision of the following territorial limits, to-wit:

Beginning at the N. W. corner of the J. Wiel Sur. No. 481, thence in an easterly direction along section lines a distance of about six miles, being along the north lines of Surveys No. 481, 255, 493, 257 and 312; thence north to the northwest corner of the A. B. & M. Sur. No. 1; thence in an easterly direction about 2 3/4 miles to the McCulloch County and San Saba County lines, the same being along the north lines of Surveys Nos. 1, 2143 and 13; thence in a southerly direction along said McCulloch and San Saba County line to the southeast corner of McCulloch County at a point about the center of the south line of Sur. No. 2; thence west along the Mason County and McCulloch County line a distance of about 8 1/2 miles to a point on the east line of the G. Kunst Sur. No. 105 and on the west line of Survey No. 212, the same being the intersection point of the Mason and McCulloch County line with the division line of said Surveys Nos. 102 and 212; thence in a northerly direction along section lines a distance of about 4 1/2 miles to the San Saba river and being along the west lines of land patented in the name of A. E. McEuen and W. J. Noblitt and along the west line of Surveys Nos. 205, 204, 95 and 196 1/2; thence in a westerly direction about 1/2 mile along the San Saba river to the S. W. corner of Survey No. 467; thence north along section lines on the west lines of Surveys Nos. 467, 461 1/2, 249, 468, 86, 472, 473, 246, 476, 477, 243, 480 and 481 to the place of beginning; the same being and including Justice Precinct No. 2 of McCulloch County, and including Voting Precincts Nos. 4, 18 and 15 did present to the Commissioners Court in regular session, a petition in conformity with the law, praying for an election to determine whether or not horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large within said district, and,

Whereas, the Commissioners Court did, acting upon said petition, order an election held within said subdivision on Saturday, March 22, 1913, to determine whether or not horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large within said subdivision; therefore, I, Harvey Walker, County Judge of McCulloch County, Texas, hereby call said election to be held in compliance with said order of Court and that the polls shall be opened at the Voca, Lost Creek and Mt. Tabor voting precincts on Saturday, March 22, 1913, at regular hours and that the following shall be managers of election in their respective voting precincts: F. M. Hopkins, Voca precinct; J. J. Armor, Lost Creek precinct; R. L. Burns, Mt. Tabor precinct, and they shall appoint their own clerks to assist them in holding said election, and shall on or before the 10th day thereafter make due return on all votes cast at their respective voting places for and against said proposition to the County Judge.

No person shall vote at this election unless he be a freeholder in said subdivision of the county and is a qualified voter under the constitution and laws. All votes shall be by ballot and all voters desiring to prevent the animals designated in this order from running at large shall place upon their ballots the words: "For the Stock Law"; and those in favor of allowing such animals to run at large shall place upon their ballots the words: "Against the Stock Law."

It is further ordered that publication of this order be made in The Brady Standard, a newspaper published in McCulloch County, Texas, for thirty days before the date of said election. Witness my hand and seal of office at Brady, Texas, this 13th day of February, 1913.

The above figures only represent yields where accurate weights and measurements were kept. For various reasons we had to make estimates on about one-half of our demonstration plots, but these were not figured in with the above. The average yields on these plots, where estimates were made, were about like the above figures.

As to the general results obtained on the cotton demonstration plots, I would say that while the total yield was not so great, yet the per centage of gain was very gratifying.

The per centage of gain on the corn was the highest of the three crops, but is still not sufficient to make it a profitable crop.

I attribute the lowest per centage of gain of the three crops (that of milo maize) largely to poor seed, as many of the plots showed signs of very poorly selected seed, and to support my conclusion, where in one instance we had a fine test, a difference of about ten bushels was obtained where there was absolutely no other cause except the difference in the seed that was planted on each plot. I think there is a good future for the milo crop if the farmers will only heed instructions and take the little amount of pains to select their seed properly and then store them in the right way.

Figuring the total gain of cotton as per average gain per acre, we have 25,265 pounds of seed cotton or about seventeen bales. This, at \$60.00 per bale, would give an earning due to the demonstration methods, of \$1020.00; add to this the value of the increases on corn and milo maize—\$221.90, corn; \$9.40, milo maize—gives a total of \$1301.30 actual gain in the demonstration methods, not counting anything for the benefits that the co-operators obtained, of which no attempt was made to secure reports, nor anything for the educational value or what it will finally mean to the future good of the farmers of the county.

I think these facts speak for themselves and need no further comment, but I hope they will serve as an eye-opener to those who might be a little prejudiced towards the demonstration work. The little leaks often times represent the difference between profit and loss. The many little things seemingly that may cut down the yield of a few pounds or bushels per acre, does not appear hardly noticeable, but take them all together on a whole farm, or worse still, to an entire county, and only one has to make but a very few figures until the amount is climbing up into large proportions at a rapid rate.

It takes close observation and study to be a successful farmer just the same as in any other line of business where competition is keen. The farmer that keeps the best posted on modern methods is the one that succeeds best.

In conclusion, or in making this annual report, I wish to express my appreciation to those farmers who assisted me so well in carrying on the demonstration work, and did their best to carry out instructions fully. I also appreciate the assistance of the business men and teachers of the county who have contributed valuable service toward the work. This is no one man's

\$10,000 IN GOLD.

The following is the third of a series of articles appearing in The Standard in regard to the \$10,000 in prizes offered by the Texas Industrial Congress to the farmers growing the best crops during the present year.

Class E.—Irrigated Forage Crops.

For the largest yield of merchantable grain grown by irrigation to be weighed in the head at maturity, and when thoroughly dry, cost of production considered, from two acres of either kaffir corn or milo maize, (whichever the contestant prefers): First prize, \$300; second prize, \$200; and for the ten next best results, \$50 each, a total of twelve prizes in all, amounting to \$1,000.

Competition in this class is open to everybody. Women or girls are not required to do any manual labor in cultivating the crop, but are expected to supervise and manage it only.

At maturity, and when thoroughly dry, the crop must be headed, leaving shanks not more than three inches long and all of the grain must be actually weighed in the presence of two disinterested witnesses. No estimate of the yield will be accepted. This rule will be strictly adhered to in every case.

A complete record by hours of the labor necessary to make this crop must be kept and reported on blanks to be furnished for that purpose.

Cultivation of Kaffir Corn and Milo Maize Recommended.

The farmers of every section of the state are advised to raise some kaffir corn or milo maize. These plants are of the sorghum family and are drouth-resistant. They will wait for the rain and grow and mature when it comes, while corn in times of drouth will die. As food for all kinds of stock, in both grain and forage, kaffir and milo are equally as valuable as corn. Instead of planting corn, only, the Congress suggests to farmers everywhere that a fourth of their corn land should be planted in these crops as an insurance against drouth. When the farmers raise more grain and forage crops they will feed more live stock of all kinds, and the surest basis of farming is live stock.

Live Stock on the Farm.

Poultry, hogs, sheep and a cow or two, with their increase, afford a certain source of profit, and the family supply of meat, milk, butter and eggs is thus provided for at much less cost than these can be bought. Incidentally, the barnyard manure is of great value in restoring the fertility of the soil and the corn and forage sold "on the hoof" produce the biggest net returns. Every farmer is urged therefore to raise some live stock, both for home consumption and for the market.

Much attention, time and expense have been given to the matter of settling different sections of the state with farmers, but as that will adjust itself when crop conditions are favorable, the next most important matter is to secure men and money to turn our raw material into staple goods.

upon has been fixed at 350. These are open to the various clubs of the state upon certain conditions. Now let me have your attention here just a moment. In every city where factories are being located special inducements are offered. A sufficient amount of funds is regularly placed in the hands of the treasurer so that this surplus can be used to this end. You do not get much these days without working or paying for it. Good things that bring a revenue always cost something. Like advertising; that seems to cost a deal, but when it brings results it proves money well spent.

There should be a willingness upon the part of our business men to grow; and there is no way to do that unless we can get shops, factories and institutions that sustain a monthly payroll instead of a bare and pitiful existence. It is time we were showing an aggressive spirit and going after a few of these factories. Unless we can offer as good or better inducements than the other cities, we are not likely to land them. There can be no inducements offered unless our business men quit dropping out of our organization because of their inability to pay the 50c or \$1.00 monthly dues for the maintenance of our Commercial club. Some of the men who have turned down the collectors from month spend more money for cigars, tobacco

and picture shows than they do for the advancement of their own interests.

I call attention to these things because they vitally concern our present and future welfare. The very moment we stop growing, we begin to go down. It is time we were making a progressive move.

COMMISSIONERS IN SESSION THIS WEEK.

Make Reports Upon Roads, Bridges and Culverts.—Appreciate Work of Janitor.

Court allowed Tax Assessor J. A. Watkins the sum of \$100 per month for January, February, March and April, and \$50 per month thereafter for May, June, July, August and September. said allowance to be deducted from amount of remuneration allowed by law to tax assessors.

J. L. F. Burk was appointed to fill vacancy in office of Constable of Precinct No. 7.

Bids for county depository were received as follows: Brady National bank, county funds, 6.80 per cent; school fund, 3.55 per cent; Commercial National bank, county funds, 7.60 per cent; school fund, 5.60, and charge 8 per cent per annum on overdrafts, on each fund. Commercial National bank was named county depository for term of two years.

Commissioner Henry Miller, ex-officio supervisor of public roads, submitted the following report for Precinct 1: Roads—I have been over most of the roads in my precinct, and find most of them in good condition. Culverts and Bridges.—In fair condition. Mile posts and finger boards torn down or defaced.—Very few mile posts and signs at crossings on any roads in the precinct.

County Commissioner G. B. Awalt, ex-officio supervisor of public roads, submitted the following report for Precinct No. 2: I have reviewed all public roads in my precinct and find all roads in fairly good condition, and fairly well worked. I find quite a lot of the sand beds have been coated with clay, and other dirt, and a good healthy sentiment among the people for better roads. I find that some five or six road drags are badly needed; also a number of dirt beds. Very few mile posts or finger boards on any of the roads. I find one bridge or large culvert needed on Tiger Creek on Crutsinger tap road. I also find several small culverts need on various roads.

County Commissioner J. L. Smith, ex-officio supervisor of public roads, submitted following report for Precinct No. 3: I have been over the roads in my precinct and find them in very good condition; all culverts in fair condition; no money in the hands of overseers; very few mile posts on any roads; a new road is needed from Waldrip to the Taylor gate, or in other words, we have a third-class road at present, and it should be made a first-class road. We need a bridge on the Santa Anna road at the crossing of Cow creek; all overseers have worked roads.

County Commissioner H. E. McBride, ex-officio supervisor of public roads, submitted the following report for Precinct 4: I have reviewed all roads, and find some in fairly good condition; the Brownwood and Brady road is needing work, and some others are needing money expended on them; in regard to mile posts, there is but comparatively few. I find the Colorado river bridge is needing repairs, and also some culverts are needed.

The sum of \$40 was ordered paid County Attorney House for services in suit of McCulloch County vs. Francis Campbell.

Quarterly reports of County Clerk Yantis, N. G. Lyle, Justice of the Peace, Precinct No. 1, W. P. Burleson, Justice of the Peace, Precinct No. 5 and W. F. Roberts, Jr., Justice of the Peace, Precinct No. 4, were examined and approved.
