SAN SABA LOSS \$48,000.

Aggregate Insurance on Prop-
erty Estimated at \$24,000.

San Saba, Texas, March 9.—
Fire early today destroyed prop-
erty valued at between \$48,000
and \$50,000. The insurance is
estimated at \$24,000. The loss-
es included the N. R. Sloan build-
ing and the Masonic Temple.
Following are the amounts of
the losses:

N. R. Sloan, building, \$15,000;
insured for \$9,000.

Masonic Temple, \$6,500, said
to be fully covered by insurance.

insured for \$2,500.

Sloan building, \$2,000; small in-
surance.

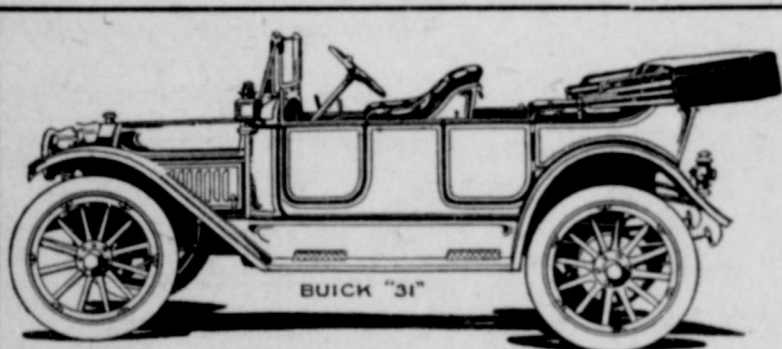

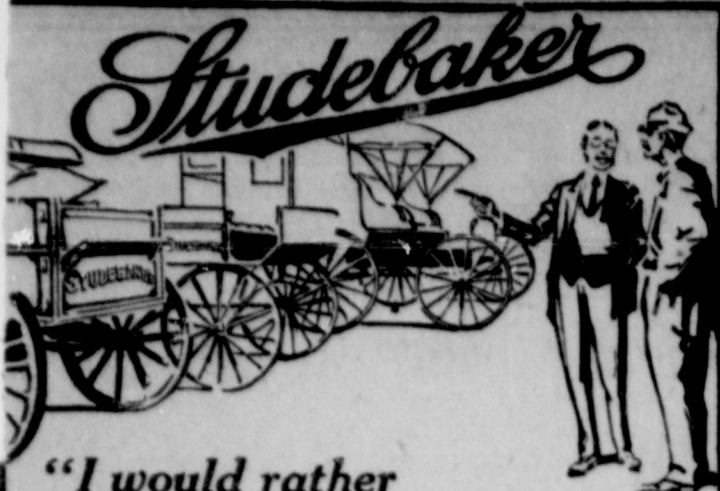

WOULD GIVE A MILLION

TOWARD DEMONSTRATING BETTER FARMING.

Col. Henry Exall, President Texas Industrial Congress, Leading in a Great Work.

J. F. Montgomery, cashier of the Brady National bank, is in receipt of an interesting communication from Col. Henry Exall, president of the Texas Industrial Congress, in response to and acknowledgment of a contribution by the former to the Congress.

When Texas history is written it will contain the name of no greater man in times of peace than that of Col. Exall, who is leading one of the greatest moves ever inaugurated for the uplifting and advancement of the people of Texas. "Smaller Farms and Better Farms" is the slogan of the organization he heads, and "A Greater Texas" is the goal.

Each year the Texas Industrial Congress offers \$10,000 in prizes for the best results obtained by farmers working under the supervision of the Congress. The Congress is not an organization for profit; it depends upon the contributions of the leading citizens of the state to further its object, and that is to promote the welfare of the citizens of the state and teach them how to increase their yields, lessen their labors and add to their comforts.

The following is the letter received by Mr. Montgomery from Col. Exall:

"It would be of vast interest to your section if you could induce a number of your farmers and farmer boys to enter the contest for milo maize or kaffir corn if for nothing else. A little personal work in connection with your county school superintendent would easily induce fifty to one hundred men and boys to enter this contest.

"If you could induce some of them to plow the land say, six inches deep, and follow the same furrow with a bull tongue not turning up any new soil, but going eight or ten inches deeper and prepare the land, plant good seed of kaffir corn or milo maize and then cultivate constantly with a sharp toothed harrow, not going more than two inches deep until the crop is absolutely made, the increased yield would astonish you.

"Of course it would have been infinitely better for this land to have been prepared last fall, so as to have saved any rain that you might have had during the fall or winter, but as you can plant kaffir corn or milo maize at any time for the next two months, it will pay splendidly to prepare that land now and when you, by these examples, demonstrate that you can so conserve the moisture by the deep preparation of the land in the first place and the constant cultivation afterwards, so as to produce profitable crops that will enable people to raise hogs, cattle and poultry for their own use and a surplus to sell, the benefits to be derived will be incalculable.

"We will gladly send just as many blanks to you as you will need. It is certainly worth while in the direct returns this year, independent of its future benefits, to get busy and start a lot of these people to work.

"I wish I was worth a million, not just to own a million, but that I might spend \$50,000 to \$100,000 of it annually for the balance of the years of my life making demonstrations in every neighborhood in the state that would show the people that need it most the way by which they

could live better, be more prosperous and happy.

"Thanking you for your contribution and in advance for any work along this line for general betterment that you may be able to do, I am, with kindest personal regards,"

Mr. Montgomery is anxious to enlist farmer boys in the work, and with this object in view, has requested the Industrial Congress to forward him 100 application blanks, and 500 pieces of literature, the latter for distribution among those interested. His plan is to send the literature out to the farmers along with a statement of their bank account, and in this manner place the same in the homes where it may be read at leisure.

He has also enlisted the assistance of County School Superintendent E. L. White and The Brady Standard in the work of interesting McCulloch county citizens, and would be pleased to have farmers and farmer boys to call on him at the bank if interested, or if they wish to make application for entrance in the contest.

At present he has about thirty head of Jerseys and they are doing splendidly upon the grass and weeds. He finds a ready market for his milk and cream at the Brownwood creamery. Mr. Ware was accompanied by Messrs. F. F. Willis and A. Lewis who are drilling one of the wells at Mercury. They report good progress being made in drilling, a depth of 1,030 feet having been reached, with splendid indications of oil and gas, and are confident that they will be able to bring in a good well within a few weeks.

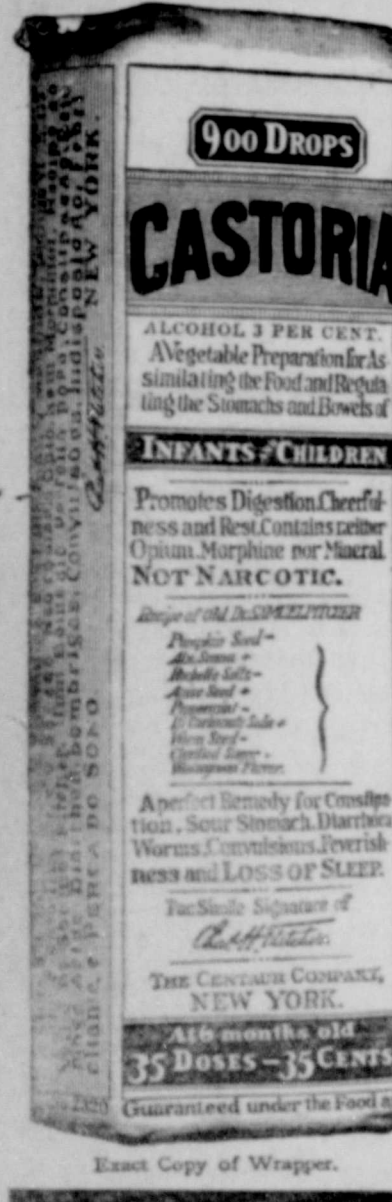

THE DICTAPHONE.

A Wonderful Machine—Have You Seen It?

The dictaphone does entirely away with the use of short hand in a business office, or wherever used, in the dictation of a letter to a stenographer. The machine is operated by electric motor, and may be started, stopped, made to repeat, run fast or slow at the will of the operator.

POULTRY DEPARTMENT

S. J. Striegler, secretary of the McCulloch County Poultry Association, has consented to furnish items of interest to poultry raisers through these columns each week. Hints and suggestions of benefit to poultrymen will be appreciated by the editor of The Brady Standard at any time, and will be included in these columns.

To begin a short column on Poultry to be edited by and for The McCulloch County Poultry Association, I would first attempt to discuss a few points of common interest: "Pure Breeds, a Profitable Business" and "System of Breeding."

As I size up the situation, the most difficult thing to persuade the average farmer to do is to make a start with better poultry—namely, to get him to exchange his scrubs and dung-hills for pure-bred stuff. One of the dullest tools on the average farm or town lot today is this same dung-hill poultry. No sane or thinking person in any walk of life would think of going into fruit growing or producing with an orchard of, say, apple seedling trees. The matter of varieties or improved varieties would be his first thought. So it should be with his chickens. It is not quite as easy as it may seem for a farmer to get the kind of pure bred poultry that he wants and needs. Much poultry breeding is for mere external points, such as feather markings, exactness of combs, head marks, beak and shank colorings, and so on. Many of the best breeders lose trace of the great internal points of heavy laying and early development. The best breeders of the entire country owe it to themselves and to their business to make strenuous efforts to produce still better utility pure breeds. There is an enormous field among our farmers open for this work.

A poultry farm or plant, rightly conducted, operated by a man or woman with reasonably good horse sense and judgment, will pay as well as any business, and better, considering the same amount of investment. There are thousands and thousands of people in this great land of ours making money, besides a comfortable living, raising poultry.

The greatest trouble we find with people raising poultry today is the lack of system in their breeding.

Careful breeding and selection is necessary to make a success of poultry raising. Select and mate individuals that have come up to a certain standard of egg production, or size rather than from the entire flock, as most people are inclined to do at the present time. The application of the laws of breeding is essential to success with any kind of livestock. This important matter is too often overlooked, and as a result many failures are recorded that otherwise could have been listed under the head of success.
