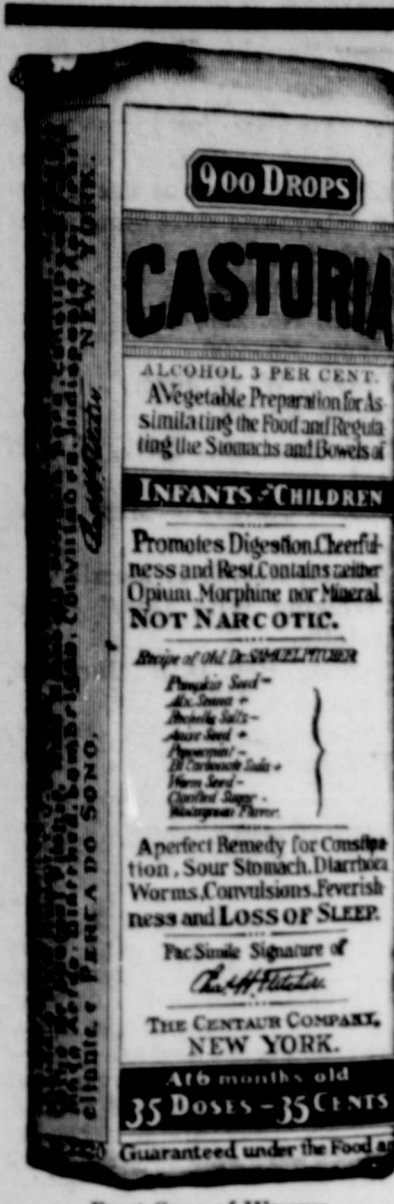

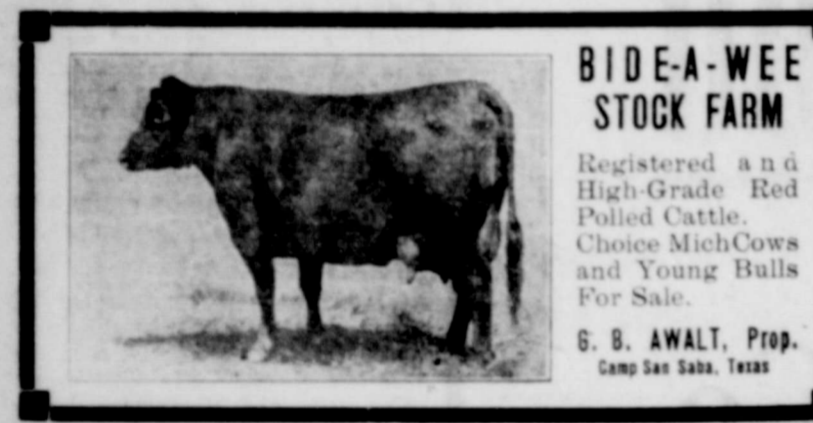

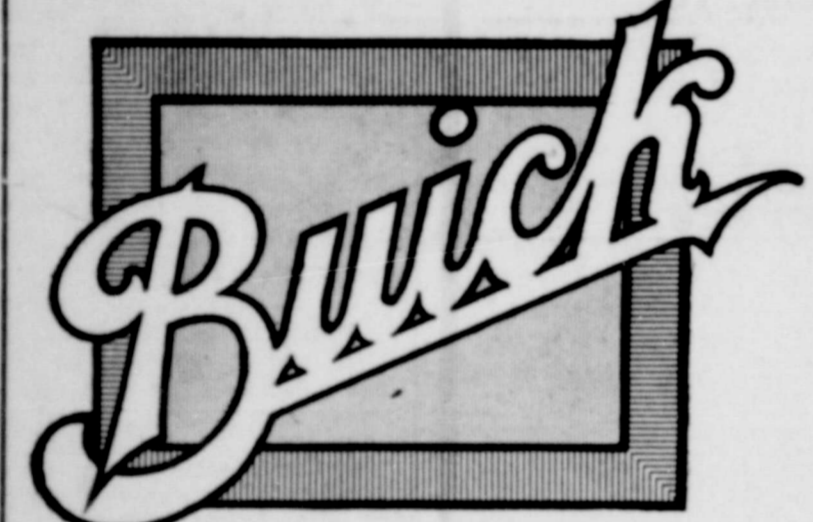

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PRESCRIBING QUALIFICATIONS FOR DISTRICT JUDGES OF THIS STATE AND PRESCRIBING THEIR TENURE OF OFFICE.

(S. J. R. No. 1.) A Joint Resolution. Amending Section 7, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the creation and formation of judicial districts, the terms of compensation and qualification of the judges of the district courts, and the times of holding court. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7, Article 5, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: Section 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a general election, one or more judges, each of whom shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall have been a practicing lawyer of this State, or a judge of a court in this State for six years next preceding his election; who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two years next preceding his election; who shall reside in his district during his term of office; who shall hold his office for a period of four years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary of three thousand dollars, until otherwise changed by law. Court shall be held by a district judge at the county seat in each of the several counties at such times and in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall provide for the holding of the district court when the judge thereof is absent, disabled or disqualified from acting. The district judges who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the 19th day of July, 1913, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment of Section 7, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to district judges and district courts," and all voters opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment of Section 7, Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to district judges and district courts."

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated to pay expenses for carrying out the provisions of this resolution. (A true copy.) JOHN L. WORTHAM, Secretary of State.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING ALL STATE, DISTRICT, COUNTY AND PRECINCT OFFICERS WITHIN THIS STATE SHALL BE COMPENSATED BY THE PAYMENT OF A FIXED SALARY.

(H. J. R. No. 41.) A Joint Resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State by adding to Article 16 thereof a new section to be known as Section 58 providing for the tenure and compensation of public officials. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there be added to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be known as Section 58, which shall read as follows:

Section 58. All State, district, county and precinct officers within the State of Texas shall hereinafter be compensable by the payment of a salary to be fixed as provided for by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State will, as directed by the Constitution, make publication of this proposed amendment in the manner and for the time as required by the Constitution, the amendment to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature of this State at the general election to be held for State officers on July 19, 1913, the returns of which shall, as provided for in the Constitution, be made to the Secretary of State, the result ascertained and proclamation made as provided for in Section 1, Article 17, of the Constitution. There shall be written or printed on the ballots to be used at such election "for the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution providing a salary compensation for certain officers and fixing term of office at four years;" and "against the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution providing a salary compensation for certain officers and fixing their term of office at four years;" and those favoring the adoption of said amendment shall erase the language "Against the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution, providing a salary compensation for certain officers and fixing their term of office at four years;" by running a pencil or pen through the same, and those opposing the adoption of said amendment shall erase the language "for the adoption of Section 58, Article 16, as an amendment to the Constitution, providing a salary compensation for certain officers and fixing their term of office at four years;" by running a pencil or pen through the same.

Section 3. The sum of five thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution, to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation and election. (A true copy.) JOHN L. WORTHAM, Secretary of State.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE NECESSARY BUILDINGS FOR THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AND ALSO FOR BUILDINGS OF VARIOUS INSTITUTIONS, AND AUTHORIZING IMPROVEMENT BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF NAVIGATION, IRRIGATION, CONSTRUCTION OF BRIDGES AND THE MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF PUBLIC WAREHOUSES.

(S. J. R. No. 18.) Senate Joint Resolution proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds and the levying of a tax to pay the interest and sinking fund on same for public improvements.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows, to-wit: Section 49. No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasion, suppress insurrection and defend the State in war or pay existing debts, and no debt created to supply deficiencies in current revenues shall ever exceed in the aggregate at any one time five hundred thousand dollars. The Legislature, however, shall have power to authorize the issuance of bonds to be approved by the Governor for the purpose of purchasing additional ground and erect necessary buildings for the University of Texas, including a medical department, an Agricultural and Mechanical College and all departments and activities of a complete university of the first class. The revenue received from the permanent University fund shall be available for the payment of interest on these bonds and for the redemption at maturity and the Legislature shall also have power to issue bonds for the construction of necessary buildings for State institutions. The Legislature shall also have power to authorize the issuance of bonds secured by lien on the real property of the penitentiary system to be approved by the Governor for the purpose of constructing buildings and making permanent improvements.

Section 52. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include towns, villages, or municipal corporations, upon a vote of a majority of the resident taxpayers voting thereon, who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts they may issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay interest thereon, and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes, to-wit:

(a) The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes. (b) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation or in aid thereof. (c) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof. (d) The construction, maintenance and operation of public warehouses for storing, handling, classing, measuring, weighing, elevating and loading agricultural products. Provided the Legislature may establish such means and agencies as may be necessary for accomplishing the purpose of this amendment and if a State warehouse commission be provided for, their term of office shall be fixed by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified electors of the State of Texas on the third Saturday in July, same being the 19th day of said month, and the amendments proposed to Section 52 of Article 3, as above indicated, shall be voted upon separately. Those favoring the amendment to authorize road or other public improvements by a majority vote, shall have written or printed on their ballot: For amendment to authorize road and other public improvements by a vote of a majority, and those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot: Against amendment to authorize road and other public improvements by a vote of a majority. Those favoring the issuance of bonds for the construction of public warehouses shall have written or printed on their ballot: For the amendment authorizing the issuance of bonds for the construction of public warehouses for agricultural products. Those voting against said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot: Against the amendment authorizing the issuance of bonds for the construction of public warehouses for agricultural products.

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution, to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation and election. (A true copy.) JOHN L. WORTHAM, Secretary of State.

The foregoing amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection at a special election hereby ordered for the third Saturday in July, 1913, the same being the 19th day of said month. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: For amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas, Agricultural and Mechanical College, State Penitentiary System, and other public improvements and building of warehouses for agricultural products. Those voting against its adoption shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: Against amendment to Sections 49 and 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for the University of Texas, Agricultural and Mechanical College, State Penitentiary System, and other public improvements and building of warehouses for agricultural products.

Previous to the election the Secretary of State shall cause to be printed and forwarded to the County Judge of each county, for use in said election, a sufficient number of ballots for the use of voters in each county on which he shall have printed the form of the ballot herein prescribed,

for the convenient use of the voters. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any fund in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publishing said proclamation and printing of tickets and necessary blanks to use in said election. (A true copy.) JOHN L. WORTHAM, Secretary of State.

E. corner of Wilhelm Junker Survey No. 1065, thence west one mile to N. W. corner of said survey. Thence north-west along the northern line of H. & T. C. Survey No. 141 to the N. E. corner of Cosper Schuren Survey No. 1192, a distance of about one mile. Thence N. one-half mile to the center of east line of J. D. Mitchell Survey No. 142. Thence south along the west line of J. H. Nix Survey No. 1051 to the S. W. corner of said survey. Thence S. E. about one mile to the S. E. corner of said Survey No. 1051. Thence north one-half mile to the N. E. corner of said survey. Thence east one mile along south line of Survey No. 1052 to the S. E. corner of said survey. Thence north five miles along the east line of Surveys Nos. 1052, 1053, 155, 1058, 15, 1064 and 1065 to the place of beginning; the same being and including Lohn Common School District No. 13 did present to the Commissioners Court in regular session, on April 14, 1913, a petition in conformity with the law, praying for an election to determine whether or not horses, mules, jacks, Jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large within said district, and

Whereas, the Commissioners Court did, acting upon said petition, order an election held within said subdivision on Saturday, May 24, 1913, to determine whether horses, mules, jacks, Jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large within said subdivision; therefore, I, Harvey Walker, County Judge of McCulloch County, Texas, hereby call said election to be held in compliance with said order of court and that the polls shall be opened at the Lohn voting precinct on Saturday, May 24, 1913, at regular hours and the following shall be manager of said election: W. F. Roberts, Sr., and he shall appoint his own clerks to assist him in holding said election, and shall on or before the tenth day thereafter make due return on all votes cast at said place for and against said proposition to the County Judge.

No person shall vote at this election unless he be a freeholder of the county and is a qualified voter under the constitution and laws. All votes shall be by ballot, and all voters desiring to prevent the animals designated in this order from running at large shall place upon their ballots the words: "For the Stock Law"; and those in favor of allowing such animals to run at large shall place upon their ballots the words: "Against the Stock Law."

It is further ordered that publication of this order be made in The Brady Standard, a newspaper published in McCulloch County, Texas, for thirty days before the date of said election. Fine Rain at Lightner.

F. W. Henderson was here Monday from his ranch and stated that the rain throughout the Lightner community was a splendid one, filling most all the tanks, and coming in just the right time to save the oats, some of which was beginning to die. Mr. Henderson has 75 acres of fall oats and 100 acres of spring oats, besides 75 acres of volunteer, and all of it is looking fine since the rain, causing him to wear his most optimistic smile. With a few more opportune rains Mr. Henderson believes we can be assured of an oat crop this year—and by an oat crop he means from 50 to 100 bushels to the acre. He recalls the crop made by S. S. Graham on his place three miles from Brady just a few years back averaging 80 bushels to

the acre, and says the same amount can be produced most anywhere in the county under proper conditions.

The rain half way filled a large tank just below Mr. Henderson's house, and he declares it takes a whopping rain to fill it. Once last year the water ran around the tank, and the supply lasted him just about a year.

In addition to the oats he has 150 acres of milo maize and kafir corn, and while he has no cotton planted, he expects to begin at once to put in 250 acres.

AN ORDINANCE.

Requiring Railroads to Place Lights on Street Crossings.
 Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Brady: That hereafter all railway companies operating trains on or across any public street within the corporate limits of said city at night, shall, when requested so to do by the city council, keep suspended on some suitable device to be approved by said council on each side of such streets at each crossing of their track a light each of not less than 100 watt consumption per hour, to be lighted and kept lighted and in good order during all hours of the night.

Any railway company who shall operate or be concerned in operating any train of cars within the corporate limits of this city in violation of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction therefor, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, and each and every night that the above ordinance is violated shall constitute a separate offense.

That this ordinance take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.
