himself and $C$. himself and C. M. Coonrod at
Fife.
I take this means of calling the matter to the attention of
the farmers all over the county, the farmers all over the county,
so that they may examine their millet patch to see if they also can find this weed. It is a herbaceous plant of a spiny character. More strictly, it belongs to the species of carduus. It is a rather composite herb with very spiny leaves and countless numbers of tiny thorns or stick-
ers, which makes it very difers, which makes to handle or thresh small grain where this herb abounds. They produce seed very rapidly, and at the same time have an abundance of small roots, from whence they reproduce if a very small piece of root is left in the ground.
Briefly speaking, this is a
very mean and dreaded weed very mean and dreaded weed,
and when once started there is hardly any means of getting hardly any means of getting
rid of the pest. It has been known to destroy thousands of acres in mote humid climates. As this seed came up rather quickly in this particular patch, it is evident that the seed were mixed in with the millet ser the origin of which I have been able to find.
I will leave a few of t.
