BRADY WINS HONORS.

In Odd Fellow and Rebekah Convention at Brownwood.

The delegation of Brady Odd Fellows and Rebekahs in attendance upon the eighth annual convention of the District Odd Fellows association at Brownwood Wednesday and Thursday of last week with one accord voice their approval of the hospitality of the Brownwood citizens upon this occasion. Brownwood never put forth greater effort to entertain her guests, and never entertained more successfully.

On their part, the Brady bunch was distinguished by the excellent work of the Ruthel Degree staff, and but for the fact that they were graded down because of unfamiliarity with the contest rules, they would have won the association medal. The Brady lodge had been organized but four months and contested with the Comanche and Brownwood teams, the former being acknowledged one of the strongest in the state, and at one time winner of the state medal.

The following is a report of the proceedings of the convention:

Upon arrival at Brownwood, the delegation was met by the entertainment committee, who assigned homes for all.

The association opened at 10 a. m., June 25th, with nearly every lodge in the district represented. Mr. Tom Leach welcomed the visitors, and was responded to by Mrs. Anna White of Brady, upon behalf of the Rebekahs. Mrs. Watson made the welcome address on behalf of the Rebekahs of Brownwood. The association adjourned for noon, and in the afternoon the regular program was taken up.

On Wednesday night the degree staffs of Brady, Brownwood and Comanche Rebekahs contested for the association medal, which was won by the Comanche team, Comanche making 98, Brady 85 and Brownwood 60 points. However the Brady team carried off two medals on being perfect in the ritualistic work.

On Thursday the programme was taken up, and the election of officers resulted in the selection of Mr. Tom Leach of Brownwood as president; Mrs. Carroll of Comanche and Mrs. Shropshire of Brady as vice presidents. Miss Dora Palmer of Comanche was re-elected secretary. Coleman was selected for the next meeting, which will be on the last Wednesday and Thursday in June, 1914.

Thursday night was devoted to contesting in the different charges of the Rebekah lodge, and the staffs of Bangs and Comanche Odd Fellows of the first degree contesting for the medal, which was won by Comanche by four points.

Mrs. Lizzie Hodges carried off the gold medal and a cut glass bowl for being perfect in her charges, and Mrs. J. E. Shropshire carried off the gold medal for being perfect in her charge.

The visitors cannot have too much praise for the good people of Brownwood, as they showed them one continuous round of pleasure from the time they arrived to the time they left. It is a rare thing to be entertained as they entertained the visitors.

FARM HANDS NEEDED.

From every part of McCulloch county is raised the cry of "help needed." The abundant rains of the past number of weeks has put a big start on the weeds as well as upon the crops, and there is urgent need of cotton choppers and farm hands upon every farm in the county. And with the continued good rains, this need is increasing daily.

Not only are laborers in urgent demand right at present, but they will be in even greater demand later on in the season when harvesting time rolls around. Government aid has been offered in securing help, and this idea has been enthusiastically received on the part of most of the farmers. Yet co-operation is needed, and there are a number of requirements to be met which mean both time and expense. Consequently it is absolutely urgent that immediate steps be taken to secure such help as can be had and taken care of in order that they may be sent here in time to be of service. Everyone who is interested in this proposition should place himself in communication with the secretary of the Commercial club at once, and make the necessary application. The immigrants offered are a desirable class as a whole, and nationality may be specified by the party requiring the labor.

Another plan is offered by Hub Meers. Mr. Meers recently had forty negroes rounded up in Temple to be sent to Brady, but while he was at the sanitarium with his son, the negroes drifted away into the pool rooms and nearby dives, and when he returned but eight had kept faith with him. Mr. Meers states that there are any number of idle blacks in Temple, and if a couple of white men would go to Temple they could secure any quantity of hands, provided they would keep them in close charge until time for the train to leave. The negro is not a desirable class of citizen, but he has proven his worth in times when he was the last resource—and this is apparently what confronts the citizens of McCulloch county now.

The two courses are respectfully submitted to the citizens of the county. Choose ye between them.

MORE NEGROES.

Fifteen Husky Blacks Arrive From Temple Sunday.

Fifteen negroes arrived over the Santa Fe Sunday afternoon from Temple and were at once taken in charge by farmers in need of cotton choppers and farm hands in general. East Sweden and Whiteland farmers were the fortunate ones in this particular instance, and the blacks were given no time to go astray, but were hustled from the train into the waiting farm wagons and driven forthwith to the country.

The negroes were secured as a result of the activities of Hub Meers while in Temple recently. Mr. Meers received a telegram for a colored employment agency at Temple asking that he forward twenty-five tickets at once. Mr. Meers placed the matter in the hands of Drs. Anderson and McCall, who had the tickets sent, and who arranged the distribution of the negroes upon their arrival.

WOOL SHIPMENTS.

Eight Cars Out of Brady Within a Week.

H. P. Roddie & Co. are shipping their wool to Boston market as rapidly as it can be handled. Last Thursday four car loads were shipped from here, and this week two more will be loaded out of Brady, while the Sellman wool, amounting to a car load, will be shipped from Sellman, and another car load will be loaded out at the Gibbons ranch. These shipments are supplemented by the car load purchased by Mr. Roddie last week at Talpa in Coleman county, and purchases made in other parts of the state.

Pros Win Election by Majority of 32.

Mason county went dry Saturday last by a majority of 32 votes. The town of Mason itself, which usually went wet by several hundred majority, gave the anti a majority of but 11 votes.

It is said that prohibition will go into effect on the 11th of July, at which time the licenses of the liquor dealers expire.

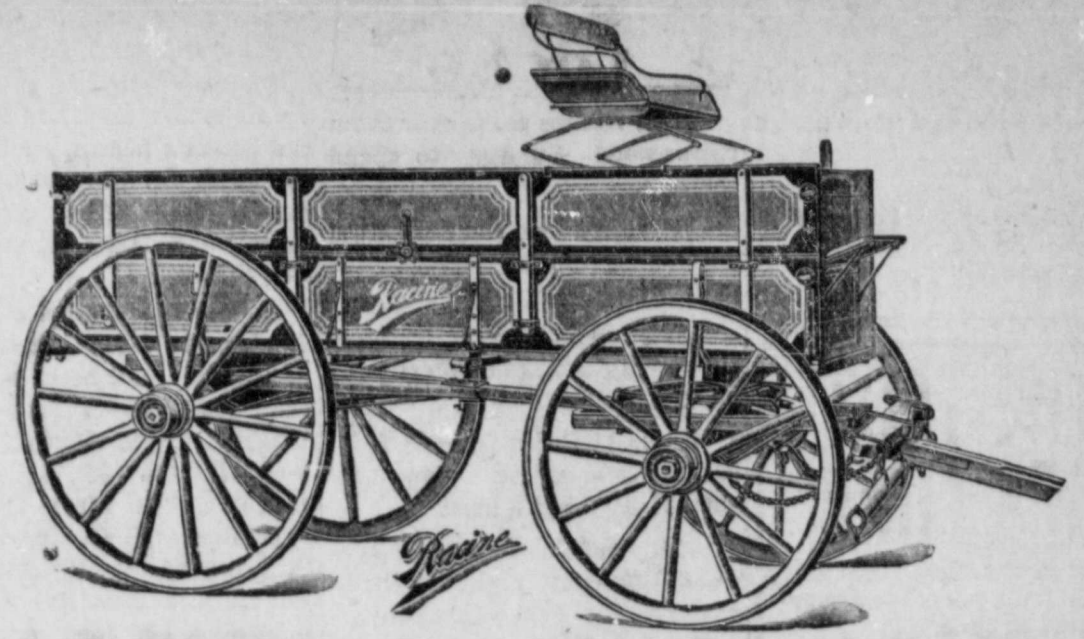
