

Young, Coker Have Best Crop Yields

Cooper Young and Gary Coker of Lazbuddie were recognized Monday night at a county-wide 1960 crops award program for having the top cotton and grain sorghum yields.

Both lads are 4-H club members and were winners of county-wide contests sponsored by the Parmer County Cotton Growers Association and the Parmer County Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

The awards were presented during a joint 4-H and FFA program at the Hub Community

Young won the cotton contest with a lint yield of 1,248 pounds per acre on a patch of Austin. He received a plaque, a blue ribbon and a cash prize of \$40.

Coker won the grain sorghum contest with a yield of 8,773 pounds per acre on a patch of Amak R-12. He also received a plaque, a blue ribbon and a cash prize of \$40.


