



MIKE L. WOODS MISSING. ACCOUNTS SHORT.

National Bank-Once Cashier of a Bank in Brady.

citizens is the announcement in Angeles early this summer. El- tion." the Fort Worth daily papers Wednesday of the discovery of a shortage of \$25,165 in the accounts of Mike L. Woods, active vice president of the State National bank of Fort Worth. Mr. Woods was one of the organizers and held the position of cashier with the First National bank of Brady, which institution became defunct in May, 1903. At that time the books of the bank were said to have been in good shape, but the entire \$50,000 capital stock of the bank had been misappropriated and Woods was accused of loaning the money to his friends and appropriating part of it to his own use. Fourteen indictments were returned against him, the indictments pending some five years or more. In the meantime many of the witnesses had died or moved away, and the cases against Woods were finally drop-

From Brady Woods went directly to Fort Worth, entering the employ of the First National bank to which institution he was said to be involved to the extent of about \$5,000. For the past twenty years he had been with that institution, climbing up the ladder of success until he reached the position of active vice president. The following story reprinted from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram tells the story of his latest supposed defalcations:

"A shortage of \$25,000 has tional bank.

"The shortage is in the State National's accounts with other banks and apparently is in the accounts of Mike L. Woods, active vice president, who handled these accounts for the State National through the clearing house association.

"Woods is in California where he went three weeks ago on what was to have been a two weeks' vacation. Efforts to locate him by wire have failed.

"The shortage was discovered two weeks ago during a periodical audit and reported to the American Bankers Association, of which the State National is a member, and the Burns Detective Agency, which handles cases for this association, was detailed at once to investigate.

"Officials of the bank, when asked Tuesday morning of the report of a shortage were true. frankly admitted that an apparent shortage of \$25,000 had been found in the accounts of Mr. Woods, but that they were hopeful he would return and could explain satisfactorily.

"Woods is one of the oldest officials in the State National. He has been connected with the bank for twenty years, having started as a bookkeeper and risen to the office of active vice president. He always had been regarded highly by officials of the bank. He has been a conspicuous religious worker and is a steward in the Central Methodist church.
