He takes pride in his store and his stock, and he is not averse to calling the attention of the public through every legitimate means. He figures that the show window will sell and display the new styles, new garments and new novelties to those who chance to pass his place of business, while the newspaper reaches out and attracts the attention of those folks who do not have the opportunity to study the displays but who are interested in the store news nevertheless.

Up-to-date business enterprise and newspaper advertising go hand in hand. They are inseparable—and in their judicious combination lies the key to the door of success.

Duck Shooting Now Unlawful.

A new federal law preventing the shooting of wild ducks in the United States has gone into effect. The law was passed by the late congress and was signed, and the signing of the bill was one of the last acts of the former President Taft. This is known to very few, even among the regulars who annually shoot ducks.

Notwithstanding the fact that state codes may specify what the season shall be, these are null and void insofar as they relate to ducks and geese, a new federal statute making it an offense to shoot any of these fowls, according to Washington reports. Relative to the new law, a Washington correspondent says:

"Hereafter it will be a crime to kill a wild duck anywhere in the United States. Wild ducks are now classified as migratory birds in a law just enacted, and a fine of \$100 and ninety days' imprisonment are provided for a violation of the law.

"For a long time there was no agitation in favor of federal legislation for the protection of game fowls, to prevent their complete extinction. It has been said that wild turkeys, wild geese and some of the other wild fowls have almost entirely disappeared all over the country. Wild ducks have become scarce and wild pigeons have disappeared, the only wild pigeons known in the country today being in the zoo at Cincinnati.

"So the government put a bill through congress as an order of the sundry civil appropriation bill to prohibit the killing of migratory birds and those which do not spend the entire year in one state, but which move from the north in the fall to the south and from the south to the north in the spring.

"Since the federal law has been passed the states cannot do anything to change the law. They cannot make duck shooting legal."—Brownwood Bulletin.

REPORT OF GRAND JURY.

General Conditions of County Good—Few Violations.

The following is the report of the grand jury which adjourned Saturday:

To the Hon. John W. Goodwin, District Judge of the District Court of McCulloch County, Texas.

We have the honor to submit to you the following report:

We, the grand jury for the September term of the District court of McCulloch county, have had a great number of witnesses before us on various alleged violations of the law, and have taken each matter up that has been called to our attention, and in each instance where we considered we had sufficient evidence have found indictments all of returned to your honor.

We find that the gambling law is being violated, and in some instances we have been unable to get testimony in these violations on account of absence of witnesses from the county on some pretext or another.

We find that many times matters are reported to the grand jury to be investigated which result only in putting other people to a great deal of trouble and expense without any profit to the county and which, when investigated, prove to have no foundation at all, and such matters only take up the time of the grand jury to no benefit. We merely mention this so that in future our citizens will be more careful in taking up the time of future grand juries in matters that they know there is no foundation to base a charge upon, and the taking up of which hinders the grand jury in the investigation of actual violations of the law.

The district and county attorneys have ably assisted us in our work, all of which is very much appreciated by us.

We find the general condition of the county fairly good, with few cases of stealing. We find with regard to the violations of the gambling law that there is a tendency to perjury on the part of some witnesses which future grand juries should look into more fully.

We have now completed our work and ask to be discharged. Very respectfully submitted, A. C. BAZE, Foreman.

W. E. Selman and wife returned from Brady Saturday where they had been on a visit to Mr. Selman's father.

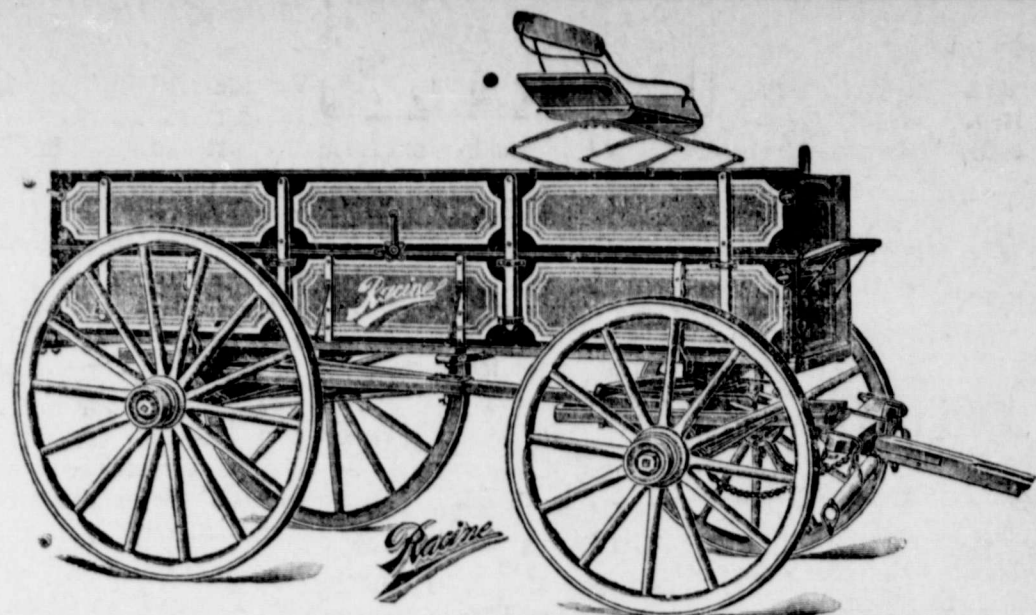
