

BIGGEST RAIN IN YEARS

THIRTY HOURS' STEADY DOWNPOUR THIS WEEK.

Total Reached 4.3 Inches at Noon Yesterday-Total for the Year Is 23.10 Inches.

Undoubtedly the most remarkable rain on record in years fell this week in Brady, and up to noon yesterday the downfall had totaled 4.3 inches. The rain was not only remarkable for the amount of the precipitation but for duration as well, it having begun falling about 3:00 o'clock Tuesday, and continuing almost unabated up to noon yes-

Following a cloudy and sultry period, the rain fell in sheets for a time Tuesday afternoon, and then settled down to a steady, unbroken downpour, at times falling fast and again slowly, but continuing practically without letup until Thursday noon. Up to Wednesday night the bank rain guage showed three inches of precipitation, and the rain of Wednesday night amounted to 1.3 inches. The weather continues cloudy and threatening, and indications point to more rain. East of town and in Brady rain is falling again as this is written late Thursday afternoon.






