IN GOVERNOR'S RACE.

Will H. Mayes Will Accept No Campaign Contributions.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 27.—Lieut. Gov. Will H. Mayes of Brown county today announced as candidate for the democratic nomination for governor of Texas. One unusual innovation in his announcement is that he will not accept campaign contributions from any source whatever. He comes out flatfootedly as a local optionist and Statewide prohibitionist.

Mr. Mayes' entry is the second from the prohibition camp, the other having been Controller W. P. Lane, who, when apprised of Gov. Mayes' announcement, expressed satisfaction and predicted the victory of himself at the primary next July.

Lieut. Gov. Mayes is acting governor for some thirty days during the absence of Gov. Colquitt in Panama, which explains the issuance of his announcement from Austin. He is owner and editor of the Brownwood Bulletin. As lieutenant governor he has received many compliments from all over the state. He was elected lieutenant governor by approximately 100,000 and that without leaving his home or campaigning at all.

Ex-Senator W. A. Hanger of Tarrant county and Speaker Chester Terrell of San Antonio are avowed candidates from the anti clan, while State Senator John G. Willacy has the bee, and friends are trying to push Sam Sparks into the race. That would make four antis and two pros running, but there is plenty of time for the list to grow.

BIGGEST RAIN IN YEARS

THIRTY HOURS' STEADY DOWNPOUR THIS WEEK.

Total Reached 4.3 Inches at Noon Yesterday—Total for the Year Is 23.10 Inches.

Undoubtedly the most remarkable rain on record in years fell this week in Brady, and up to noon yesterday the downfall had totaled 4.3 inches. The rain was not only remarkable for the amount of the precipitation but for duration as well, it having begun falling about 3:00 o'clock Tuesday, and continuing almost unabated up to noon yesterday.

Following a cloudy and sultry period, the rain fell in sheets for a time Tuesday afternoon, and then settled down to a steady, unbroken downpour, at times falling fast and again slowly, but continuing practically without letup until Thursday noon. Up to Wednesday night the bank rain gauge showed three inches of precipitation, and the rain of Wednesday night amounted to 1.3 inches. The weather continues cloudy and threatening, and indications point to more rain. East of town and in Brady rain is falling again as this is written late Thursday afternoon.

The first day's rain appears to have covered only a section of country in the immediate vicinity of Brady, and extending from Rochelle, San Saba and Richland Springs south through Brady and down as far as Mason. Cotton picking, it is said, continued uninterrupted in the Stacy neighborhood until late Wednesday afternoon, and the Fife and Waldrip communities report only a misting rain up to Wednesday evening when rain began falling harder. Even three miles north of Brady comparatively no rain was had until Wednesday night.

However, all parts of the county and surrounding territory appear to have been covered by this time, the West Texas Telephone Co. reporting good rains Wednesday night at the following places: Stacy, Fife, Waldrip, Lohn, Brownwood, Coleman, Eden, Melvin, Pasche, besides those places visited by Tuesday's rain.

While the rain will damage cotton to more or less extent, and reduce the grade, it is hailed with pleasure by the stock farmers, as it assures abundant stock water and grass, besides being fine for fall oats and feed crops.

Meanwhile cotton picking is at a standstill, and the gins remain idle waiting for the weather to clear so that cotton can begin moving again.

DUCK KILLING LAWFUL.

Advices U. S. Government Authority at Washington.

In response to an inquiry directed to U. S. government authorities at Washington, Messrs. Anderson & Moffatt are in receipt of advice to the effect that the report that duck killing in Texas was illegal is an error.

The following is a copy of the letter received by Anderson & Moffatt from T. S. Palmer, assistant chief Biological Survey of the U. S. Bureau of Agriculture at Washington:

"In reply to your letter of September 25th, I beg to say that the report that ducks cannot be killed for a year in Texas is an error. Under separate cover I am sending you a copy of our game laws for 1913, in which you will find the proposed regulations, beginning on page 18. The seasons, as proposed, are subject to modification before the regulations are finally approved."

PUTS BLAME ON PUBLISHERS

Scholar Points Out How They Are Responsible for Literature in "Cold Storage."

Publishers complain that people do not buy serious books. An experienced scholar retorts that publishers will not let them. Here is a new and rather important historical work of six hundred pages. It is printed in large type on heavy paper, with wide margins, to make it as bulky as possible. The price is \$5, "postage extra." This is considerable money; but there are some eight hundred public and collegiate libraries that feel bound to buy any new historical work which can claim importance, no matter what the price.

The publisher would rather have the sure thing of eight hundred copies at \$5 than take the chance of selling several thousand copies at \$2. Theoretically, books in the library circulate; but it is notorious that people seldom go to a library for a new serious book. A reader whose habits or tastes would attract him to a new biography, say, wants the volumes on his shelves. If it is really worth the trouble of reading he will almost certainly wish to refer to it again. He cannot trot down to the library for every reference. A reader of such habits or tastes wishes to possess the books in which he is really interested. If he cannot afford to own the book he probably will not read it at all. What circulates from the library, besides fiction, is Taine's English Literature, Macaulay's England, Gibbon's Decline and Fall, Boswell's Johnson.

It is clear consequently that a large part of our new serious literature is automatically canned and moved into cold storage, and so there is a world of pains and expense for nothing!—Saturday Evening Post.

TRY GIVING JOY TO OTHERS

Shedding of Sunshine Will Be Found to Have Good Effect on Those Who Practice It.

It was Mr. Barrie who quaintly said: "Women who bring sunshine into the life of others cannot keep it from themselves."

That is a recipe to learn and apply. If you will not try to be a spreader of joy for the joy it gives do so from selfish motives.

Girls may think this farfetched. Their one thought is to snatch at joy for themselves. It takes experience, perhaps bitter experience, to learn that the joy that counts most is the one with a rebound. Like a rubber ball, the harder you throw it the quicker it returns.

The girl who starts on a joy quest for herself cannot say: "It'll be nice to poor Maria, she has had such a stupid time," and then go about her sunshine shedding with patronizing airs. She may give joy, but the chances are that her patronage will be felt and resented. The sunshine that counts glows in the heart and must come out.

One need not go into sunshine societies to bask in the rays of joy giving. Nor need that sunshine be for outsiders. Sunshine-shedding, like charity, can profitably begin at home. It is not so exciting, perhaps, to try to brighten the lives of mother or small brother or sister as it is to be a Lady Bountiful, but the reflex action is quite as strong.

Try shedding sunshine wherever you are. Do not let a day pass without doing some little thing to brighten that day for some one else, and you will find your day more joyful.

Value of a Chevalier.

A Parisian court has just decided as to "the value" of a chevalier of the Legion or Honor. Injured in the Avenue de l'Opera by an automobile, a former dealer in merchandise, decorated with the Legion of Honor, died in 1911, following the accident. His heirs brought suit for damages against the chauffeur and the owner of the auto. Maitre Gondinet, the advocate of the owner of the auto, maintained that the ex-dealer in merchandise, old and without occupation, furnished no material to his heirs for damages. Maitre Nogueres, the advocate for the plaintiffs, said he had no difficulty in recognizing the damage, though unable to produce any document to establish it, and that Maitre Gondinet for the defense was himself a member of the Legion of Honor and in default of any other evidence that itself was an indication of value to the heirs. The court held with Maitre Nogueres and allowed 25,000 francs damages to the heirs of the former chevalier of the Legion of Honor.

"A Pig in a Poke."

A pig poker is a dealer in pigs—not the large and portly fellow whom you meet now and again at the country market with a cargo of a hundred or more pigs of all ages, shapes and sizes for sale, but a little man, who for the most part carries his wares upon his back, or occasionally perhaps in a wheelbarrow. A "poke" of course is a pocket or sack, and a pig poker therefore is one who deals in pigs carried round from place to place in a poke. The old proverb anent the foolishness of "buying a pig in a poke" has its origin of course in this time-honored method of pig purveying.—London Globe.

No, he was healed only when he had obeyed the Lord's command just exactly as the Lord directed and at the end of his entire obedience to the Lord's command he was healed. Therefore you may believe that the Lord will save you, but salvation does not come until you have done exactly as the Lord commands.

Will you read the New Testament to see what the Lord requires you to do in order to be saved? You will see at the same time what the Apostles preached and what the Holy Spirit directed them to tell the people; what they must do to be saved, and then "Go thou and do likewise," and if it saved them then, if obedience saved them, why will it not save you now if you obey the Lord's commands in the same way. 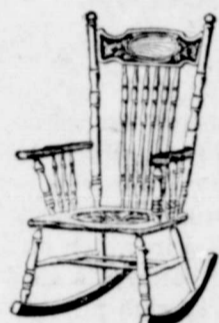
