AGRICULTURAL EXHIBIT

SPLENDID SHOWING MADE. INTERESTING DISPLAYS.

Unfavorable Weather Interferes Greatly, But Exhibit Is Success in Many Ways.

Criticism of the McCulloch County Fall Exhibit has all been favorable so far as The Standard editor has ascertained. But for the fact of the downpour of rain Tuesday it would have surpassed anything ever shown in Brady both in quantity and quality. As it was, many exhibitors were unable to bring in their displays, and the stock department had to be practically eliminated. Nevertheless the exhibits on hand were of the highest class and excited much favorable comment.

Of the exhibitors Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Elliott of Voca carried away the high honors, they having not only the largest amount of displays, but winning first prize in more than one instance. To show the interest taken by these folks in the exhibit it might be mentioned that, including cotton, Mr. Elliott brought three loads of products for display besides stock. Mr. Elliott won the \$10.00 cash

prize offered by the Commercial club for the largest and best display of products, while Mrs. Elliott captured the prize of a \$10.00 cloak for the largest and best display of pantry articles. There were many other exhibitors who showed like interest and whose efforts are to be commended. One of the noteworthy displays was that of sugar beets by J. E. Spiller of Voca. The growing of this beet is a new industry in McCulloch county, but it has shown itself to be splendidly adapted to this country, and its production opens up a new industry here that is almost certain to develop into big things.

In the poultry department there were some 225 fowls entered and the showing was very gratifying. It is certain that at least fifty chickens and ducks were not on display that would have been had the weather permitted.

The directors of the fair are highly gratified over the results secured from their advertising campaign, in bringing the people to Brady for Monday and Tuesday. The trains from all directions on both the Santa Fe and the Frisco came loaded down with excursionists, one train alone bringing 400 passengers. The merchants are likewise highly pleased with the business accorded them, and had

CITY BUYS CRUSHER

ACTION TAKEN JOINTLY WITH COUNTY.

New Era for Good Roads in Brady and McCulloch County. Other Council Doings.

Acting jointly with the county commissioners, the members of the Brady city council have signed a contract for the purchase of a rock crusher to be used in the work of improvement in Brady and throughout McCulloch county.

Committees to investigate the matter of making such purchase were recently appointed by both the city council and the county commissioners, Messrs Albert Baze, Ed Broad and Mayor Richards representing the former, while Henry Miller represented the latter. Their choice has rested upon a gyratory crusher of five to ten tons capacity, the machine being purchased from the Austin-Western Co. of Dallas. Delivery is to be made at once.

The members of the council are now having under consideration the practicability of attaching a roller to the oil-pull engine in order to roll the roads after improvements have been made, and it is thought this can be successfully accomplished.

Death of Old Soldier.

Hugh Wilson died last Saturday night at 10:30 o'clock at his home at the advanced age of 72 years. The funeral took place Sunday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock Rev. Hardison conducting, and interment was made in the Brady cemetery.

"Uncle Hugh," as he was familiarly known, was a Confederate veteran, having served during practically the entire war. He had an interesting and somewhat notable history. When but a youth his parents and, in fact, his entire family was killed in a raid by the Indians here in Texas. He, himself, happened to be away from the house with a team of mules and thereby escaped with his life.

Mr. Wilson had lived in Brady for a long number of years, and was universally esteemed and respected by all who knew him. Surviving him are his wife and six children, four daughters and two sons.

Three concerns were represented, the T. C. Electric Co., Brownwood; the Electric Appliance Co., Dallas, and the Tel-Electric Co., Houston, having presented bids! The plans call for a generator and sufficient plant with wire cables, etc. to supply current for street lights, the plant to be operated with power from the waterworks pumping station. The bids were almost identical, ranging around \$4,000.
Finding that the proposed plant would cost less than at first anticipated, the council en-

larged the plans, and asked for more bids which will be opened as soon as all are in.

County Judge's Election Order.
Whereas, upon the petition of twenty, being a majority of the legally qualified voters and freeholders in a subdivision of the following territorial limits, to-wit:
Beginning at the N. W. corner of W. N. White survey No. 200; thence along the meanderings of the Colorado river to N. W. corner of the John Patton Survey No. 1080; thence south to the S. W. corner of Christian Schladt Survey No. 1075; thence west to the J. H. Othold Survey No. 1095; thence south a distance of three miles and one-half to S. W. corner of Wilhelm Rasche Survey No. 1066; thence east a distance of six miles to the N. E. corner of C. F. Reidel Survey No. 622; thence north to the place of beginning, the same being and including Five Common School District No. 14, did present to the Commissioners Court in regular session, on August 15, 1913, a petition in conformity with the law, praying for an election to determine whether or not horses, mules, jacks, Jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large within said district, and
Whereas, the Commissioners Court did, acting upon the petition, order an election held within said subdivision on Saturday, November 8, 1913, to determine whether horses, mules, jacks, Jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large within said subdivision; therefore, I, Harvey Walker, County Judge of McCulloch County, Texas, hereby call an election to be held in compliance with said order of court and that the polls shall be opened at the Five voting precinct on Saturday, November 8, 1913, at regular hours, and the following shall be manager of said election: E. B. Baldrige, and he shall appoint his own clerks to assist him in holding said election, and shall on or before the tenth day thereafter make due return on all votes cast at said place for and against such proposition to the County Judge.
No person shall vote at this election unless he be a freeholder of the county and is a qualified voter under the constitution and laws.
