CARRIES ITS OWN ANTIDOTE

Narcotic Bullet, It Is Claimed, Is Really a Humane Weapon for Use in War and the Chase.

Alexander F. Humphrey is the inventor of the latest thing in warfare—the narcotic bullet.

This narcotic bullet, it is claimed, will rob war of one of its greatest terrors, the pain that follows the wounds inflicted on the battlefield.

According to Mr. Humphrey, the bullet carries with it an antidote to the pain it inflicts on the victims of war.

Experiments are being conducted with the narcotic bullet, which is said to be humane in both warfare and in the killing of big game.

In order to cause the bullet to be sleep-producing, Mr. Humphrey has inserted a small particle of morphia in it. The drug is carried in tiny wells in the steel jacket of the regulation army bullet. Mr. Humphrey claims that its presence does not affect the power of the bullet. The wound of the new bullet is not different from that of the regular bullet, and, in the case of a slight wound, no bad effects follow the use of the drug.

Fierce War on Mosquitoes.

Travelers to Atlantic City of late have noticed that the broad meadows extending from Pleasantville to the shore are being laid out in checker board squares by the digging of deep and narrow ditches. The squares are very small, and many have wondered what the work means.

This is simply the latest development of the war on the mosquito which the state of New Jersey has been waging for some time. It is found that mosquitoes breed little, if at all, in tide water. Their natural breeding grounds are pools of stagnant water and these are many, all over the meadows, where very high tides leave water in the many hollows on the marshes. The new plan is to ditch these many square miles so thoroughly that no tide, however high, can leave behind it any water, all of which will be drained off in the ditches.

This is only part of the campaign, but it is the most prominent. The experts employed have had extraordinary success elsewhere, but have never tackled such a large proposition. They are confident that by the time they are through there will be no breeding spot for mosquitoes from the mainland to the breakers—a consummation devoutly to be wished.

Cole Younger Friday.

Despite the unfavorable weather, there was a fair-sized audience in attendance upon the lecture by Cole Younger last Friday night at the new Lyric Opera house, and the receipts were very satisfactory.

Mr. Younger's address upon "What Life Has Taught Me," dealt largely with incidents of his stormy and somewhat notorious career, from early boyhood days until his full restoration to citizenship after spending almost twenty-five years of his life in prison. Pathos and humor were combined in the description of the scenes through which he passed, and his talk held the attention of his hearers throughout.

Cole Younger says "Another important lesson life has taught me is the priceless value of good friends, and with Shakespeare I say: 'Grapple them to thy soul with hoops of steel.' What I am today, or strive to be, I owe largely to my friends."

There was quite a sprinkling of old settlers and veterans in the audience, many of whom could recall clearly the incidents that transpired in the days of Quantrell's band, of which Cole Younger was a member, and which were recounted by him.

Encouraged by the reception given their first entertainment, the directors of the Lyric are now planning for numerous other attractions during the winter months and hope soon to be able to announce the next feature, together with plans for a permanent play house.

Fire destroyed the residence of J. H. Brown late Thursday evening of last week. Mr. Brown lives on the south side of the street just east of the jail lot.

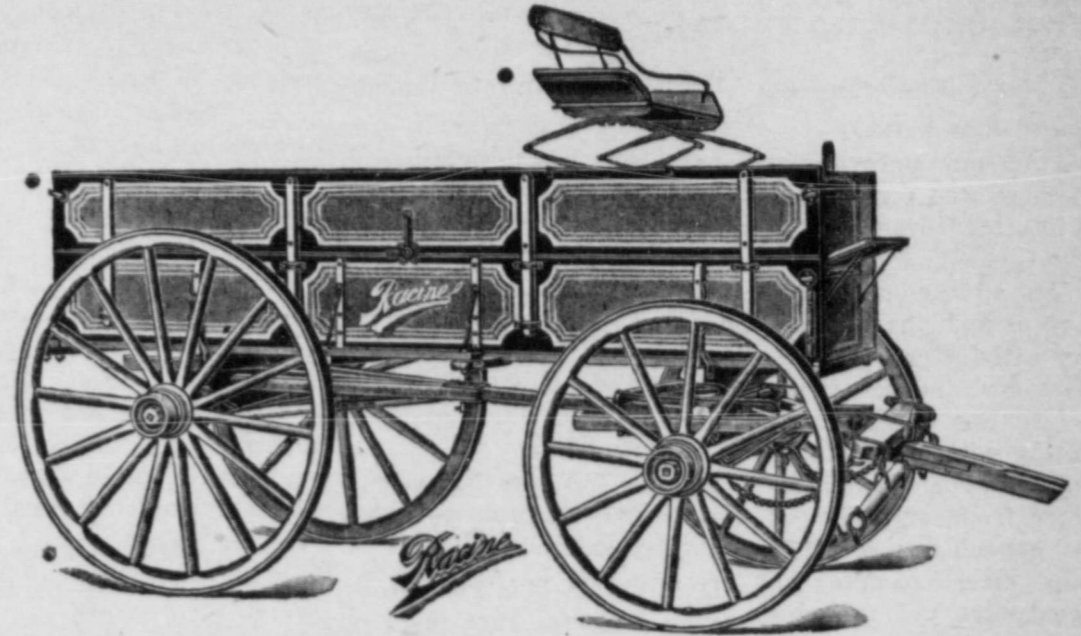
