





Victim of Sunburn Will Find Relief In This Preparation, Which is a Home Remedy.

TEXAS SUGAR INDUSTRY

Sugar and related products are obtained from three widely different classes of plants, to-wit: cane, beets and maple trees. In Texas cane is the only article producing sugar in commercial quantities. The soil and climate of the coast country from the Mississippi to the Rio Grande are especially adapted to the propagation of sugar cane.

We have 40,000 acres in cane, producing 400,000 tons, valued at \$4.50 per ton, and the average production is ten tons per acre. The sugar cane crop for 1912 approximated \$2,-000,000 in value. The entire production is manufactured in Texas. We ship into the state from Porto Rico for refining at our mills 10,000,-000 pounds of raw sugar per annum, and approximately 50,000,000 pounds from Cuba. We manufacture per annum in Texas 250,000 barrels of sugar and 20,000 barrels of syrup. One-half of the Texas production is compelled to seek a market outside the State, although we consume four times more sugar than we produce. The investment in this industry approximates \$2,000. 000 and gives employment to 2,000 people. The annual output has a factory value of \$3,000,000. Texas ranks second with the states in the Union in production of sugar cane, Louisiana leading with almost ten times the acreage of Texas. In the United States 6,240,000 tons of sugar cane were produced in 1909, acording to the federal census reports. 

Supt. White, Farm Demonstrator Zachary and B. L. Nance make a good team. Such work and speeches as they made over the county will arouse a deal of enthusiasm all along the line of farm work and develop-

I got another good expression or two: "One reason some people object to Federal aid is the simplicity of theories printed." Another: "Federal help is the accumulated expressions of agriculturists." If you will study these two thoughts a moment you will not object to helping men who are beginning or those who want to be sure of other things they do not fully know. There are many farmers who are just in the A B C class. Of course we do have many who are in a much higher grade and are proving it every year; yet for the benefit of anyone in need of experience of successful agriculturists, we should favor Federal help. Another reason that can be given for the opposition is that this help is without money and without price. Ous government and the railroads have learned that whatever increases the crops of our country increases the ratio of revenue to them. It is, therefore, a business proposition to help the farmer make more this year than last year.
