# EFFECT OF HEAT ON GROU

Depends Largely on the Nature Color of the Soil-Does No: Penetrate Far.

How far does the heat of the full summer's sun penetrate into the ground?

Replies generally vary from one 5.00 inch to many hundred feet. Actually, 3.00 the distance is about three feet. Beyond this depth the temperature of the soil does not vary appreciably from hour to hour, let the midday be ever so hot and the midnight ever so cold. At this depth the mean temperature in the summer is about 58 degrees Acosta Bros. Fahrenheit, and in the winter about 36 degrees Fahrenheit






