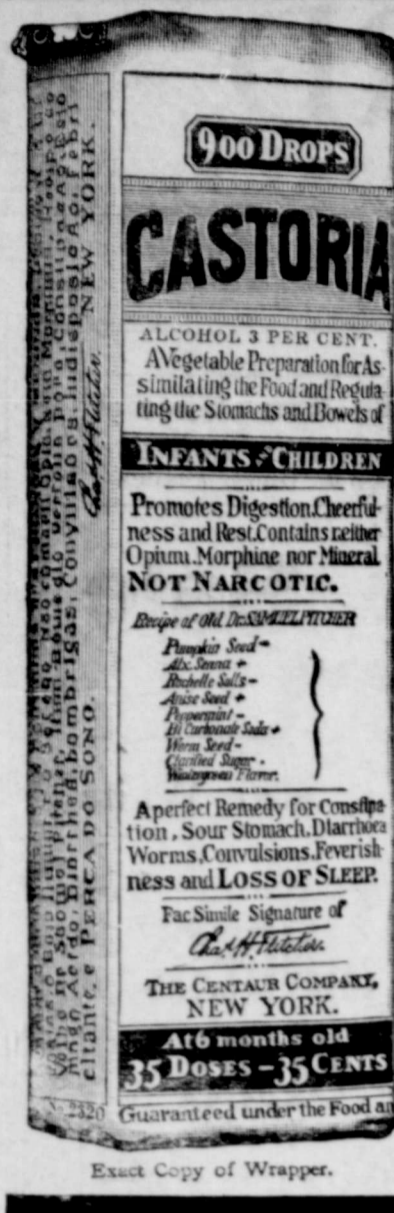

PAY YOUR POLL TAX.

Don't forget that failure to pay your poll tax before February 1st not only cuts off the privilege of voting but subjects a man to three days' road service as well. It is a new law passed by the last legislature of which but little has been said. It is more important now that you pay your poll tax before February 1st than ever before.

BRADY-MASON TURNPIKE.

The Mason Enterprise, after reviewing the repeated attempts and failures of the Mason citizens to secure a railroad for their town, has come to the conclusion that a turnpike proposition would have a railroad beat anyhow, and advances some very good reasons in support of the argument.

The turnpike proposition sounds interesting to The Standard, and should the Mason citizens take steps in the matter, they would find McCulloch county citizens ready to meet them at the county line. Brady already has ten miles of A1 road along the Mason route, and nothing would please the citizens in the south end of the county better than to replace the almost impassable sand beds with piked roads—so their assistance and encouragement in the move may be counted upon.

It seems strange that this proposition has not received earlier and more favorable consideration. The immense bonuses raised by citizens of Mason upon various and sundry occasions in times past, would have served to build the road several times over, and would have given connection between the cities of Brady and Mason that could have done nothing else but advance our common interests.

Let's take the matter up and get the turnpike before another year—and who knows but what that turnpike might serve to place us on the route of the national highway to be built from Colorado to the Gulf. ARE WE SLEEPING ON OUR RIGHTS?

CLEANEST TOWNS.

Ballinger has taken first prize in Holland's Magazine "Cleanest Town in Texas" contest, for cities of her class. Ballinger fell four points below Gonzales, but as the latter city had won the prize last year, it was not eligible to the prize in this contest. A sanitary drinking fountain for the public school is the prize awarded. In commenting upon the results obtained in the con-

test, a press dispatch states: "It is believed that the low death rate for the year just closed, which is less than one-fifth of 1%, for Ballinger is due in a great extent to the war waged against flies and filth.

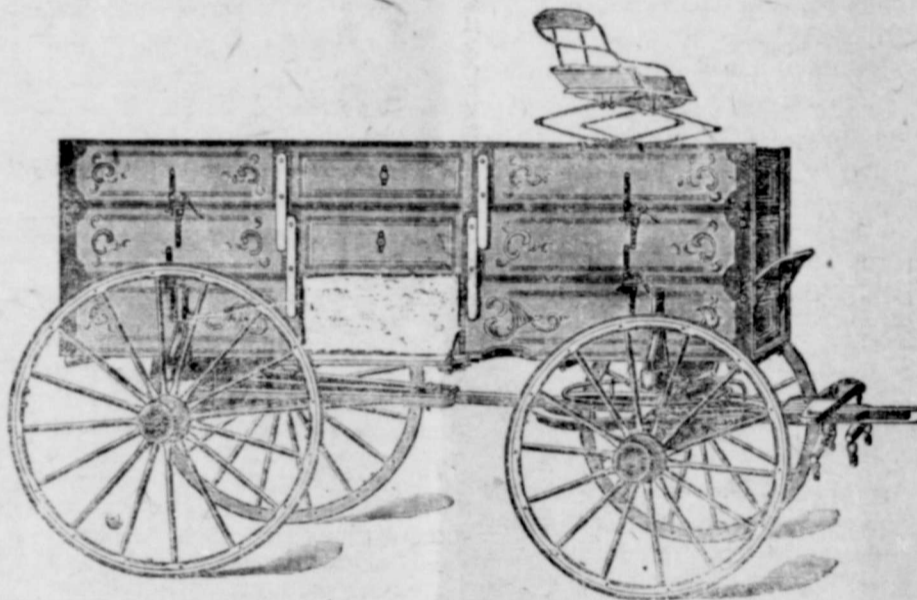

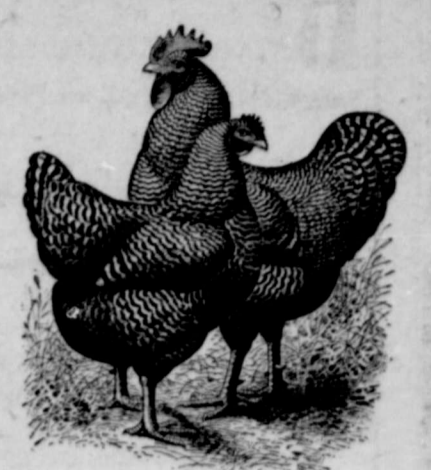

Cotton Brings Good Price.

The local cotton market made a decided advance yesterday and quite a number of bales in cotton yards and warehouses in the city changed hands as a result of the increased price of the staple. No. 1 cotton was worth 13c per pound and a number of farmers who had been holding for the past several months decided to turn loose. 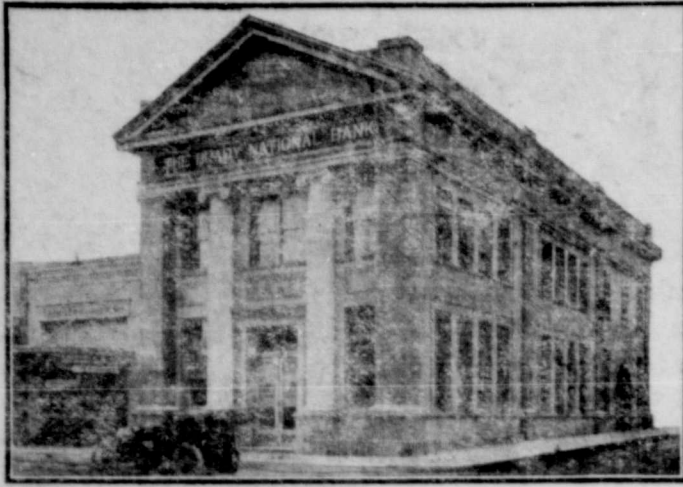

As I have not given you anything from this remote part of the immortal vineyard since last year, I will endeavor in my feeble manner to give you some more description of this particular part of the universe.

Taking up where I left off, at the top of a 5000 foot elevation, which is covered with snow now, while way down here it is rain and mud most of the time, while the land and everything down here is enveloped in fog and cloud, up there on the higher altitude the sun is shining brightly.

It is indeed a grand and inspiring sight to stand upon the mountain elevations and look away to either side at other still higher, snow-capped upheavals bulging up out of the fog below, which is spread out like one vast ocean level calm, smooth and serenely placid.

One can scarcely imagine a more beautiful scene than this vast panorama with the white-capped peaks encircled just below the snow and just above the lake of fog with evergreens (the pines and firs) like a ringlet of beautiful green fringe. Of course the timber does not stop at the surface of the fog, but continues on down to the very base of the mountains, but looking down from above you couldn't see through the cloud for fog.

But there are times when the atmosphere is perfectly clear; and then at night one can stand on Point Lookout (twenty miles away) and see the long rows of electric lights along the broad streets of the city of Grants Pass, north and south, east and west like a checker board; and the buildings with their myriads of windows all lighted with electricity, present a view long to be remembered.

Now, I will tell you of some of the principle products of this part of the country.

Oats and barley do well - sown in the fall, and will make hay if sown in the spring. They may be sown any time during winter, if the ground ever gets dry enough to stir. There are three varieties of wheat grown here known as the big club, the little club and the bluestem. The little club is a low or short stalk and short thick head, with very large plump grains. The big club has long smooth heads. The bluestem grows taller and the grain is hard and makes the highest grade flour.

There are two sorts of oats—the black and the white. Also two kinds of barley, bearded and smooth head.

Clover does exceedingly well, yielding two heavy crops in one season; but as the last crop comes off in the cool, damp fall weather, it is very hard to save, often having to be stirred or turned over with a fork to prevent its moulding; for this reason it is not grown very extensively.

Alfalfa is the crop, maturing three large crops in one season or two large crops and an excellent pasture until Xmas or till January 1. Alfalfa yields two to three tons to the acre at each cutting. It doesn't yield much the first and second years after planting; not until the roots get well established in the ground, then it amply makes up for lost time.

I think if some of you who have a moist plot of ground would try an acre in alfalfa, and not get discouraged and plow it up before the third year, that you will be well pleased with the experiment. It is fine for hogs, fine for sheep, fine for cattle, horses and everything. I think it will yield five or six crops a year in that country. O. I. C. U. R. RIGHT.
