### Died Saturday Morning.

After an illness covering a period of more than three months, Mellie, the 17-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Blackwell, died at 6:00 o'clock Saturday morning at the home of the family in South Brady.

Funeral services were conducted at Brady cemetery at 2:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the presence of a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends, Rev. W. G. Caperton, pastor of the Baptist church, of which deceased was a member, being in charge.

The death is particularly sad, in that it is the third to occur in the family in less than a year, and the sorrowing ones have the sympathy of the entire community in their bereavement.

### DANGEROUS FIRE

Servants' Quarters at Queen Annex Destroyed by Fire.

A fire which, under less favorable conditions, might have proved serious was narrowly averted Saturday night by quick work on the part of the fire department, when the servants' quarters at the Queen hotel annex were destroyed about 10 o'clock.

The fire was caused by the explosion of an oil stove. One of the servants, a negro man whose name could not be learned, was sitting by the stove in his sock feet when the explosion occurred, and in attempting to throw the stove from the room the blazing oil dripped down onto his feet, setting the socks on fire and burning his feet and ankles quite painfully. On seeing his plight the negro made a break for the creek some two or three hundred yards distant, running across the square with his feet in a mass of flames and was finally stopped by others of his race just before reaching the creek and the flames extinguished. His feet and ankles are a mass of blisters, and while the injury is quite painful yet no serious consequences are anticipated as a result of his misfortune.

The burned building adjoins the annex proper on the west, and it is considered almost miraculous that the main building was saved, as both structures are entirely of wood and highly inflammable. As it was considerable damage was sustained to the furniture of the main building, as the upstairs portion was flooded with water.

The building is owned by W. D. Crothers, while the furnishings are the property of H. N. Cook, proprietor of the Queen.

The damage has not been estimated on either, but is fully covered by insurance.

### DISTRICT COURT.

Convened For February Term Yesterday Afternoon.

The February term of district court convened yesterday afternoon at 1:30, Judge John W. Goodwin presiding.

In empaneling the grand jury the only point charged on was the violation of the local option law. The judge delivered a strong charge on the shipment of intoxicants into dry territory and gave the jury his interpretation of the law covering this offense. The following compose the grand jury for the term: S. E. McKnight, foreman; H. J. Huffman, J. A. Gamblin, J. E. Long, Richard Moseley, Luther Stevens, S. W. Simpson, W. B. Beakley, Jr., J. A. Johnson, D. Harkrider, P. C. Dutton, R. L. Burns.

The following grand jury bailiffs were sworn in: John M. Duke, door bailiff; F. M. Campbell, walking bailiff; Marion Deans, Guy Price, J. L. Kiser and Jack Beasley, riding bailiffs.

The criminal docket was taken up following the empaneling of the grand jury, and the first case receiving the attention of the court was that of the State vs. Chas. Deans, charged with receiving stolen property. Defendant entered a plea of guilty to the charge and his punishment assessed by the jury at two years in the penitentiary. Under the new suspended sen-

tence law Deans was given his liberty, this being the first crime with which he has ever been charged.

The case of the State vs. Luis Sanchez, charged with murder, was continued for the term.

This morning the case of Lige Blackburn, charged with theft of cattle will be taken up.

## A NOBLE WORK.

Texas Childrens Home Society  
Secretary Here This Week.

Rev. W. A. Nicholas of Abi-  
lene, state secretary of the Texas  
Childrens Home and Aid So-  
ciety, spent Sunday and Monday  
in Brady in the interest of the  
work of the society, and on Sun-  
day morning delivered a lecture  
at the Methodist church on the  
work being done by this great  
organization. Mr. Nicholas is a  
pleasing speaker, has a work in-  
to which he has entered heart  
and soul and he has no difficul-  
ty in securing willing helpers in  
the work.

During the year just closed  
the society has had the task of  
finding homes for 115 children,  
ranging in ages from one month  
to fifteen years. That they are  
meeting with hearty co-opera-  
tion from the citizenship is at-  
tested by the fact that they had  
177 more homes for little ones  
offered than they were able to  
supply.

The society was organized in  
1897 and since that time has  
provided Christian homes for  
over 700 children. These little  
waifs have not only been re-  
ceived into these homes as mem-  
bers of the family, but share  
equally in the love and affections  
of their foster parents.

The society is supported en-  
tirely by voluntary contribu-  
tions, and a number of Brady  
citizens availed themselves of  
the opportunity to contribute to  
the worthy cause.

county school should plan to  
bring big delegations.

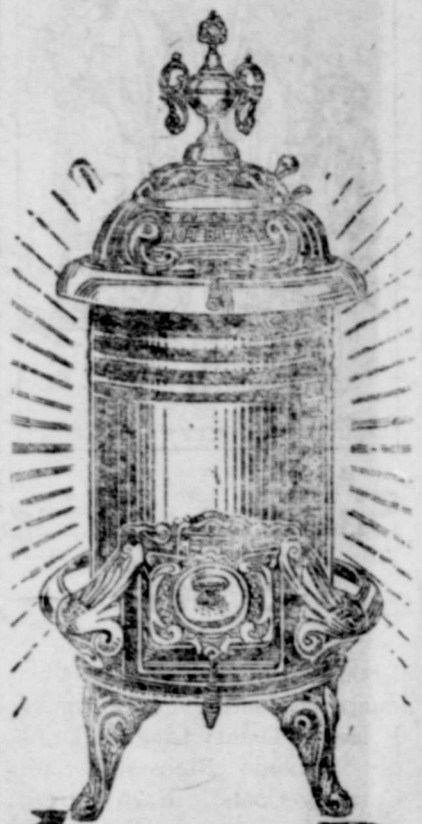

#### Machinery in Commission.

The rock crusher recently purchased jointly by the county and city was put into commission yesterday crushing an immense pile of rock near the Glenn place in the southern portion of the city. A force of four or five men is being used to operate the crusher, and they are making "little 'uns out of big un's" at the rate of about fifteen tons per day.

The rock being crushed now will be used in repair work on the streets of the city, but as soon as contracts can be signed up between the city and property owners the work of macadamizing the streets will be started. A member of the street committee of the city council stated yesterday that with one exception all property owners on Bridge street had signed up, and that the first work would probably be done on that thoroughfare.

The plan upon which the city expects to do this work is for the property owners to pay two-thirds of the cost of the improvement, while the city agrees to bear the remaining portion. It is hoped that with the completion of the work on Bridge street that the citizens will realize the value of the work fully enough to cause them to be willing to sign up for the work on every street in the city.

Representative Gathering at Court House Saturday.

Pursuant to a call issued by the state chairman, Judge A. W. Walker, of Dallas, the Prohibition Democrats of this county met in mass meeting at the court house Saturday afternoon for the purpose state convention to be held in Fort Worth next Saturday, at which time some several aspirants for gubernatorial honors will be eliminated from the race and a candidate for the office chosen by this branch of the party.

J. F. Montgomery acted as chairman of the meeting, with Sam W. Moffatt as secretary.

A delegation of thirty-four was named to attend the Fort Worth convention and are uninstructed, further than to oppose the allowance of proxies.

Returns as published in the state press of Sunday indicate that Thos. H. Ball of Houston will be the choice of the convention, although there are enough delegations uninstructed to give the nomination of either Mayes, Lane, Brooks or Thomas, should the uninstructed delegates center on one man. Complete returns Sunday from sixty-seven counties of the state show the following convention votes: Ball, 3,987; Mayes, 509; Lane, 358; Brooks, 25; Thomas, 505; uninstructed, 3,485.
