DEPOT BURGLARY.

No Arrests Have Been Made—Officers Still Working.

There are no new developments in the burglary case at the union depot, particulars of which were published in Tuesday's issue of The Standard, further than the fact that all clues, when investigated by the sheriff's force, proved worthless, and it now looks as if the perpetrators of the crime will go unpunished.

It was found impossible to get bloodhounds here in time to be of any service in trailing down the criminals, and the ticket office was entered Tuesday afternoon by local railroad officials and Sheriff Wall, and it was found that although the safe door was blown away by the force of the explosion, that nothing had been taken from it. The safe contained only about \$100 and this could have been obtained very easily by the safeblowers had their nerve not deserted them after the explosion, as the money was in plain view when the office was entered Tuesday afternoon.

Sheriff Wall thinks that the crime is the work of embryo cracksmen, and still entertains the hope that sufficient evidence may be found to warrant an arrest in the case. One young man whose actions are said to have been very suspicious, was taken before a court of inquiry yesterday af-

ternoon and thoroughly questioned, but no evidence was obtained and he was promptly released.

Goodwin called attention to the fact that the salary of the sheriff in this county was inadequate, and asked that the matter be brought to the attention of the county commissioners.

One or two members of the court have expressed their willingness to increase the salary, and it is thought that the matter will meet with little or no opposition.

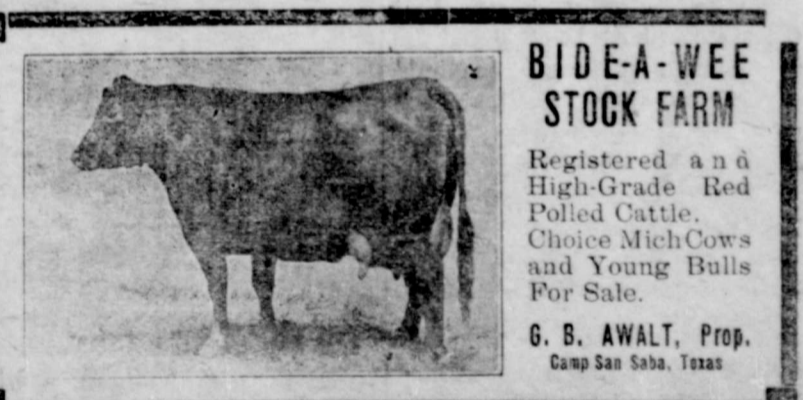

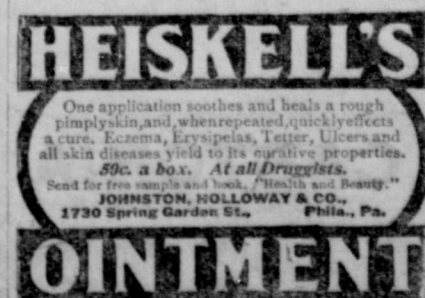

TURNPIKE VS. RAILROAD.

Influence of the Turnpike on Good Roads Generally.

Texas is astir upon the sub-
 ject of good roads.

Every paper of patriotic push
 from El Paso to Texarkana and
 from Texline to Brownsville,
 religious or secular, is devoting
 more or less space, and editor-
 ial queries to the subject of
 good roads. And the entire
 official roll of state, from the
 governor to the road commis-
 sioner have been agitating the
 matter upon the patriotic basis
 of "the greatest possible good to
 the entire citizenship of the
 state."

The enhancement of life so-
 cially, religiously and financially
 have been the fulcrums of the
 lever by which these magnates
 lift the feet of our citizenship
 from the quagmires of a road-
 less traffic, and hence, a lagging
 commerce, and a sluggish pros-
 perity, to the highway of good
 roads, promoting general traffi,
 and insuring better commerce
 and greater prosperity with an
 even benefit to every enterprise.

Such discussions have been
 enthusiastic. Many organiza-
 tions have been formed, heavy
 taxations have been laid, and
 appropriations have been made
 for building of good roads in
 many counties in the state. But
 too little has been realized by
 the public generally compared to
 the effort and expenditures made.

There is a reason for this for
 which no one is to blame. We
 needed the object lesson, which
 we never had. Therefore much
 of the money appropriated to
 build good roads has been un-
 wisely applied. Road draining
 and ditching, culverting and
 grading are not very well un-
 derstood; and therefore thou-
 sands of dollars in appropriated
 money and labor poorly applied,
 is washed away by the first big
 rain, or buried in the sand and
 lost.

The turnpike is a perfect ex-
 ample of all the constituents of
 good road building, and furnishes
 the only perfect object lesson
 of the highest ingenuity in
 proper grading, draining, ditch-
 ing, etc., of good and permanent
 road beds. So that one travel-
 ing over the same cannot but
 gather sufficient knowledge to
 enable him to build a road good
 to travel and permanent in
 structure.

The presence of the turnpike
 thus lifts our aspirations and
 enthusiasm for good roads from
 the land of dreams and vain
 imaginations to the more real
 plane of observation and ex-
 perience. The blooming reality
 is before us; we understand its
 mechanism. We have tried its
 utility; we know its worth,
 therefore we can build it, and
 we must have it, is the conse-
 quent conclusion.

The good roads question is
 no longer an experiment but a
 tried out and approved fact; a
 paying investment; a public
 utility and an even benefit to
 all. For instance, Mr. B. lives
 four miles from the nearest ac-
 cessible point of the pike, 20
 miles from Brady, he has eight
 bales of cotton to market, from
 this accessible point he can
 bring them all at one load but
 over the bad road from his
 farm to the pike he can only
 haul two bales at a load. It
 will take him two whole days
 to get his load to the pike, and
 the third day he will come to

town; or he will hire three ex-
 tra teams to accompany him to
 the pike when he will take their
 loads and be off to town in one
 day. How often will he do
 either of these things till he will
 say to his neighbors: "Come!
 let us build a road." And then
 the turnpike becomes a trunk
 line through the country, to
 which all other roads are tribu-
 tary, whether public or private.
 And makes it essential to every
 man's highest good, that he
 have a first class road upon
 which to approach it. It is,
 therefore, the key solution to
 the problem of good roads.

Most any community is satis-
 fied if her roads are as good as
 her neighbor's. And why not?
 If a small progressive commu-
 nity should build good roads for
 themselves, so as to greatly in-
 crease their tonnage, they could
 not get through the bad roads
 of their neighbors to market.

While a great highway offers
 a great inducement to every ad-
 jacent community to make more
 practical its utility by making
 good roads to the same, and
 when they have so done, then
 other communities back of them,
 and more remote from said
 highway, will utilize their good
 roads by building up to them.
 It is, indeed, like starting
 waterworks in a city; but few
 people want it at first. But
 when the great utility of the
 same is proven no man likes to
 be outdone by his neighbor, and
 the contagion spreads like wild-
 fire till an entire city is watered
 from one great fountain.

But without the nucleus of a
 great central highway there is
 no starting point for a good
 roads contagion. But this great
 object lesson once permanently
 fixed through the center of our
 population our country will soon
 be revolutionized by good roads,
 and our lives and property will
 be enhanced as never before,
 and as it can never be through
 any other means.

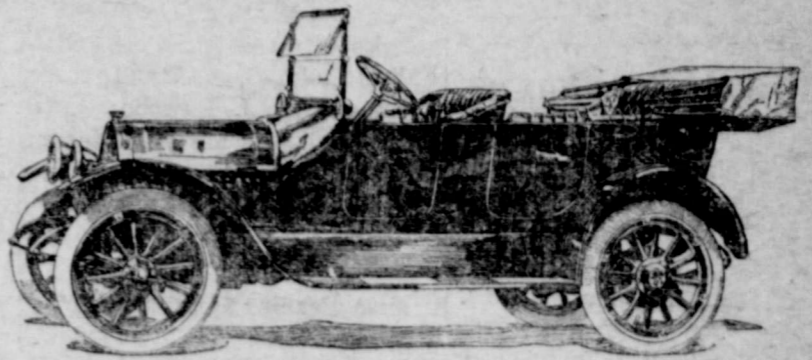

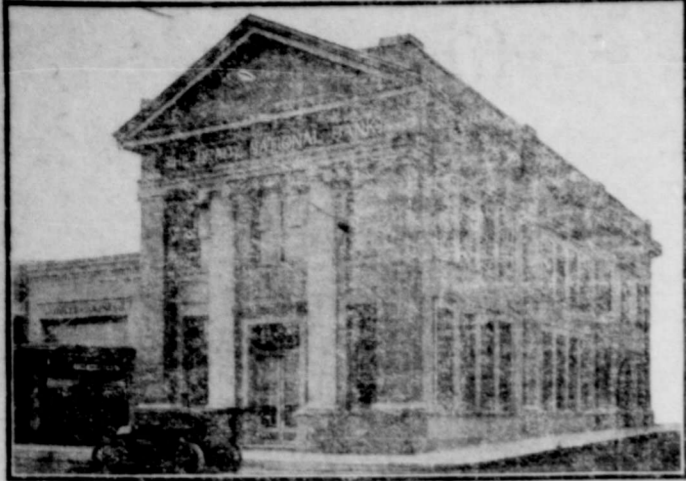

WONDER WORDS.

Wonder, Oregon, Feb. 22. Editor Brady Standard:

It is raining here for a change? Whenever a man's toes grow together like those of a goose, they call him a "Web-footer."

The printer made me say in my last letter that "two teams of two horses" can pull 4,000 to 5,000 pounds. It should have read "one team of two horses can pull 4,000 to 5,000 pounds."

Below is the description of the Oregon Caves in this, Josephine county. It will doubtless interest you. Read it.

THE OREGON CAVES.

(By F. M. Nickerson, Guide.)

The wonderful Josephine Caves, or National Monument, are situated on a spur of the Siskiyou range of mountains, in Oregon, between the waters of Williams and Sucker creeks. There are two entrances to this remarkable cave. One is called the lower entrance and one is called the upper entrance, about 100 yards apart. Both entrances are large, sufficient to drive an automobile into same. The lower entrance comes out of apparently solid rock, a cliff at least 100 feet high. Quite a large stream of water issues from this entrance, called Cave creek, which enters Sucker creek about five miles below. Midway between this entrance and the mouth, are falls of about 40 feet. Sufficient power could be obtained for lighting the monument by electricity.

This mountain, 30 miles long and 12 miles wide, appears to be honey-combed with rooms and corridors in every shape conceivable. Of the hundreds accessible a short description of the most noted follows:

About 100 feet from the lower entrance are the "Petrified Gardens," sometimes called the "Garden of the Gods;" mammoth cabbages weighing a ton, with leaves resembling elephant ears, apparently like petrified cabbage; immense clusters of grapes, cauliflower, and other vegetables in profusion. In an annex to this room may be found the "Devil's Cauldron," which possibly the witches used for boiling the vegetables.

At this juncture the guide will warn you to look out for stalactites, that hang pendant from a few feet to several feet in length. Should you fail to observe his advice, and take particular care, the chances are that your think tank will be perforated by one of these needle like, knife cutting pendants. Considerable innocent blood has been spilled throughout the cave by these "icicles," as they are termed by the uninitiated. The "Bee Hive," may be found here, so called because of resemblance to a bee hive. "Paradise Lost," Samson's Coffin, are found in the lower cave. The lower cave is very damp, constantly dripping water coming from the dome, which forms the stalactites and stalagmites throughout the cave.

The first rooms of importance in the upper cave are the "Pal-

ace," the "Queen's Chamber," and the "King's Chamber," Joaquin Miller in giving a description of these rooms for publication in Sunset Magazine stated that "words were inadequate to portray the beauties of these chambers." The domes are filled with the most beautiful stalactites as white as alabaster, the couches seem covered with ice glaze, which drape gracefully down like trimmings of lace. As you recline on one of these couches, you imagine, you are at the north pole on a cake of ice. From these rooms you can see numerous other rooms which are gradually being formed by nature. The "Eagle Wing's Room," has a circular opening at the top about six feet in diameter, around which hang pendants resembling eagle wings.

The "Pillar" room contains one huge pillar in the center. At the entrance to "Niagara Falls" room the corridor for 100 feet on each side is composed of pillars all united, but still distinct. The "Niagara" is a perfect picture of the original, only on a small scale. The limestone formation has the appearance of falling water which glistens like diamonds. Goat Island is plainly visible, as well as the Canadian and American sides.

At the entrance to Joaquin Miller's "Chapel" is the Grave Yard. Sound stalagmites from 6 inches to 36 inches in diameter are built up from the floor, from one foot to seven feet in height, resembling headstones for graves. As you pass through the Grave Yard, you come next to the "Toy" room, which contains horses, elephants, tigers, lions, rhinoceros, hippopotamuses and every species of animal found in zoology. Passing by you come to a circular tower 6 feet in diameter extending upward about 50 feet. In this tower, on a pedestal, stands Geo. Washington.

The main corridor is now 30 to 50 feet wide and 10 to 20 feet high, and about 300 feet in length. You now come to "Joaquin Miller's Chapel." This room is 300 feet long, 150 feet wide and 80 feet high. It is frequently called the "Ghost Chamber," from the number of white objects on the wall, formed by the limestone drippings. The pride of the Oregon caves are its "Treasure Vaults," which were opened up by the Examiner some years ago, guided by F. M. Nickerson. It required two week's labor to reach this portion of the cave. Very few in number have had the pleasure of visiting this portion of the cave, by reason of it not being easy of access, and for fear of being demolished.

A beautiful lake can be seen in this locality, water ice cold. Beautiful crystals as large as a persons head hang all around the edge of the water. Each point shines as bright as a diamond. The "Bottomless Pit" as it is called, has been explored. Its depth is about 300 feet. Usually you could throw a rock into the cavity and hear it strike from side to side, but you couldn't hear it strike the bottom, for the reason that it struck in

the lake. The "Devil's Backbone" is a sharp cliff extending for about 50 feet, and if you do not hang to the sides you will probably take a fall of about 100 feet. There are about ten thousand other rooms, but time and space here forbids description.
