#### AT THE GEM.

##### "Adventures of Kathlyn" to Be Shown Friday Night.

## NEGRO IS HANGED.

Tom Lee Laughs and Jokes on Scaffold.

Fort Worth, Tex., March 9.—Tom Lee, a young negro, convicted of killing Walter Moore, another negro, met death by hanging in the county jail this morning.

The trap was sprung at 11:20 o'clock and Lee was pronounced dead ten minutes later.

Sheriff William Rea officiated at the execution and was assisted by several of his deputies.

Lee had been baptized earlier in the morning by Rev. H. Winn, pastor of St. James' Colored Baptist Church. He evinced no fear when led to the scaffold, but laughed and joked with the deputy sheriffs. About 150 people witnessed the hanging, and to these Lee bowed and said farewell just before the black cap was placed over his head.

The killing of the negro Walter Moore, of which Lee was convicted, occurred May 15th in a pool hall in the negro business section. Lee used a shotgun and after shooting Moore fled down the street. He shot Policeman Ogletree, who attempted to arrest him, and wounded two bystanders. The defendant was tried and convicted of killing Moore and never tried for killing Ogletree.

One of the incidents of the killing was the attempt of a mob the night of May 15, 1913, to lynch Lee, but he was sequestered in a tunnel under the court house and saved by the sheriff.

### AFTER BIG FACTORY.

Meeting Will Be Held to Discuss Location of Plant.

Orders for more than \$4,000 worth of the little machines have already been booked. If the manufacturing plant can be located in Brownwood, the machines will begin in order to fill many orders for small ice machines before hot weather.—Brownwood Bulletin, Wednesday.




