School Board Again Selects W. L. Hughes to Head School.

At a meeting of the school board of the Brady Independent School District No. 1 last Friday night Prof. W. L. Hughes was again unanimously elected as superintendent of the Brady schools for the coming year.

Prof. Hughes has been at the head of the school for the past two years, and during this time has succeeded in placing it in the foremost ranks of the public schools of the state, besides raising the credit of the high school with affiliated institutions several units. He is a thorough school man, always alive to the best interests of the school and keeps abreast of the times in modern methods and management, and the board is to be congratulated upon their wise choice.

Smallpox at Rochelle.

Dr. J. G. McCall, county health officer, reports a genuine case of smallpox at Rochelle, a young man by the name of Ellison having developed the disease.

Young Ellison has been in Mason county for some time and contracted the disease there. The case is a very mild one, so mild, in fact, that it was thought to be chicken pox, but since coming to Rochelle, where he is visiting the family of his brother, his case has been pronounced genuine smallpox.

A spread of the disease is feared, as the patient attended a number of gatherings in Rochelle while broken out, and also attended a meeting of a literary society in Placid.

A strict quarantine is being maintained by the county health officer, and it is hoped that the outbreak may be stamped out at an early date.

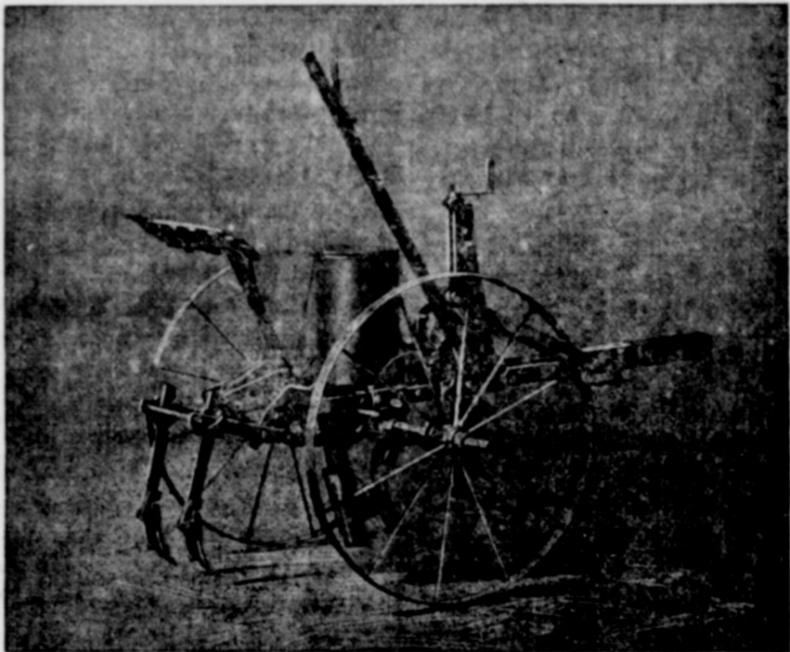

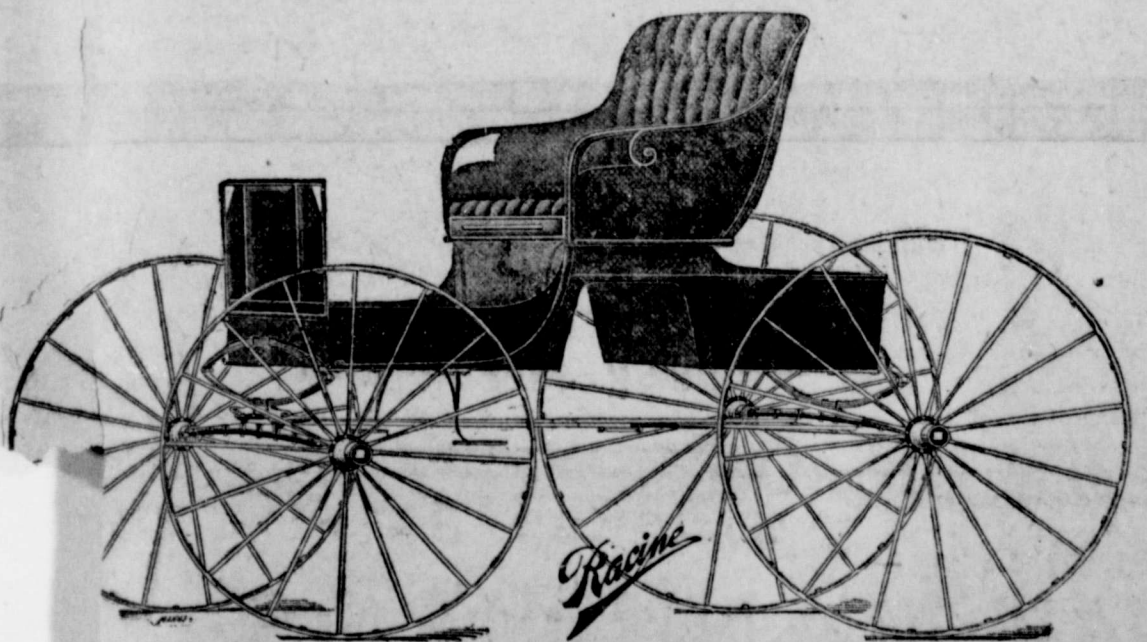
