

# Monthly Sales Tax Received By Bovina

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said the January allocation of the local option one per cent sales tax to Texas cities will exceed \$18.1 million.

This month's rebate is about \$300,000 less than the state paid to some 900 Texas cities during the same one-month period last year. The City of Bovina reported receipts of \$824 for their first check for 1979 under the sales tax reimbursement program.

Texas cities received a record \$424.8 million during 1978 as their share of the city sales tax, an increase of 17 per cent over the previous year, Bullock said. Houston will receive \$3.5 million for this reporting period, an 11 per cent drop compared to the city's 1978 payment for January.

Dallas will get a check for \$2.2 million, which is one per cent less than the amount paid during the same period last year.

Fort Worth's check for January will be \$756,596 compared to \$761,375 received by the city during the first month last year.

San Antonio's rebate check is up by about seven per cent over its 1978 January allocation. The Alamo City will receive \$1.05 million.

Austin will get \$641,992 this year, compared to a payment of \$600,346

# Tractor Caravan Reaches Tennessee

American Agriculture Movement's tractorcade had reached Memphis, Tennessee, by Monday night, according to the Blade's news sources, and the project continued to run "on schedule."

The caravan had gained to over 450 vehicles from the 175 which left Bushland the morning of January 15. The tractorcade covered 130 miles on Monday, from Little Rock, Arkansas to Memphis. This was the biggest one-day move for the group thus far in their journey to Washington, D.C.

The group had reached Little Rock Saturday evening, where they staged a rally. Sunday was a rest day for the group. Another rally was held Monday night when the group reached Memphis. More vehicles were expected to join the movement as it entered Tennessee.

State AAM headquarters in Hereford said late Monday they had been in telephone contact with the caravan on Monday, and everything was going well.

"They had sunshine on Monday for virtually the first time since leaving the Texas Panhandle. The weather has not been bad, but they have been travelling in fog and drizzle much of the way," a spokesman for the state AAM office said.

Included in the vehicles making the trip are tractors, repair trucks, and pickups carrying diesel fuel.

At least six separate caravans in the national tractorcade are known to be moving toward the nation's capital, where the farm leaders plan to demonstrate for congressional support of the farmer.

The group that left Bushland, which is designated as "Route 2," had taken seven overnight rest stops as of Tuesday.

Overnight stops had been made in Sayre, El Reno, Okemah and During the Sunday stopover in Little Rock, the group camped at the State Fairgrounds, and held church services on Sunday in one of the fairgrounds buildings. One of the members of the AAM group, who is a lay preacher, held the service, which was well-attended.

Ralph Roming contacted the Blade Tuesday morning, and praised the help and support the caravan had received both from state and local police, as well as motorists and residents they encounter along the way.

"The police have gone out of their way to help us. They have saved us bottlenecks, such as at Memphis, where there was a road under construction. They led us around the construction site.

"You just can't visualize the support we've gotten along the way. Folks who didn't make the trip don't know what they have missed. It is real heart-warming. Even the truckers and motorists with CBs have indicated their support. Oh, there are a few complainers, but not many," Roming said.

Roming said there were 21 units from Parmer and Bailey Counties, travelling together, including ten tractors and 11 service units. He said

A native of Amarillo, Ballengee is a graduate of Amarillo High School and the University of Texas where he earned a degree in Business Administration.



## **Residents Warned Ice Play Dangerous**

As winter's cold forms a layer of ice on ponds and lakes, children are filled with visions of their northern and western neighbors enjoying winter sports. The novelty of ice, however, lures many youngsters to their death.

"Ponds around here seldom freeze thick enough to support the weight of even small children," Mack Mauldin, district conservationist with the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in Friona, said.

The most dangerous ponds, he stressed, are those that freeze fairly thick in areas around the edges.

"Usually the down-wind edge of the pond will freeze first, and the ice may support a large person for several feet from the edge in that area. But, over deeper water and on the up-wind side of the pond, the ice is usually very thin," Mauldin continues.

There is no really safe ice thickness for skating, according to the National Safety Council, because

ice conditions are always changing. For example, four inches of new ice can support more weight than four inches of "old ice" that has been subjected to the effects of the sun, refreezing after thawing, wind, and changing water levels under the ice.

Realizing how hard it is to curb the natural curiosity in children, Mack suggested that children be made aware of the dangers of thin ice. He has warning posters available free of charge for this purpose.

Also, children should be taught rescue techniques.

"Some pond owners keep a life ring or other flotation device attached to a long rope handy at the pond. A long pole can also be used to rescue victims of broken ice," Mack said. "If you must go onto the ice to help a drowning person, be sure to use a large board, ladder, pole, or sheet of plywood to distribute your weight. If none is available, lie prone on the ice and slide gently.

Attention --- All Corn Growers

The High Plains Farm Bargaining Association is now legally chartered to bargain for producers of food grade corn and other commodities in the State of Texas.

A committee has been in contact with purchasers of food grade corn (both white and yellow). We recommend that farmers thoroughly read, consider and understand all aspects that regard price, grade, variety, moisture, crackage, shrinkage and shrinkage percentage, hauling, long lines, field loss, extra spraying, lower yields before signing any contract. All of these things considerd, we believe that the contract offered to date is less than the present market price.

The committee believes that anything less than \$6 for yellow food corn and \$7 for white food corn will be a loss for the grower considering inflation in costs of production. Plans are being made to consider ensilage contracts and high moisture corn contracts.

The cooperation is vitally needed by all corn growers and potential corn growers to support this bargaining effort. There may never be another opportunity like this one.


Parents of the couple are Mr. and Mrs. Jim Russell of Bovina and Mr. and Mrs. Clair Wright of Mountain Home.





## **County Holds Rank In Barley Production**

Parmer County remained the top barley producing area in the state this year, producing 16.7 per cent of Texas' 1,080,000-bushel crop, according to the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Total production in Parmer County was 180,000 bushels. Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service records showed a 68.2 per cent decrease from the 1977 crop, which hit 3.4 million bushels. The decline was primarily due to prolonged drought over the state. "The crop got off to a good start,

helped along by August, 1977, rains," commented Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. "But rapid depletion of available

moisture caused stands to deteriorate shortly after the crop was up, and continuing drought conditions from October to May caused prospects to decline.

"Only 40,000 acres of barley were harvested this year," he continued, "even though 110,000 acres were planted. Yields were cut from 40

bushels per acre last year to only an average 27 bushels per acre.'

The top 10 barley producing counties included: Parmer, first; Hansford, second; Young, third; Deaf Smith, fourth; Pecos, fifth; Sherman, sixth; Randall, seventh; Wilbarger, eighth; Moore, ninth; and Castro, tenth.
