The most important matter coming before the city council at their regular meeting on Tuesday night was the canvassing of the returns of the general city election held that day. All members of the body were present.

The monthly report of collections of City Marshal J. M. Anderson shows the following: Delinquent taxes and penalty, \$4.29; fines, \$1.60; fees from sale of impounded stock, \$21.75. The report was approved and ordered filed. The report of City Secretary Richardson for the month of March not having been completed, he was granted further time, and will present same at a call meeting to be held Monday night.

An amendment to Art. 154 of the Criminal ordinance was passed. The amendment makes a change in the boundary line of the fire limits of the city, placing it 100 north of the old line.

NOVEL SCHEME.

J. W. Embry Constructs Fireless Water Heater.

J. W. Embry has on exhibition and in active operation at his planing mill on South Blackburn street one of the most novel plants ever conceived in the way of a fireless water heater. That the scheme is a pronounced success is attested by the fact that, with the water at freezing point early yesterday morning, it was soon heated to a temperature almost unbearable to the naked hand.

The novelty is very simple and works to perfection—that is if the sun shines, and if the plant has been in operation for a sufficient length of time a day of cloudy weather will not make very much difference anyway. It consists of an ordinary boiler such as is found in most up-to-date residences encased in sawdust, and connected up just like the ordinary boiler. On the south side of the building is a large, shallow box in which is placed a coil of ninety-two feet of half inch black pipe and the box covered over with glass. The heat from the sun rays on the coil is sufficient to bring the temperature of the water to almost boiling point in a remarkably short space of time. The coil is connected with the hydrant and the water circula-

tes through the coil and into the boiler located inside the building, where it can be drawn out steaming hot. All that is necessary to increase the capacity of the heater or the temperature of the water is the addition of more pipe in the coil, and Mr. Embry states that a coil containing 150 to 200 feet of pipe will supply all the hot water needed by an average sized family.

The scheme is a most novel one, and while Mr. Embry does not claim the idea as his own, he may safely claim the distinction of having constructed the first plant of the kind seen in this section.

TO BUILD OPERA HOUSE.

Julius Levy Will Erect Commodious Play House.

Workmen will begin the construction within the next few days of a building on the Benham property on South Blackburn street to be used by Julius Levy as an opera house.

The building is to be 36x100 feet, with 20-foot walls. The walls will be constructed in such a manner as to allow them to be removed in summer, and thus convert the building into an airdome. The stage will be very large and roomy and of sufficient size to accommodate any attraction which can be booked in here, having a 16x24 opening, with a depth of 24 feet. The floor will be an incline, the reserved seat section of which will be equipped with up-to-date opera chairs, the remainder of the seats being folding chairs such as are now used by Mr.

Levy in The Gem theatre. The seating capacity of the building will be 700.

The estimated cost of the building and furnishings is \$3,000, and it is hoped to have it completed and ready for occupancy by May 15. Mr. Levy announces that he expects to book some of the strongest theatrical organizations on the road for the summer months, and that nothing but the very best in pictures, vaudeville and stock will be shown.

The scenery used in the airdome formerly operated on the lot where Mann Bros.' new building now stands will be used in the new opera house.

He may have ringing in the ear, or cracking and snapping sounds in the ear, or a feeling of pressure in the ear, but he is not aware that he is losing his hearing.
Testing the Hearing.
It is a good thing to test the hearing with a watch. The person is to watch against your ear, and you gradually away from the watch and how far away from the watch you can actually hear it tick. Try it on the other side and see if both ears are alike. If you find that you are unable to hear the watch on both sides alike and at a distance of four feet from the ear, you may know that deafness has already begun. 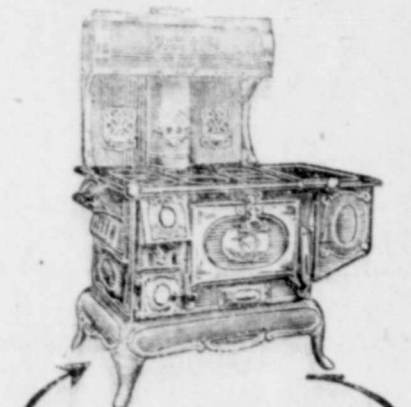

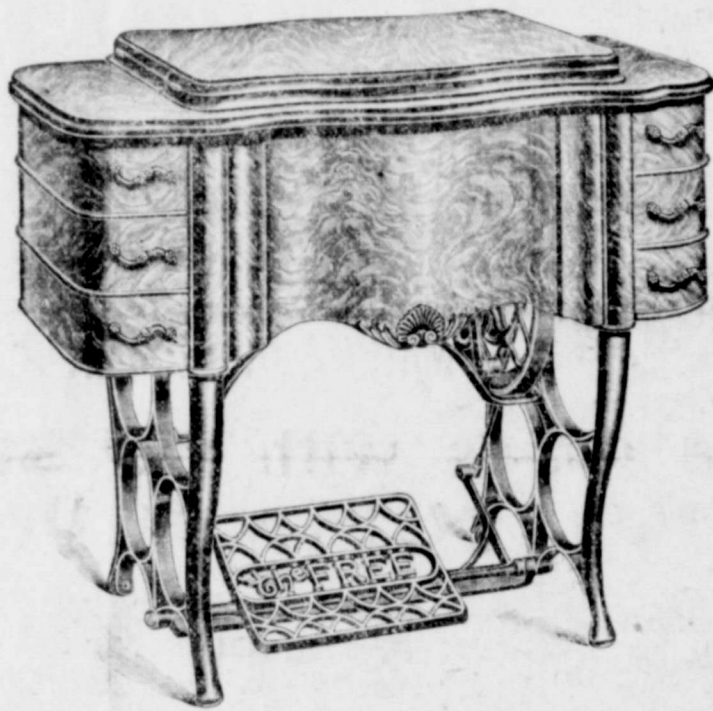

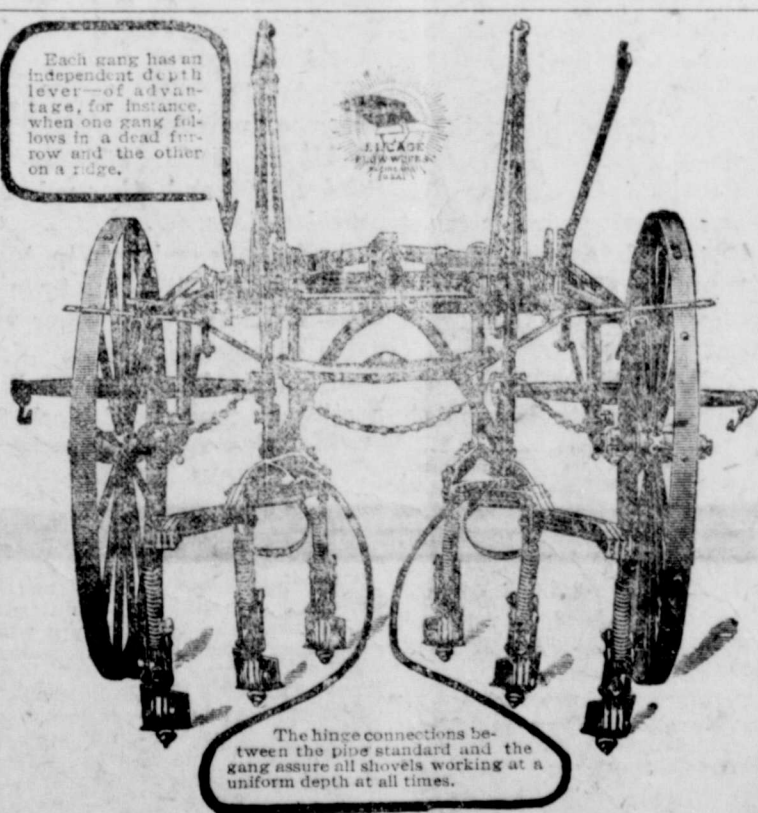
