Murder Case on Trial.

The case of A. S. Etheredge, transferred from Kimble county, is on trial in the district court this week. Etheredge is charged with the murder of J. T. Cox of Kimble county. The defendant is a ranch man and the deceased was sheep inspector of the county. The homicide occurred about the first of the year.

There are nearly 200 witnesses and friends of the defendant and prosecution in town this week. All the parties to the case are strangers in this county and local interest is not great.

State Debt \$1.14 Per Capita.

The per capita state debt of
Texas is \$1.14, or \$2.38 less
than the average for the 48
states of the American Union,
according to a preliminary re-
port of the Census just received
here.

The bonded indebtedness, \$4-
238,000 in 1890 declined to \$3-
978,000 in 1912. No special
debt obligations to public trust
funds were recorded in any year.
The floating debt reached the
maximum amount, \$760,000, in
1895, decreasing and finally
disappearing in 1902; in 1910,
\$149,000 was outstanding, this
amount increasing to \$679,000
in 1912.

In the case of funds and in-
vestments the securities increas-
ed from \$7,695,000 in 1890 to
\$69,079,000 in 1913. The cash
fluctuated naturally from year
to year, rising to \$3,396,000 in
1899, but subsequently falling
to \$1,393,000 in 1912.

At the present time about
4.3 per cent of the total popula-
tion of the United States is in
the state of Texas, and 1.2 per
cent of the total debt (less sink-
ing fund assets) is attributed
to this state.

The bulletin was compiled
from bi-ennial reports furnished
by the state department here
covering the period from 1902
to 1913.

TEXAS IS GROWING.

Now Has Four And One-Quar-
ter Million People.

San Antonio, Tex., Apr. 25.—
The estimated population of
Texas is 4,257,854 according to
a bulletin which has just been
released for publication by the
United States Census Bureau at
Washington. The 1910 census
showed 3,896,542 persons in the
state and since that time there
has been a gain of 361,312 in
the state's population or an
average of 200 persons per day.
The population of the United
States and its possessions now
is 109,021,992, according to the
report, having increased from
101,748,269.

The bulletin credits San An-
tonio with the largest popula-
tion of any Texas city. It has
115,063 persons, while Dallas is
shown in second place with 111-
986 people.

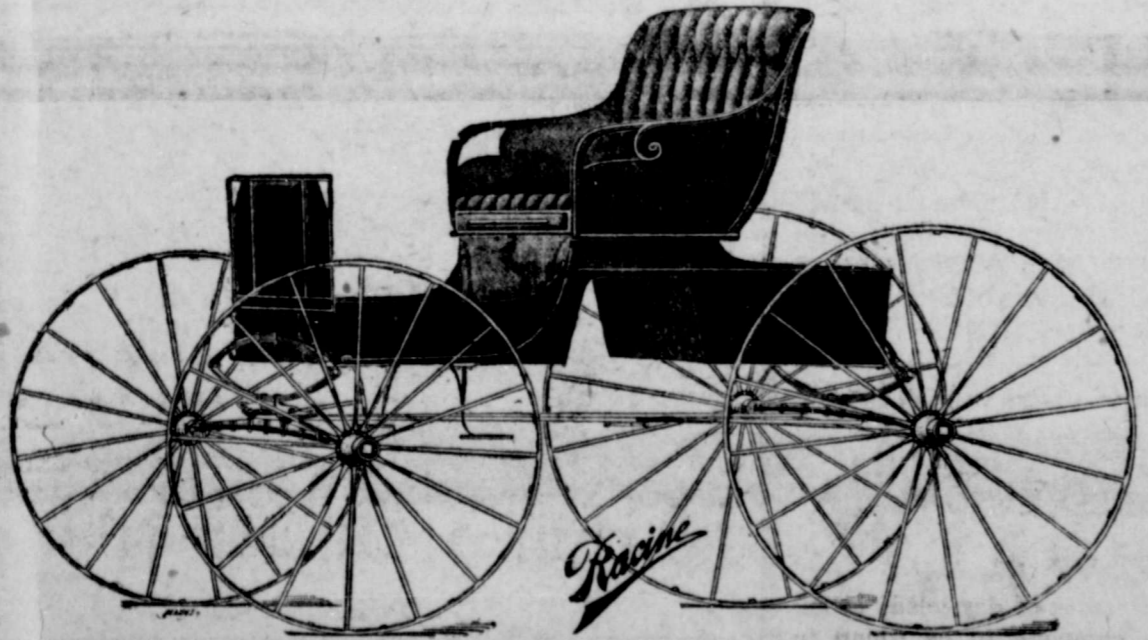
