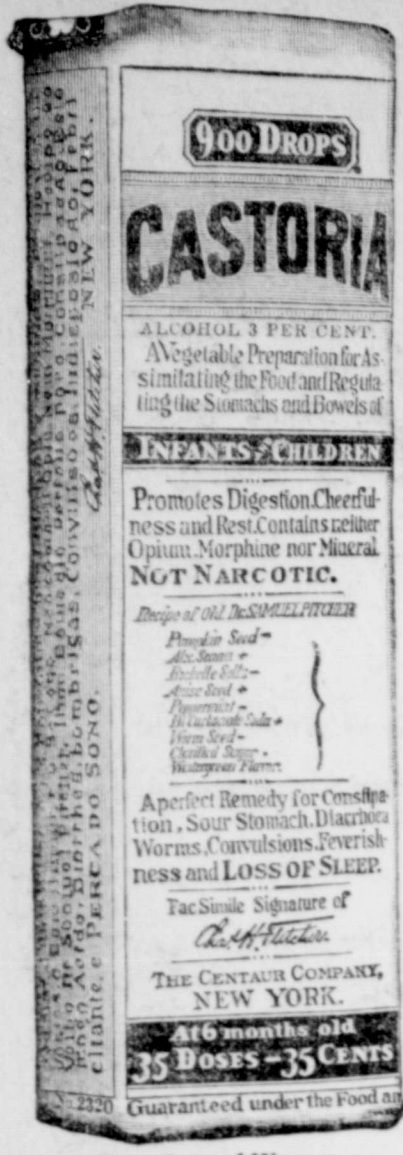

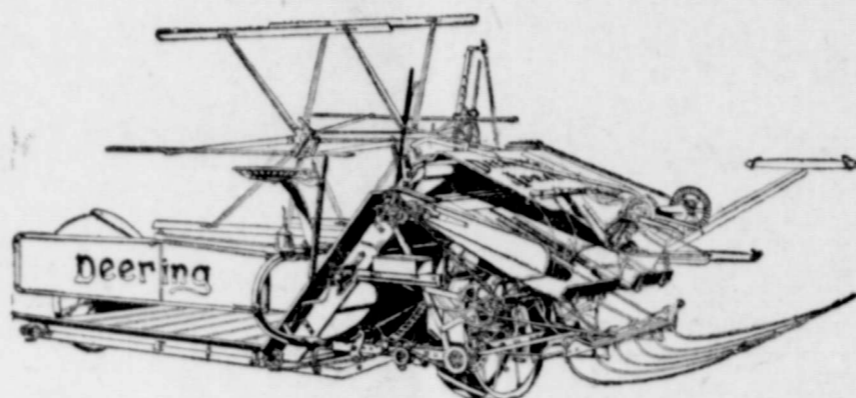

### SUCCESSFUL TRAP FOR PESTS

New Invention Said to Lure Mosquitoes to Their Doom in Manner Highly Desirable.

Some one has invented a night trap for mosquitoes which, according to Chambers' Journal, has proved successful under exacting tests.

The contrivance depends on the use of the luminous paint that Dr. Balmain invented some years ago. In this paint there is no phosphorus. The mosquito trap is a short glass cylinder, about six inches in length and one inch in diameter. The interior surface of it is coated with Balmain compound, and the ends are sealed. On the outer surface of the glass there is a coat of adhesive substance like that on ordinary fly paper, and the tube hangs by a string in any convenient place.

Exposure to daylight causes the Balmain paint to collect and store up sunlight, which it throws off at night. The faint, steady glow attracts the insects, and as there is no heat about the light the mosquitoes settle upon the glass and are caught by the adhesive.

When it is necessary to clean the trap you take a piece of wood—a match will do—and scrape off the insects and then apply a fresh coating of the adhesive.

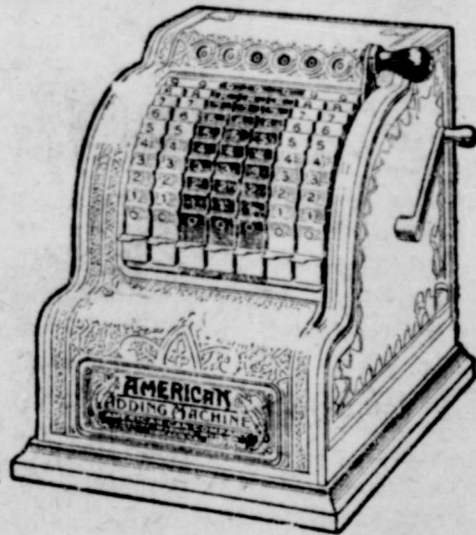

## MAKES GOOD SHOWING

### WATER AND LIGHT DEPARTMENT FLOURISHING.

Board of Managing Trustees Makes Report on Condition of Municipal System.

Feeling that the citizens of Brady are interested in the financial status of the city water and light department, the board of managing trustees has furnished The Standard with a statement covering the time since the city took over the business of the old Brady Water & Light Co., on December 12, 1912 to the first of the present month.

The statement shows that the business is in good condition, and with the same careful management as that of the past sixteen months, will not only discharge the large debt against the property, but will earn a sufficient revenue to keep the system up with the development of the town.

The first board of trustees was composed of Mayor F. M. Richards, Judge J. E. Shropshire and E. L. Ogden, and the system was turned over to them on December 12, 1912. The trustees began without a cent of funds on hand, and in addition to this handicap they were forced to borrow money from the local banks with which to erect a building for the light department, a state law prohibiting a use of the funds derived from the sale of the waterworks bonds for this purpose. This building was erected at a cost of approximately \$2,500, and is fire proof throughout.

Until this building could be erected it was necessary to operate the light plant of the old company, while the new filter plant was used for supplying water. This necessitated the use of two crews, as well as a double fuel expense. As soon as the new building was completed the dynamos, switch boards, panels, etc., were moved in. An advance of four or five cents a gallon in the price of gasoline at about this time made the use of the big gasoline engine almost prohibitive, while the use of the large steam engine for both day and night was impractical. To overcome this difficulty a small dynamo, with attached steam engine, costing \$1,500, was installed to take care of the day load. By this means the daily fuel expense was reduced from \$25 to \$14.

On account of a boiler installed in the filter plant proving defective it was necessary to purchase a new one a few months ago. This improvement, together with the expenses incident to installation, amounted to about \$1,500.

Improvements to the system made since the city took charge amount to \$8,507.24, the different items being as follows: Material and labor for extensions on distributing system, \$1,927.73; new material and extensions at plant, \$2,610.38; labor on outside extensions, \$804.72; labor on plant extensions, \$664.41; building for light plant, \$2,500.00.

The plant is now being operated at a net revenue of approximately \$600 per month. The interest on the indebtedness against the system amounts to \$3,220 annually, while the net revenue is \$7,200 per annum. At these figures the entire obligation will be liquidated in a little less than twelve years. At present there is a floating debt against the system amounting to about \$1,000.

The citizens of Brady should feel that the system belongs to

them, and they should support it and lend every encouragement to the board of trustees who are serving practically without remuneration.

The present board consists of Mayor A. C. Baze, Judge J. E. Shropshire and John P. Sheridan, the latter having been appointed last November to succeed Mr. Ogden, who, resigned on account of a press of other business.

### TEXAS FISH LAW.

Text of New Law Which Applies In This County.

As the fishing season opens many have made inquiry as to the catching of fish in fresh water streams in Texas. There seems to be some misunderstanding of the statute passed by the last legislature, and for the information of Brady and McCulloch county fishermen that portion of the law which applies to this and adjacent counties is given below:

"It shall be unlawful for any person to catch any fish in the public fresh water rivers, creeks, lakes, bayous, pools, lagoons, or tanks of this state by any other means than by the ordinary hook and line or trout line or by net or drag net sein the meshes of which are less than three inches square, or trammel net the meshes of any part of which are less than four inches square or by a minnow sein no more than twenty feet in length, and it shall be unlawful for any person to place in public fresh water rivers, creeks, lakes, bayous, pools lagoons or tanks of this state any net or other device or trap for taking or catching fish other than set net or drag net or sein, the meshes of which are less than four inches square. Any person violating any provision of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be fined any sum not less than \$25 or more than \$100. All the fresh water streams or bayous emptying into the tidal waters of this state are, for the purpose of this act hereby declared fresh water streams to their mouths."
