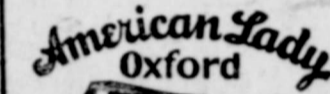

AUTOISTS REACH HERE

PARTY SEVERAL HOURS LATE INTO BRADY.

Officials of National Highway Association Enthusiastic Over Reception Here.

The party representing the National Highway association in logging the route between San Antonio and San Angelo arrived in this city from Mason Tuesday shortly after 1:00 o'clock nearly four hours behind the time scheduled for their arrival. The party is headed by Col. A. L. Westgard, official logger for the American Automobile association, and D. E. Colp of San Antonio, vice president of the National Highway association. Others included in the party were the chauffeur and a motion picture camera operator.

The autoists left San Antonio Monday morning traveling in two cars—a Ford runabout and a big Premier 6. Very rough roads were encountered south of Mason, and the party was delayed several hours at Mason by the breaking of a spring on the big car which delayed their arrival here.

A large delegation of Brady

citizens headed by W. D. Crothers, D. F. Savage and Secretary T. P. Grant of the Commercial club went to Katemey Tuesday morning to meet the party and pilot them into the city, but on account of the delay in Mason many of the local citizens returned to the city before the autoists reached the county line.

Upon their arrival here they were greeted by a large delegation of enthusiastic citizens in autos and after lunch at the Queen hotel motion pictures of a monster auto parade were made, something like 100 cars being in line.

Shortly before 2:00 o'clock the party left for San Angelo via Eden and Paint Rock, accompanied by a pilot car from the Brady Auto company, carrying Secretary T. P. Grant and D. F. Savage and Ed. Lemberg of Mason, who will make the trip through to Plainview, where the annual meeting of the highway association is to be held today and where the route for the Colorado-to-the-Gulf highway will be determined.

Both Col. Westgard and Mr. Colp expressed satisfaction at the reception given them at Brady, stating that it was the most cordial received since leaving San Antonio Monday. They also stated that they

were favorably impressed with the route as far as traversed, although it is conceded to be the most difficult portion of the road to be encountered in the state.

The Commercial club has raised the funds incident to the expense of securing the adoption of the route through Brady, and the citizens of the town and county are leaving nothing undone in their efforts to bring the road this way. About \$500 is necessary and this amount was raised Monday by W. D. Crothers and the money

has been collected as to the credit of the county, although it is conceded to be the most difficult portion of the road to be encountered in the state. Local citizens are very anxious that the road be finished through Brady, confident that such a thoroughfare would prove more profitable to the town and community than the acquisition of a third railroad. The result of the sale of Plainview today was deemed satisfactory and interest by citizens of this section.

Our prohibition friends are fond of saying that the world would be far better off if the "curse of drink" were wiped out of existence.
We agree with them. But the "curse of drink" means intemperance—drunkenness.


Painfully Injured.

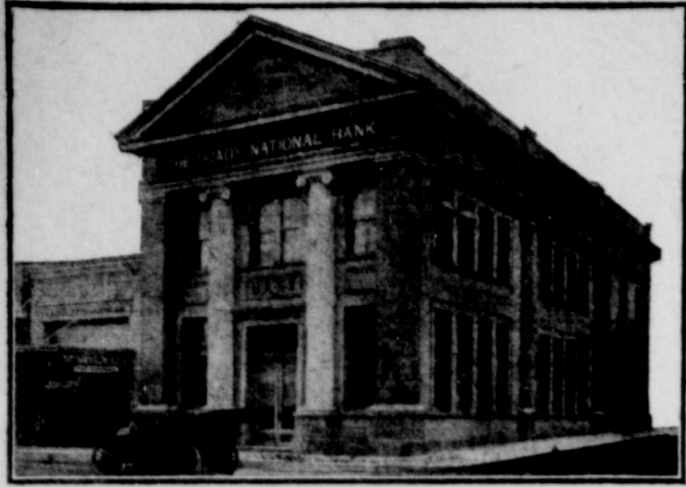
