BEN NOLAN DROWNED

MEETS DEATH IN BRADY CREEK WEDNESDAY.

Had Been Bathing and Fell In
Epileptic Fit and Rolls
Into Stream.

Ben Nolan, a young man aged about 28 years was drowned in Brady creek about 150 yards east of the bridge on the Coleman road at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

The young man, who is a victim of epileptic attacks, told his mother, with whom he makes his home, in the western portion of the city, that he was going to the creek, and requested that she accompany him. She did not do so, however, telling him that she did not feel very well, and cautioned her son not to get near the water, fearing that he might suffer an attack and fall into the creek.

On reaching the creek young Nolan found a number of small boys in bathing, and in response to their requests, stripped off and plunged into the water. He was an excellent swimmer and delighted the youngsters for several minutes by diving from the high banks. After spending some time in the water, he an-

nounced that he was going out and climbed out on the bank, which was very steep, and it is thought that the exertion in getting out induced an epileptic, the unfortunate young man falling back into the water just as he had reached the level ground above the water. The body immediately sank, and his companions state that he did not rise again to the surface nor make any struggle whatever. The supposition that the victim suffered an attack after getting out of the water is further strengthened by the fact that the water where the drowning occurred was not more than four and a half or five feet deep, and the victim could very easily have saved himself had he been in normal condition.

On seeing that their companion did not rise to the surface after falling into the water, one of the small boys ran to the county jail about a hundred yards from the scene and gave the alarm. Odom Martin, a son of Jailer John Martin, happened to be at the jail when the boys reached there, and immediately ran to the scene, while Mrs. Martin phoned up-town for physicians. On reaching the creek young Martin had no difficulty in locating and bringing the body to the surface, but on account of the steep bank, could not get the body out of the water. The body had been in

the water perhaps ten minutes when he got there, and all that he could do was to keep the head above water until help arrived.

A reporter for The Standard, in company with Drs. J. B. Granville, J. S. Anderson and J. G. McCall, was the first to reach the scene. The body was gotten up onto the bank and everything possible done in an effort to resuscitate the victim, but without avail. The usual method of working the arms of a victim of drowning failed to restore respiration and efforts of the physicians to get any water from the lungs further strengthened the belief of an epileptic attack.

No inquest was held over the remains, and the body was carried to the home, where it was prepared for burial.

The story of young Nolan's life is a pathetic one. Up to the time he was three years of age, he was strong and robust as the average child, both mentally and physically. One day, in crawling about the house he found a quantity of gum camphor, and child-like, ate a large quantity of it before being discovered by his mother. He was thrown into convulsions by the effects of the drug, and from that time to the day of his death he has been subject to epileptic attacks. His mother, now a widow, has spent all she possessed in an effort to effect a cure, but always without success, and the chief

desire of her heart since learning of his helpless condition has been to protect the unfortunate son from just such an untimely death as he met Wednesday, and her grief on learning that her son was dead was most poignant.

His mother, a brother, Missou Nolan, an employee of A. W. Keller, and a sister, Mrs. Bumgardner, are surviving relatives.

Funeral services took place yesterday morning at 10:00 o'clock, Rev. I. T. Morris, pastor of the Methodist church, being in charge. Interment was made in the city cemetery.

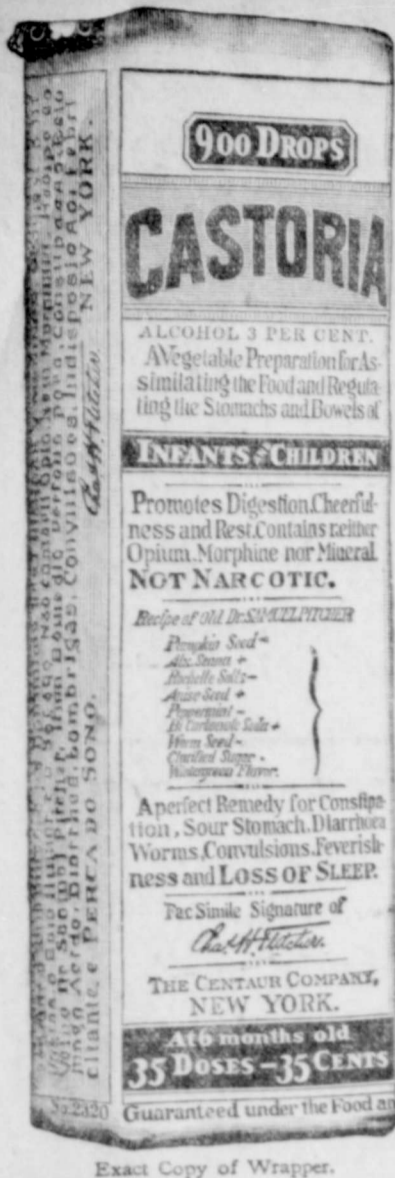
Installs Masonic Officers.



DON'T STOP CULTIVATION.

Corn and Cotton Crops Often Laid By Too Soon.

In the country correspondence of the press of the State, the statement is becoming frequent that "the farmers are almost ready to lay by their corn and cotton". Texas has had an unusually wet spring, which very probably indicates a dry summer and it is a well known fact that plants do not root deeply if there has ever been a time in the wet springs. Therefore, when the crops should receive frequent shallow cultivation, up to the time of making the ear or the opening of the boll, that time is now. Maintaining the soil mulch by cultivation will be greatly needed if there should be a season drouth. Two or three late plowings of corn have been known to make a difference of from five to twenty per cent in the yields, and this difference expressed in dollars and cents will mean a good deal later on. Farmers should not be too ready to "lay by", since keeping at it will make the crops more profitable.

Here is the advice given to the farmers by Colonel Exall: "We quit cultivating all our crops too soon; laying by a crop, which means throwing a little earth to it and deserting it, costs this country a hundred million dollars a year. If I should tell you that the Fair Association had offered \$500 as a premium for the best yearling steer that

would be shown this year, and that I had bought a good calf on the first of January that would be just the right age to show in October, that I had fed him properly balanced ration, right in quality and quantity, had taken first class care of him in every way and that he had responded splendidly to the treatment and that on the first day of July he weighed 900 pounds and I had said to him: 'Buck, you have often heard me say that I am going to show you at the Fair and hope to win a premium. Now, it is true that the grass is a little short and the water is somewhat scarce and that there are ticks and mosquitoes and other things to contend with, but you have had such an unusual opportunity in the early part of your life, your are so vigorous, big, and strong that it seems to me that you ought to be able from now on to take care of yourself, I want to go fishing; there is the pasture; do the very best you can and meet me on the first of October and we will show, and I hope that we can win a prize.'

"You have possibly carefully prepared your land. I hope that you have selected your seed with care, that you have planted and cultivated it, keeping up a constant mulch cultivation, so as to lose no moisture by capillary attraction or unnecessary evaporation, and that you have not allowed any weed to get any nutriment or moisture that the crop should have, that you have religiously done all these things until the corn is four feet high, vigorous and strong with a large amount of live weight to sustain and is just getting ready to determine whether it will raise one ear to the stalk or two ears, big ears or little ears, or no ears,

according to whether there is enough food to sustain life, and then produce a crop, you as a rule treat it just as I treated Buck—throw a little earth to it, say that you have "laid by" and go fishing or somewhere else, and leave it to fight the hot winds, the dry earth, the suckers and the weeds and get ready to perform its life work. You cannot expect, under any circumstances, to win any more than I could expect to win with my prize steer Buck."

Other crops of like nature should be cultivated with shallow cultivation that cuts no root but does prevent loss by evaporation and loss by growth of weeds, until they are fully matured.

The significant facts contained in the report are: Texas has more counties than any other state in the Union; Rhode Island has the smallest number. The largest county in the United States is San Bernardino, California and contains 20,157 square miles; Bristol County, Rhode Island is the smallest and its area is 24 square miles. All states with the exception of Louisiana are divided into counties and its subdivisions are known as parishes. In the entire United States there are 2,987 counties, 19 independent cities, and one national park.

The counties of Texas lead the nation in many respects. Ellis County, Texas, leads all other counties in the value of farm crops produced annually.
