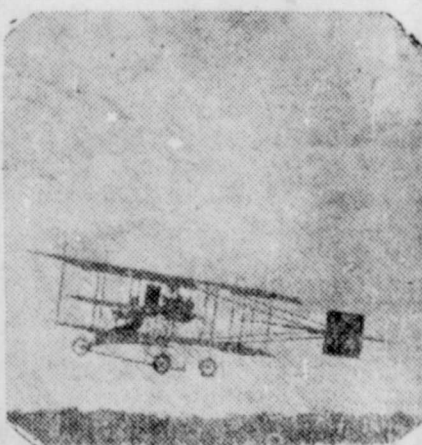

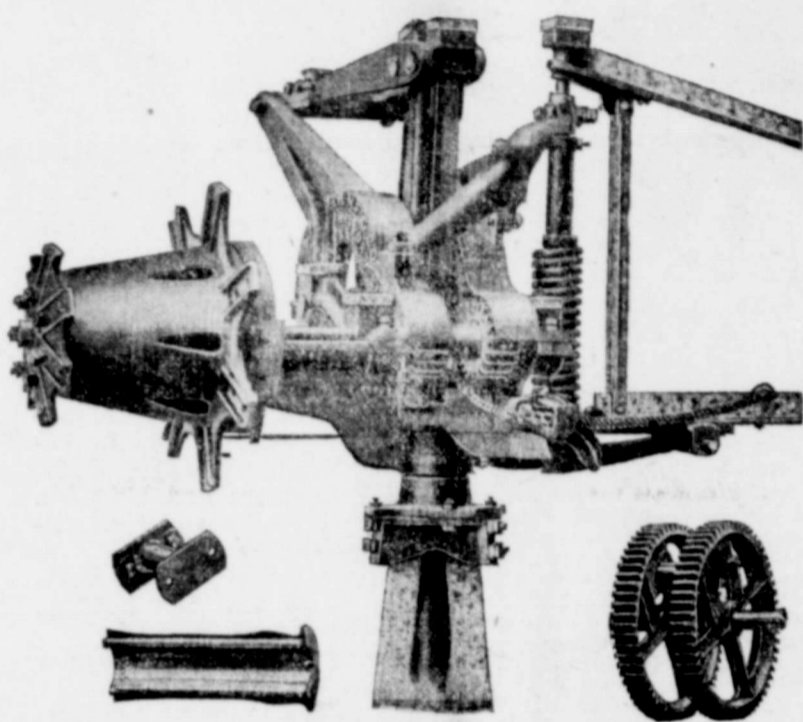

Statement.

By the Rev. J. T. Tracy, Pastor Methodist Church, Mason, Texas, July 15th.

"I was in Llano Monday, July 6, and was in Mr. George Watkins' hardware store where I met one of Mr. M. D. Slator's campaign managers who asked me how Judge Slator was running in Mason County. I told him I thought he would carry Mason County by a good majority; that I was thinking of supporting him myself, but needed more information about the matter. He told me that Slator, though an anti in principle, had declared himself for Ball for Governor. He asked what effect the article in the San Antonio Light, to the effect that Slator would support Ferguson, was having on the prohibition vote in Mason county. I told

him that the Light was not generally circulated in Mason County, and that I thought it was not generally known that such a statement had been made. He said he did not know if Mr. Slator was responsible for the article or not, and he expected Slator would support Ball. I said if he is for Ball he ought to publish a denial of that article. He said, 'No, the campaign managers would not allow him to correct that report, if he (Slator) desired to do so, as San Antonio is a strong anti city and must be carried for Slator, and if he corrected it he would lose great prestige there, and that the statement would catch the Ferguson vote for Slator, while the fact that his declaration for Ball would help in the dry counties in the northern part of the district.' He said further,

'Now, I am sure he will support Ball. I am going to find out, and if he is for Ferguson I can't say that I will vote for him myself, for I know that he declared positively that he would not support Ferguson, from the beginning, but would vote for Ball.' I asked if it was the policy of Mr. Slator to deceive both ends of the district. He said, 'It is the policy of the committee to elect Slator, therefore we want him to explain to the committee but not to the public.' I told the gentleman that I could not support such a policy, and that it would lose Mr Slator a large per cent of the self-respecting vote of Mason County if it became generally known.

Secretary Broad of the general committee was instructed to notify all committeemen of their appointment, and to instruct each committee to meet

with the general committee at the Commercial National bank this afternoon at 5:00 o'clock to make their reports.

Several of the above committees have already completed the tasks assigned them, while all others are hard at work and will see that their duties are completed in ample time.

The entertainment committee has arranged for speeches by the two leading candidates for governor if they can be secured, and if found impossible for them to attend in person they will be ably represented by speakers of state reputation. The biggest feather in the cap of this committee, however, is the securing of two airship flights by Fred DeKor, one of the foremost aviators of the United States. Mr. DeKor arrived in the city yesterday afternoon from Austin, and arrangements for the flights here were completed last night. He is probably the oldest active man in the flying game today, having been in the business for the past four years, and has given exhibitions all over the United States. He uses a Curtis machine of the latest improved type, having a 60-horse motor, and the many hair-raising stunts that he executes while in the air has earned for him a wide reputation as one of the most daring of the American birdmen. Mr. DeKor will make two flights, the first at 3:30 and another at 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon. This feature of the day alone is worth coming many miles to witness.

The big barbecue dinner will also be a feature of the day worthy of note. The committee in charge of this feature has made all the arrangements necessary to feed a crowd of 5000 people, having already contracted for 1000 pounds of beef and mutton, 2000 loaves of bread, sweet and sour pickles by the barrel, and plenty of coffee and sugar.

The advertising committee has sent out 5000 large circulars to all railroad points between Brownwood and Menard on the Frisco and from Lampasas to Eden on the Santa Fe, as well as to every postoffice and store in this and surrounding counties. The railroads have been especially liberal with the local committees in the matter of excursion rates, having granted a one-fare rate for the round trip. The west bound Santa Fe due to leave at 4:00 o'clock will be held until 5:00, and the Frisco will arrange their schedule for the accommodation of visitors from both north and south.

The committees in charge of the big celebration have made arrangements for the entertainment of at least 5000 people, and it is confidently expected that this number will attend. They hope to make this one of the biggest events in the history of Brady, and the entire citizenship joins them in extending a hearty invitation to all to come and spend the day.



SOIL CONSERVATION.

Plant Cow Peas or Soy Beans On Your Stubble Land.

The following advice from Colonel Exall, relative to restoration of the lands upon which small grain crops have been grown through the planting of soil-building legumes was given to the press several years ago. It is especially timely just now and the Congress urges the farmers and asks the farmer's friends to urge that this advice be followed wherever possible.

"The small grain crop of the State is now being harvested. If the land is allowed to lie idle it will very soon be covered with weeds that will go to seed and greatly increase this nuisance next year. If it has no crop on it with roots to protect and hold the soil together, and the season is excessively wet, it will waste from washing and thus lose a large amount of its soluble plant food. If the ground is dry and hard, the rain that should sink in would run off and leave the ground in bad condition for fall plowing.

Practically all of these troubles can be avoided and the fertility of the land greatly increased by disking it thoroughly, if it is loose enough to prepare a good seed bed this way, and if not, by plowing and harrowing it just as quickly as possible after the crop is removed, and drilling from a peck to a half bushel of peas or soy beans to the acre.

The peas will grow if the soil

is properly prepared and make splendid pasture for cattle or hogs in the early fall, and hay if you care to cut it, and a very profitable crop to turn under as green manure to add to the humus, pliability and fertility of the soil.

Peas and beans being leguminous plants, vegetable bacteria form their nodules, or tiny homes, upon the roots and increase and multiply under favorable conditions, at a fabulous rate. It has been estimated that these vegetable animals, as it were, double themselves every twenty minutes, that is, they mature in that time and separate into two individuals, each of which ripens, as it were, in the next twenty minutes and divides again into two, both going to housekeeping for themselves, and so on, in geometrical ratio; where there was one a week ago there are a billion now. If the soil is sweet, that is, does not lack lime, there seems to be hardly any end to the increasing powers of these little entities. Their special value is in the fact that they bring nitrogen from the air into the soil and rapidly transform it into nitrates suitable for plant food.

It has been estimated that where conditions are favorable and the soil has been thoroughly inoculated with bacteria from growing peas, beans, alfalfa, or some other leguminous crop, that the nitrogen brought into the land annually from this source could not be purchased for less than \$20 or \$30 per acre. As nitrogen is absolutely essential to plant growth and is one of the most expensive of the mineral plant foods, it should be clear to every one that it is infinitely more profitable to grow leguminous cover-crops than other crops of the same weight that return just as much humus to the soil but do not draw nitrogen from the atmosphere.

Plant peas and beans on your stubble land and plant them now.
