Another piece of "bad business" on the part of the farmer is in holding his cotton for better prices-no matter what the prevailing price may be. If cotton is worth 15c per pound. the farmer will figure that it ought to go to 16c, and if circumstances will permit, he will hold for that price. It seems to us that it would be a better plan to estimate the cost of production, and when the price will give him a fair profit, then sell. So long as the price is such that a fair return on the investment and the year's labor is guaranteed the farmer has no good cause for holding the cotton for better prices, and
