#### KILLING AT MENARD

##### COUNTY ATTORNEY VICTIM OF SHOOTING AFFRAY

City Marshal Frank Hamby in Jail on Murder Charge—Locks Self Up After Shooting.

As a result of a shooting affray in Menard yesterday morning County Attorney Fred R. King is dead and City Marshal Frank Hamby is confined in the county jail, charged with murder.

The full particulars of the tragedy are not known here, but from the most reliable sources obtainable, it seems that there has been ill feeling existing between the two men for some time. The first news came yesterday afternoon in a telephone message to Jas. Bevans of this city, but little of the particulars were given.

From the best information which can be gathered, it is understood that Hamby had discovered King gambling a few days ago, and had made remarks about the occurrence on the streets. When the two men met on one of the principal streets Wednesday a fight took place, in which Hamby was bested. Friends separated the two

men, and it was thought that no further trouble would result. Yesterday morning shortly before 11:00 o'clock King walked into the Legal Tender saloon, passing on through to the rear of the building and then turned back toward the front door. When only a few feet from the door and immediately in front of the bar, Hamby walked in at the front door. According to the statement of an eyewitness, Hamby is alleged to have drawn his revolver on seeing King, while King ran toward Hamby and attempted to take the gun away from him. In the struggle which followed two shots were fired, one of the bullets striking King in the lower bowels and the other in the breast. He sank to the floor and died within five minutes.

Sheriff Spiller being out of the city at the time of the shooting, Marshal Hamby walked to the county jail and locked himself in a cell to await examining trial, which will probably be held tomorrow.

King was a young man, probably 30 or 35 years of age, and was married about a year ago to Miss Pearl Lemons of this city. He has served as county attorney for the past several years, and is said to have been an able and fearless prosecutor.
