L. Himrod and C. Tiedeman, <br> Representing Syndicate, Make <br> a Definite Offer <br> An opportunity for securing a line of railway extending from Austin to Lamesa via Johnson City, Fredericksburg, Mason, Brady, Paint Rock, Ballinger and Big Springs, was placed before the Brady Commercial club at the directors' meeting yesterday afternoon by Jas. L. Himrod of New Orleans and C. Tiedeman of Dallas, representing a syndicate of Dallas and New Orleans capitalists. <br> Messrs. Hinrod and Tiedeman arrived in the city yesterday morning from Dallas, and were taken in charge by Secretary T. P. Grant of the Commercial club, and in company with D. F. Savage and Wilbur Lee were taken over the proposed route north of Brady as far as Broadmoor. <br> After thoroughly inspecting the country, and securing data on the topography, the party returned to the city shortly before noon. <br> According to Mr. Himrod's statement to the directors of the Commercial club, he is representing Henry J. Cox of Alexandria, La., E. P. Turner of Dallas, and a syndicate of New Orleans and Dallas financiers, who have, unlike most railroad promoters, arranged for financing the project before doing any preliminary work. The matter of building this line of road has been under consideration by Mr. Cox for the past three years, and much of the details have been worked out by him. <br> The matter of bonuses to be asked by the company has been determined by the promoters, and the amount asked of Brady placed at $\$ 100,000$. This sum is to be paid in five annual payments, and of this amount they agree to expend $\$ 40$,000 here for round houses, shops, administration buildings, etc., and make Brady a division point. None of this bonus is to become due and payable until the road is completed into the city, when the first installment of $\$ 20,000$ will be due and like sum each year thereafter until the full amount is paid. <br> Several of the directors present expressed themselves as being very anxious to secure such a road as that proposed, and asserted their willingness | to co-operate in every way pos- <br> sible to secure it. <br> It was decided to call a mass meeting of the citizens at the court house next Monday night at 8 o'clock, at which time the proposition will be thoroughly gone into, and whatever steps necessary to secure the road will be taken. To arrange for this meeting and to work up an interest in the matter VicePresident Crothers appointed the following committee: <br> R. Stone, F. M. Richards, <br> A. Adkins, F. M. Newman, J <br> E. Shropshire and Jas. H. Ba- <br> ker. <br> A line of railway through the route proposed by Mr. Himrod and associates would traverse a rich section of country now entirely without transportation facilities, and open up some of the richest coal and mineral deposits in the entire state Such a road would give a direct outlet to the gulf from this section of the state, and thus prove farming and cattle interests.
