COLLECTOR NAMED

Council Appoints City Marshal Anderson Sanitary Collector

At a call session of the city courcil last Tuesday City Marshal J. M. Anderson was chosen as collector for the Sanitary Department, an office created by the adoption of the new sanitary code a short time

Under the provisions of the new sanitary code, it becomes the duty of every citizen to procure a permit from the collector to maintain a closet or privy and also to pay for sanitary work in connection therewith quarterly, semi-annually or annually in advance. The rates adopted are slightly higher than under the old system, but provision is made for cleaning closets in private residences twice a week from March to November, whereas, under the old law this was only required to be done once a month. In public places provision is made for doing this work as often as is necessary to keep the premises in

Aviator Wilson is the only man who ever accidentally fell 4,000 feet to the earth and lived to tell the story. This he did at Italy, Texas, in January, 1911. He hit the ground so hard that he was driven into the earth almost up to his knees. His fall was so great that he broke his shoe strings in six pieces, broke both feet, three ribs, both ankles, one arm and tore one kidney loose; he was unconscious for five weeks and remained in the hospital for nearly four months, only come forth ready to try for greater altitude records and greater achievements in his chosen profession.
