## BRADY IS THE FIRST

STATE WAREHOUSE NO. 1 WILL BE LOCATED HERE

Application of Commissioners' Court Approved—Ed Jacoby Will be Named Manager

At a meeting of commissioners' court, last Monday, application was made to Commissioner of Insurance and Banking Collier for the establishment of a cotton warehouse at Brady under state supervision, as provided by the emergency warehouse bill recently enacted by the special session of the legislature.

The application, together with the necessary legal forms and recommendations of manager were made up by County Judge Harvey Walker and Judge J. E. Shropshire and forwarded to Austin Tuesday. Sunday afternoon Judge Walker received the following letter from the department of insurance and banking, which is self-explanatory:

"We are in receipt of your application to this department for the establishment of a warehouse under the control and supervision of the State of Texas. Also the contract arrangement made between the commissioners' court and this department.

"The contract has our approval and will be filed in our office. I enclose you herewith bond in the sum of \$10,000 to be executed by Mr. Ed Jacoby, who was recommended by your commissioners' court and will receive the appointment from this department.

"Upon return of the bond executed, a certificate will be issued to him approving his appointment as manager of Warehouse or warehouses in Brady, McCulloch County, Texas.

"For your information will state that we have had several applications, but none up to the present moment as definite as yours, therefore we are giving you the benefit of the first application and will number your warehouse "One," same being the first warehouse established in the State of Texas, under the emergency warehouse law.

"Also the certificate of Mr. Jacoby has this day been made out and upon return of the enclosed bond duly executed and approved by you such certificate will be immediately forwarded.

"We are unable at the present moment to furnish you with the necessary tags, warehouse receipts, books and other stationery for the reason that as soon

as the emergency law was passed and approved by the governor, the order was placed and it requires so much time to get them from the different printers and stationers.

"We have, promised us by them, all supplies on or about the first of the month and as soon as same are received by us we will immediately forward to you or the manager all necessary supplies to begin operation under the state supervision.

"In the meantime, I would suggest that if you have any cotton to be placed in storage and have issued any receipts for same, that you instruct each party so storing to place such receipts in the hands of some responsible party to be cancelled as soon as you are able to furnish them with the proper receipts furnished by our office.

"If there is any assistance that this office can render you in establishing such warehouse or any information that we may be able to furnish you we will be glad to do so.

"I desire to congratulate you upon being the first one to receive state supervision and hope that success will crown your endeavors."

## TWO MEXICANS DEAD

MYSTERIOUSLY MURDERED SATURDAY NIGHT

Jose Rangel and Andres Martinez Victims of Blood-thirsty Assassin

In a mysterious manner Jose Rangel and Andres Martinez, Mexican citizens living a few miles east of the city, met death Saturday night about 8 o'clock while walking from town out to their homes.

The bodies of the two men were first discovered by A. T. Eklund, who was returning home from a visit to his father's. Shortly after leaving his father's home he passed two Mexicans sitting beside the prostrate bodies of two others at the roadside. He suspected that something was wrong, and upon reaching the residence of Henry Carlson, a short distance away, stopped and asked Mr. Carlson to get into the buggy with him and return by another route to the city and get officers to go out and investigate.

On reaching the city Mr. Eklund told Sheriff J. C. Wall of the mysterious circumstances. Mr. Wall, in company with Deputy John Martin left immediately for the scene, which is about two miles from the business section of the city. Upon their arrival, they found the bodies of the two men at the point described by Mr. Eklund, but the other two had disappeared.

Rangel's body had been horribly mutilated by the blood-thirsty assassin or assassins, he being entirely disemboweled with a large dirk. The body was stretched out and the victim's hat placed over the wound. A bullet from a large calibre revolver had been fired through the body, entering the back at a point just underneath the shoulder blade. It is thought that this wound produced instant death, and the murderer later used the dirk to wreak still further vengeance upon the unfortunate man. A large dirk with a blade about nine inches in length was found in Rangel's hand, but evidently had been placed there after he was killed, as the fingers were open, the knife lying loosely in the hand.

The body of Martinez was lying near that of his companion, and his hat, too, had been placed upon his body. A deep stab wound in the stomach evidently resulted in death, but slight flesh wounds were found on the forehead, across the breast and on one of his knees.

Sheriff Wall and Deputy Martin immediately began a search for the murderers, going first to a camp on the C. O. Hanson farm, where the two men who were last seen with the murdered men, were living, hoping to find some evidence in bloody clothing before the men had opportunity to destroy them. The search, however, revealed nothing of an incriminating nature. Attention was then directed to other Mexicans who could possibly throw some light on the case. One Mexican witness was found who said that he had passed Rangel and Martinez at a point about where the bodies were found, in company with Luis Valdez and Pedro Masias.

A few minutes after he passed them, and when about 200 yards down the road, he heard a revolver shot in the direction in which the four men were. He stopped his horse and waited several minutes to listen. Shortly after hearing the shot, one of the Mexicans came up with him, climbed into his buggy and instructed him to "vamoose." He complied with the order promptly, and the man rode with him to the Eklund farm, where he got out of the buggy and went in the direction of a Mexican camp located on the farm.

Sunday morning the task of running down the murderers was again taken up by Messrs. Wall and Martin, and a thorough search of all camps made. Evidence sufficient to warrant the arrest of Valadez and Masias was discovered Sunday morning, but the murder had given the Mexicans of the community such a scare that practically all the camps broke up early that morning and the inhabitants left for other localities. It was learned that Valadez and Masias had started to the Scott place, south of the city, and the officers went in pursuit, overtaking and placing them under arrest near the Tom Dial place. They were brought to the city and placed in the county jail.

One theory of the officers in regard to the crime made it necessary to take Rosendo and Andres Martinez, Jr., sons of one of the murdered men, into custody, and they were lodged in jail yesterday morning, also charged with the crime. It is pointed out that it was possible that Rangel and Martinez quarreled and that the latter was killed with the dirk. When Martinez's sons came along and discovered that their father had been killed, they shot Rangel, and then, to show their vengeance, mutilated his body and placed the dirk, which belonged to their father, in the hand of their victim.

The evidence which connects Valadez and Masias with the crime is the fact that they were last seen with the dead men, and left town about dark to walk to their camp with them. The only motive assigned for them committing the crime—and a good one—is robbery. Rangel is known to have received \$85 in cash from his employer Saturday afternoon, but when the body was searched Saturday night by Sheriff Wall

no money was found. When the body was being prepared for burial later, however, \$10 was found, but the other \$75 is unaccounted for. Inquiry at the banks disclose the fact that Rangel had deposited no funds since the 12th.

Both victims of the tragedy are well known here, having lived in and near this city for the past four or five years. They came here from Del Rio, where they resided for several years, and were said to be staunch friends. The only point to sustain the theory that they engaged in a fight on Saturday night is the fact that both had been drinking heavily. Each had a large family of children.

## WHY DEFINITENESS PAYS IN ADVERTISING

Here and there one finds a merchant who says he has tried advertising but never made it pay. The chances are ten to one that he simply needs to study definiteness.

The principle of the specific fact, and the specific instance affect all writing and speaking. They make one man's advertising a partial failure, while another's is a money getter.

If one man visits a strange city, he comes back talking something like this: "It was fine, grand, splendid." His talk evaporates into vague, general phrases. The people who hear him talk know no more about that city than before. He has few listeners, whatever his subject of conversation.

Another man remarks about the same town that it is full of buildings 20 stories high, that the streets were so crowded he had to wait ten minutes at one crosswalk to get over, and that people were always in a hurry and the street railway conductors always said "Step lively."

After such a man has talked a few moments you get some idea about the place he describes—you see it with your own eyes.

Every man who ever made a success as a newspaper writer has learned that you must give personal incidents and actual happenings to make any kind of news article interesting.

Just the same in advertising. If you merely say "Best stock in town" the reader may or may not believe you. Try picking out the best values in your store, give a few details about them so the purchaser sees with his own eyes, gets some idea what they are; then name the price. The reader then sees the bargain with his own eyes, is interested and feels a desire to buy.

That is all there is to good advertising. It does not require wit, nor literary, nor technical skill. Just "come down to brass tacks." Give the plain facts about an article as you would talk to a buyer over the counter. Try it and see!

The Hamilton Herald says: "Any county that can raise 20,000 bales of cotton can support a cotton mill. Why shouldn't Hamilton have one? \* \* \* The cotton mill at Post City gives employment to about 300 persons and its products are in demand everywhere. Men who

have a surplus crop of cotton could put the cotton in as stock and we would not have to ship our crop to Europe and pay the freight on it. \* \* \* In North and South Carolina every little town has a cotton mill. Some counties have three or four mills. It takes money, of course. But it also takes cotton, and money can be borrowed on cotton. Comanche, Dublin, Stephenville, Gatesville, and other towns in the cotton belt ought to have a mill. Why not Hamilton?"

This seems one of the seven modern wonders of the world. Grown, picked, ginned, baled, hauled, shipped, the raw product pays freight, tare, insurance, buyers and manufacturers' charges, and then the United States buys back from England and Germany alone \$33,000,000 per year of the same, made up into cotton goods—and pays all the charges returning. Then, as if this were not folly enough, United States commerce is staggered and we are left to sweat it out if Europe fails to agree on who is "it."

## CONCERNING NEW ROAD

### Robert Lee Citizens Accept Proposition of J. L. Himrod.

The following items from the Ballinger Banner-Ledger of last week concerning the line of railway from Austin to Lamesa via Fredericksburg, Mason, Brady, Ballinger and Robert Lee which is being promoted by Jas. L. Himrod and associates will be of interest locally:

Accompanied by Will Doose and Ed Boler, James E. Himrod, who is promoting a line of railroad from Austin to Lomesa, visited Robert Lee last Saturday.

At a mass meeting held at Robert Lee Saturday night, Mr. Himrod presented his proposition to the citizens of that town, asking them to furnish the right-of-way from Bronte to Robert Lee and put up a bonus of \$50,000.

The citizens turned down the proposition, but made a counter proposition in which they proposed to furnish the right-of-way and give a bonus of \$30,000. After considerable discussion Mr. Himrod accepted this proposition and the contracts were signed up.

Mr. Himrod and the two gentlemen from Ballinger returned to Ballinger Sunday afternoon, and Mr. Himrod left for the East on the afternoon Santa Fe. Before leaving Ballinger he stated that he and members of the syndicate that proposed to build this road would return to Ballinger early in October and would make an overland auto trip from Austin to Lomesa.

James L. Himrod, of New Orleans, arrived in Ballinger Saturday, and appeared before the directors of the Y. M. B. L. with a preliminary proposition to build a railroad from Lomesa on the northwest to Austin, and connecting with direct lines into Aransas Pass.

The new road is to be known as the Texas, New Mexico & Eastern, and will be built through a territory that is undeveloped and offers special inducements to a railroad. Coming northwest from Austin the proposed line will pass through Fredericksburg, Mason, Brady, Ballinger and Robert Lee. Mr. Himrod is representing a syndicate that will build this road, and he is making a preliminary trip with a view of selecting a route, and he will be followed by the chief engineer in the near future. He desired to meet a few of the citizens of the town and see what the sentiment is, and at the proper time will present a proposition for the consideration of the people.

At a meeting of the directors held Saturday morning, a committee was appointed to investigate the proposed road, and arrange for a mass meeting of the citizens to be held early in October, when Mr. Himrod and his associates, together with quite a number of the business men and members of the Austin Chamber of Commerce will make a trip over the proposed route from Austin to Lomesa in autos.

As to just what the people of this county will be asked to contribute towards the building of this road is not known. There is no question but what a direct line to Austin would mean a great deal to the town, but there are other things to take into consideration, and all these will be brought up and discussed when the proposition is put squarely up to the town.—Ballinger Banner-Ledger.

## Fraudulent Schemes

## BRADY WITHOUT P. M.

Local Post Office Turned Over to Assistant Postmaster

Postmaster D. Doole, Jr., last Thursday afternoon received a telegram from the postoffice department at Washington informing him that his resignation had been accepted, and instructed him to turn over the office to Assistant Postmaster E. C. Berry.

Acting on these advices Mr. Doole turned the business of the office over to Mr. Berry late Thursday afternoon, and the office will be in his charge until Mr. Doole's successor is named.

News of the vacancy in the local postmastership quickly spread throughout the city, and early Friday morning a number of aspirants for the position were busy among their friends getting signatures to petitions to the postoffice department for their appointment.

There are some twelve or fifteen applicants for the place, but no intimation as to the successful candidate has been, or can be, secured, and it is likely that the new appointee will not be named for ten days or two weeks.

Mr. Doole has served as postmaster at Brady for a period covering a little more than seventeen years, having been appointed at beginning of President McKinley's first term, in 1897, and has held the position continuously since his appointment. During his entire tenure of office Mr. Doole has had the satisfaction of being rated by the department as one of the most efficient postmasters in the country, and has been highly complimented on numerous occasions for the careful and painstaking manner in which he handled the business of the department, and for neatness, correctness and promptness.

Mr. Doole has not definitely decided upon his future course, but has two or three propositions under consideration, and will likely make some decision within the next few days. Whatever he does, his many Brady friends trust his new avocation will not take him away from Brady and that he and his estimable family may continue to make their home here.

## GRAND JURY ADJOURNS

Completes Labors in Period of Four and a Half Days

The grand jury empaneled last Monday afternoon for the September term of district court adjourned Friday afternoon, returning a total of six indictments, three of which were for felonies and three for misdemeanors. Of these, only one has been made public, that of Marseline Garamillo, charged with assault to rob.

Garamillo is charged in the indictment with attempting to rob a Mexican woman who conducts a restaurant on the south side of the square a few weeks ago, and the case will be called for trial Thursday before Judge John W. Goodwin.

Following is the report of the grand jury to Judge Goodwin: Brady, Texas, Sept. 25, 1914.

Hon. John W. Goodwin, Judge district court, McCulloch County, Texas.

Sir: We, your grand jury, empaneled for the September term of the district court of McCulloch County, have the honor to make the following report:

We have examined quite a number of witnesses from various parts of the county on various violations of the law, and herewith submit the results of our work.

We find the conditions of the county with regard to crime committed as being good, with very few complaints of felonies committed, with some misdemeanors, that we suggest could be handled possibly entirely by the peace officers in the various parts where such misdemeanors are committed, thereby saving time of the grand juries and expense to the county, and by the handling of these things thoroughly by the various officers during or between sessions of the grand jury would greatly facilitate the work of the grand jury in its investigation, and be an aid in every way.

We find a little negligence on the part of some of the county

officers in making to the grand jury such reports as required by law, which we think is due almost entirely to oversight on their part, possibly not knowing that they should do so.

We have now finished our work and ask to be discharged.

Thanking your honor, district and county attorneys, and other officers for their assistance and co-operation in our work.
