#### Regular Monthly Session Held Last Tuesday Night

All members of the city council were present last Tuesday night at the regular meeting of that body, Mayor A. C. Baze presiding.

City Marshal J. M. Anderson reported the following collections for the month of September: Fines, \$36.00; occupation taxes, \$20.00. The report was examined, approved and ordered filed.

The following balances are shown by the report of City Secretary J. C. McShan: General fund, \$738.77; street fund, \$211.21; bond fund, \$6643.03; waterworks sinking fund, \$4,153.71. The report was approved by the council.

An order was duly passed instructing the committee on taxes to examine the tax rolls of the city marshal, and if found correct to authorize the mayor to approve same.

A special session of the council was held last Thursday for the purpose of arranging for the collection of accounts for sanitary work, with all members present.

After full consideration, City Marshal J. M. Anderson was employed for this work on a commission basis of 20 per cent, he to employ and pay for any additional help required for the proper handling of this new department of the city's business.

A motion was made and duly carried rescinding action of the council at a former meeting allowing Mr. Anderson \$50.00 per month for his services in connection with the sanitary department.

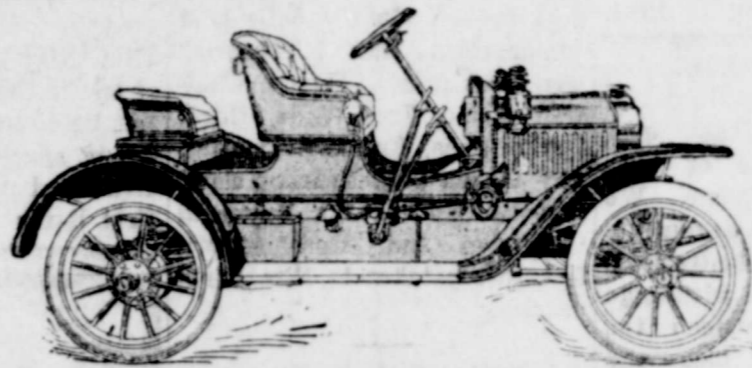

Baze, Mayor, applies for a permit to appropriate, for the use and benefit of said city, an amount of water sufficient to create and maintain an efficient water system for said city, the said water to be impounded in the bed of Brady Creek, a tributary of the San Saba river, by means of an impounding reservoir and diverted by means of a pumping plant; said reservoir and pumping station located as follows: The dam is located on Brady Creek on Fisher & Miller Survey No. 2293 one-half mile west from the City of Brady. The pumping station is located on J. F. Braun Survey No. 407, on the south side of Brady Creek, and within the city limits.

A hearing on the said application of the said City of Brady will be held by the Board of Water Engineers of the State of Texas at its office, in the City of Austin, County of Travis, said state, on Friday, the 6th day of November A. D. 1914, beginning at 10 o'clock a. m., at which time and place all parties interested may appear and be heard. ## TRADE AT HOME.

The Reporter has ever preached the doctrine of buying and selling at home. We have advanced many arguments and given many illustrations, tending to show the advantage of co-operation between the small-town business man and the farmer. We have tried to show how their interests dovetailed—how one could not exist without the other and why we should all trade at home.

One of the strongest arguments, however, we have yet seen, is given by the Teague Enterprise. It is a narrative which may or may not be true; in either event it points a moral that needs no comment. According to the tale, Farmer Smith got hold of \$50 cash as a result of the buy-a-bale movement. Twelve dollars and a half of the money went immediately to the cotton pickers; \$20 went to a hardware man; \$17 went to his grocer—all on indebtedness. This left Smith 50c in cash and he decided to invest that in one more square meal.

While he was eating a neighbor dropped in who had owed him \$20 for a long time, and to Smith's surprise handed over a \$20 bill, which on investigation showed to be the identical bill Smith had paid the hardware man. Walking down the street after dinner he collected another ten dollar debt from another party who told him he had gotten the money in trade from Smith's cotton pickers. Further on down, Smith called on another man to whom he was indebted and paid him \$20, and this man turned and handed the twenty to still another man to whom he was indebted. This man happened to owe Smith twenty dollars and handed the bill over to him, remarking that it was the first money he had collected in six months and he was glad to be able to pay, as he had owed it over a year.

Thus Smith with \$50 cash, paid \$95 in debts with it and when ready to go home found he still had \$47.50 left. And could the full amount of debts paid be ascertained it would no doubt reach several hundred. This illustrates how much a little money will cover when spent at home. If Smith had owed that money to a mail order house and spent the \$50 to pay the debt it would have been gone forever and nobody benefited.

Patronize home industry; trade at home.

If the farmer and the merchant will co-operate they will

get along like three-in-a-bed. Each owes it to the other.—Rockdale Reporter.

## ITEMS OF INTEREST

So far as information goes, the season's cotton picking pennant of Coleman county is already won by three young men of Rickford, who Thursday of last week picked 2,502 pounds.

Cables from Egypt announced the compulsory curtailment of acreage in Egyptian cotton land. The government has decreed that there must be a reduction of 750,000 feddars, equivalent to 42 per cent in area planted to the staple.

The government of Australia recently announced that exports of foodstuffs from its borders to warring or neutral countries, except England would be stopped. All of that country's beef, mutton, wheat and flour will get to England.

The livestock feature of the Brownwood fair this year was given greater prominence than ever before. In the baby beef junior class Rita Kirkpatrick won first prize; Homer Caldwell second, Fred Wade third. Senior class, Frank Evans 1st, Loy Brown 2nd. Yearling class, Francis Caldwell 1st, Raymond Champion 2nd, Don Allcorn 3rd. Sweepstakes to Rita Kirkpatrick.

Believing that the Texas cotton crop has been overestimated by at least 1,250,000 bales, W. D. Lewis, president of the Texas Farmers' union, is quoted as saying that the union would co-operate with the business interests of Ft. Worth and Texas and bear its share of the expense in sending five men over the state to make a correct estimate of the size of the crop. He says the crop in central Texas is very light owing to the ravages of worms and the east and south of the state are in the same condition. Mr. Lewis asserts that in West Texas and north of us are the only parts of the state in which good crops have been made. It is his belief that a correct statement showing this would restore confidence to the people and alleviate to some extent the present commercial condition.

## Plant More Hogs

Uncle Sam Advises Texas Farm Boys.

The Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture has just issued a communication to the farmer boys of Texas between the ages of 10 and 18 years, urging them to plant more hogs. The Texas farmer lost \$24,000,000 last year because he failed to produce enough pork to supply the local demand and the communication advises his sons to raise enough hogs for home consumption, and if possible, a surplus for the market. Some of the points which the Department advises the youthful hog raiser to bear in mind are:

1. The feeding and care are as important as the breeding in producing a good hog. Plenty of feed and good care will make a good hog out of a runt, but lack of it will always make a runt out of a good pig.
2. To make pork cheaply a permanent pasture and forage crops must be used.
3. Young pigs must have a dry bed and plenty of sunshine.
4. Begin feeding the pig as soon as he will eat, and keep him growing until he is mature.
5. Always keep plenty of clean, fresh water where the hogs may drink at any time.
6. Quarantine all newly purchased animals for three weeks.
7. Never keep a female for a brood sow, no matter how well bred she may be, if she will not produce more than four strong pigs at a litter.
8. The more milk a sow will give the faster her pigs will grow.

The latest census reports which relate to January 1st, 1914 show there are 2,618,000 hogs in Texas with a total value of \$22,515,000. This is an increase over the previous year of 125,000 head and \$1,574,000 in value. At every census during the five years prior to 1914 a steady decrease in the number of Texas hogs is shown. The values, however, have steadily increased. A decade ago the Texas hog was worth \$4.68 per head, but Uncle Sam's latest valuation is \$8.60 per head.

The growing demand for young Texas raised pork has become so strong that he is going to market a year earlier and at the weight of 89 pounds, while a quarter of a century ago the average marketing weight was 275 pounds.

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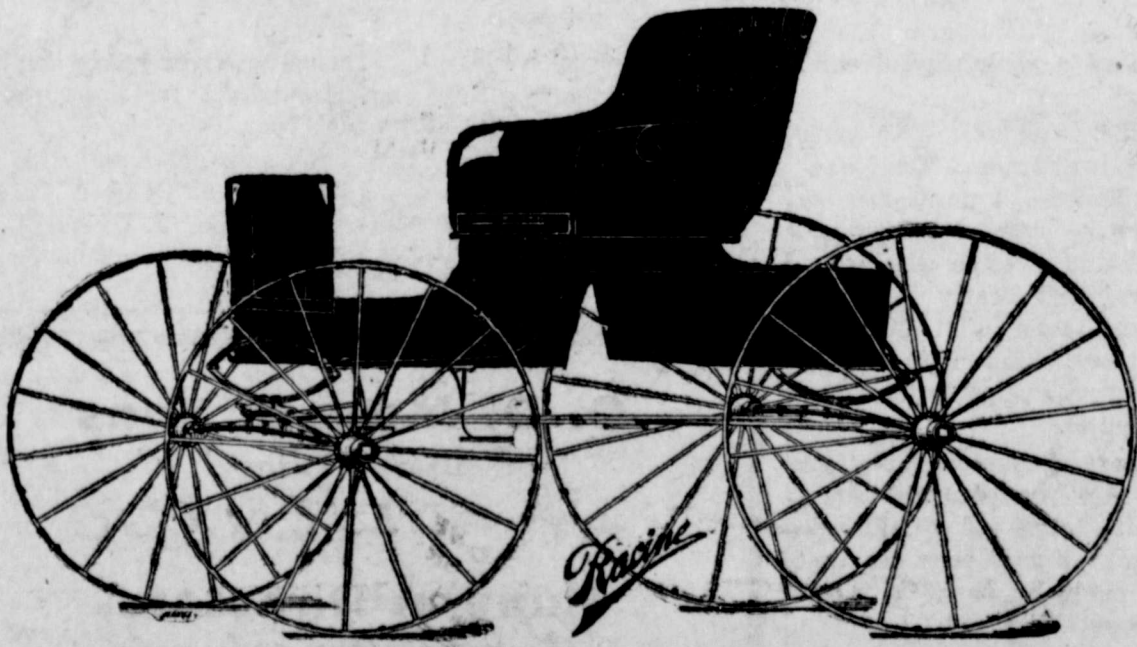
