MEXICAN ARRESTED.

Charged With Theft of Trunk and \$85.00 in Money.

Sheriff J. C. Wall Wednesday morning arrested Rusulio Gulingo, a Mexican, on a charge of theft, and lodged him in the county jail.

Gulingo is alleged to have eloped with Gabriel Guardia's wife a few weeks ago, taking the Guardia children with them. Learning where his wife and children were located, Guardia went to them and brought the children back with him against the wishes of his wife. Gulingo followed them back here and, according to the tale told by Guardia, attempted to poison him with drugged whiskey, and later stole his trunk in which \$85 in money had been placed for safe keeping, along with a quantity of clothing.

Guardia also told Sheriff Wall that Gulingo had been bootlegging here for some time, and that he had bought several bottles from him. He produced three empty bottles, which he said had been purchased from Gulingo.

An examining trial on the theft charge will be held this afternoon in Justice of the Peace Lyle's court. A charge of unlawfully selling intoxicating liquors in prohibited territory will also be filed against the prisoner.

CHARGED WITH THEFT

Two Mexicans Taken Into Custody Yesterday

He picked them up on the street shortly after their arrival here and lodged them in jail. The man who was robbed came in later and identified the prisoners. One of them had on a pair of shoes which he had stolen from the Melvin "home."

Only \$7.55 of the stolen money was recovered.

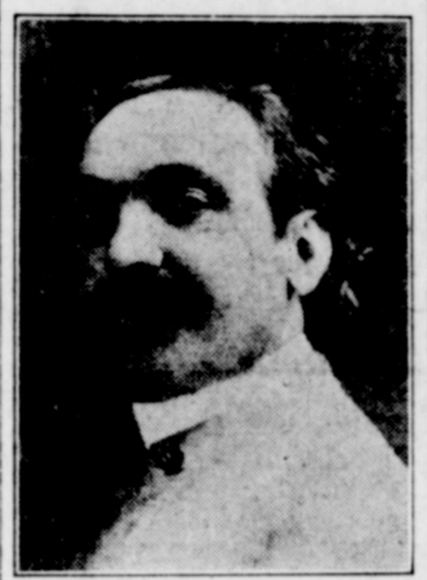
Great State Fair and Exposition Will Have Greater Crowds Than Ever This Year.

Crusade Inaugurated by Fair Management Producing Good Results.

Dallas—No state in the Union is as rich in Jerseys as Texas, and since the State Fair of Texas began the annual competitive dairy test in 1911, the Jersey has demonstrated to the men and women of this state how important is in converting the products of the farm into health-giving human foods.

That this crusade on the part of the fair management has resulted in more efficient dairying is now recognized by all. Held in a dairy demonstration building, a splendid permanent exhibit of modern completeness, the Jerseys entered in the contest fed a certain amount of food each day have demonstrated their ability to produce butter fat. As exhibitors have been permitted to select their own feedstuff, the demonstration has also resulted in proving the kind of feed that produces the best sort of results.

At the 1914 Fair, which begins Saturday, October 17, twenty-eight animals will take part. Complete records of the test will be posted daily for the inspection of visitors in attendance at the Fair.

The American Jersey Cattle Club gives \$185 for prizes in this contest, which is added to the regular State Fair premiums.

When Europe gets done with this rum-pus each nation will be so weakened and busy watching each other that America will be sure of fifty or a hundred years of peace and prosperity, with the balance of gold in our favor and unlimited demand for our products both in Europe and South America. These are some of the results of the war that should make the poor man's Thanksgiving "sowbelly" taste like turkey a la cranberry sauce.

United States estimates show

a remarkable series of good crops in Texas this year as evident Oct. 1. On that date there had been 416,000 more bushels of wheat this year than last; 370,000 bushels more potatoes; 800,000 bushels more sweet potatoes; 321,000 more tons of hay and 83,000 more bushels of apples. Alfalfa seed was 7 per cent better, tomatoes 4 per cent, onions 2 per cent, sorghum 18 per cent, peanuts 12 per cent, millet hay 16 per cent and kafir corn 33 per cent better. In the United States 72,000,000 more bushels of corn; 128,620,000 bushels more wheat; 50,000,000 increase in potatoes. There are 2,588,000 more tons of hay and 84,590,000 bushels of apples more than we had last year.

The miners of Europe having

laid aside pick and shovel for the implements of death, a coal famine in this country is one of the expected results of the war. The warring coal miners formerly furnished 50 per cent of the coal supply of the world.

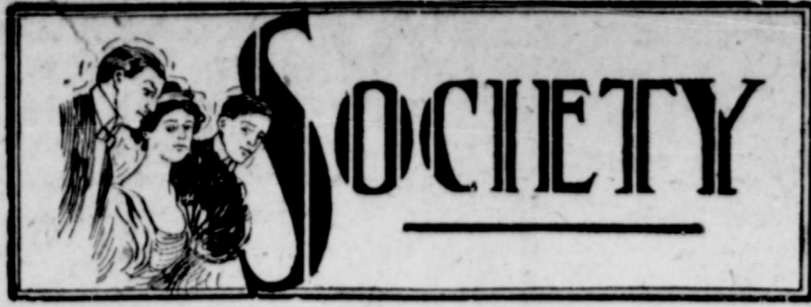

Birds Eat Boll Weevil
 Washington, Oct. 14.—Investigations recently conducted to determine the value of birds has made some startling discoveries. A tree swallow's stomach was found to contain forty entire chinch bugs and fragments of many others. A bank swallow in Texas devoured 68 cotton boll weevils. Thirty-five cliff swallows had taken an average of 18 boll weevils each. A killdeer's stomach, taken in November in Texas contained over 300 mosquito larvae. A nighthawk had eaten 340 grasshoppers, 52 bugs, 3 beetles, 2 wasps and a spider. A boat-

tailed grackle had eaten at one meal about 100 cotton boll worms, besides a few other insects.

FARMERS CO-OPERATE
 Thereby Getting Many Advantages Before Unknown.

Here are a few things that farmers with push and enterprise in Texas are enjoying, which are not enjoyed by the vast majority of farming communities:

The farmers of the Topsy neighborhood in Coryell County own a co-operative slaughter house, paying a butcher \$3.00 per day to kill the animals, keep proper records for the club, and decide whether or not a given animal is in fit condition for the table. The principal record kept consists of a large sheet posted in the slaughter house showing the names of the members, the amount of meat taken by each member, and the amount furnished by each member. At the end of the year, if a member has used more meat than

he furnished to the club, he pays 10c per pound for the excess. Simple, isn't it?—this thing of having fresh meat on the farm throughout the long, hot summer, at actual cost—no rake-off, no profit, no middle-man, no discount, no grumbling—just fresh meat, any time, in any quantity, at cost.

A few of the advantages of co-operation follow: Fresh meat at any time in the quantity desired at absolute cost. Doctors bills reduced to \$12 per year per family. Improving immeasurably the breed of hogs, horses and cattle at trifling cost. Securing a gin that turns out a bale worth from \$10 to \$25 more than the old gins had been turning out, saving a certain community about \$150,000 in one season.

How are these magical performances accomplished? One word is the explanation—co-operation. In the latest bulletin issued for free distribution

by the Extension department of the University of Texas, The Standard notices that Prof. Austin and Wehrwein, connected with the division of public welfare tell the accomplishments of farmers, and draw a few examples, also, from other states. This very valuable bulletin is No. 355, and may be had for the writing.

It will be remembered that Prof. Austin spent several months in Europe studying the matter of rural credits. He is therefore especially well qualified to speak upon the subject. A very practical section of the subject is an outline telling just how to go about forming a rural credit association under the Texas law; the object of all such associations being, of course, to secure cheaper money for Texas farmers.

Experts Out of Galveston.

Galveston, Oct. 15. — The largest single day's export business recorded at this port in 1914 was one day last week, when six steamers with a combined cargo of cotton and wheat valued at \$1,500,000 left this city for foreign countries. The combined produce carried by the six ships consisted of 25,325 bales of cotton, valued at \$1,093,620 and 599,000 bushels of wheat with a value of \$639,135. It was all Texas products.

Wheat was the leading export commodity through this port during September and 6,708,955 bushels, valued at \$7,590,928 were exported to eleven different countries during that period. Cotton ranked second in value and 65,970 vales of this product with a value of \$3,045,373 was sent to seven foreign lands. Domestic exports through this port in September had an aggregate value of \$11,485,824 and were distributed among nineteen countries. Texas products predominated in all shipments.

but no doubt it was an advertising scheme. A woman in Grant's Pass wanted to try the same experiment, but her people would not allow her to do so. The war is playing smash with us all, it seems. Last year our neighbors shipped apples to New York and other points in the east and got fancy prices; \$4.00 a bushel and upward. This year some are selling at the orchard at 25c a bushel. Our county paper noticed something of the "buy-a-bale" proposition and suggested that we adopt the same plan to dispose of our fruit and organize a "buy-a-box" club—an apple box holds about a bushel.
Although the war is working a hardship in certain lines of this country's industries, yet at the same time it will stimulate the productive and manufacturing business in the South and West to such an extent that it ought to be helpful to us in the end.
Sugar went up to \$10 a sack here; what is it there? It is now selling at \$8.50. Bacon

sells here for 24c to 30c per pound. Creamery butter, 40c per pound flour \$1.75 a sack. Corn meal 4c a pound. Fresh beef and pork at the meat market sell from 15c to 20c per pound. We have had no killing frost as yet. Have you?

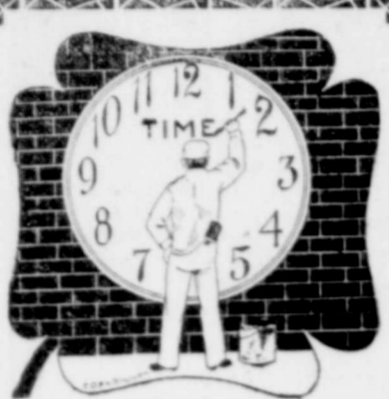

Court Deals Liquor Law a Hard Blow.

Austin, Oct. 14.—A blow of severity was dealt the Allison liquor law today by the court of criminal appeals, when that tribunal held that intoxicating liquor may be delivered into dry territory when it is shown that that such liquor is not to be used for the violation of any laws in Texas.

This important holding was in the case of ex-parte Elmer Peede, from Kaufman county, whose case was today reversed and the relator discharged. Peede was agent of the Wells Fargo & Co.'s Express at Kaufman and was convicted of delivering four quarts of whisky shipped from an interstate point to a Mr. Laird, which it was charged was in violation of the Allison law.

Before the liquor was delivered to Laird, Peede required a sworn affidavit that the liquor was for his own use and not for the purpose of violating the law, and under these circumstances the court of criminal appeals held that it was not a violation.

The opinion, written by Associate Justice Harper and concurred in by Justice Davidson, holds that under section 5 of the Allison liquor law, it is only a violation to make interstate shipments when such liquor is to be used or possessed in violation of the laws of this state, and in the Peede case it was shown that the liquor was not to be used for that purpose.

The effect of this decision is far reaching, as it will permit the delivery of liquor into dry territory when it is proved that the liquor is not for the purpose of violating the law. The court upholds the constitutionality of the law.—Ft. Worth Star-Telegram.

More Attention to Marketing

Austin, Oct. 14.—Hon. F. W. Davis, commissioner of agriculture elect has been making a tour of Texas, acquainting himself with agricultural conditions of the state. He is devoting special attention to the solution of the marketing problem. Mr. Davis believes that production end of agriculture has been worked overtime at the expense of the marketing side, and he proposes to reverse the order of things by offering prizes to those who market as well as to those who produce.
