COUNTY COURT

October Term Convened Yesterday Afternoon.

The October term of county court was convened yesterday afternoon with County Judge Harvey Walker presiding.

The criminal docket was taken up, the first case called being that of the State vs. John Sellman, charged with aggravated assault upon an officer. Both sides announced ready for trial. Late yesterday afternoon the jury returned a verdict of guilty of simple assault and assessed his punishment at a fine of \$5 and costs.

Other cases disposed of are as follows:

Dair Baldrige, gaming; plea of guilty and fined \$10 and costs.

John Woodard, carrying pistol; dismissed.

George Liverman, carrying a pistol; continued by defendant.

Si Bostic, theft under value of \$50; plea of guilty and a fine of \$1.00 and one hour in jail assessed.

Jim Williamson, aggravated assault, reduced to simple assault and a fine of \$5.00 and costs assessed.

Francisco Chaves, theft under value of \$50; dismissed.

Will Conley, unlawfully practicing veterinary surgery; plea of guilty entered and a fine of \$25 and costs assessed.

Marselino Garamillo, unlawfully carrying a weapon; dismissed.

Enrique Florez and an unknown Mexican, theft under value of \$50; plea of guilty entered and punishment assessed at a fine of \$1.00 and one hour in jail.

J. F. Tindel, drunkenness; appeal from city court. Trial by jury, resulting in a hung jury.

The civil docket will be taken up next week. Only a few cases are set down for trial, and all will likely be disposed of by the middle of the week.

AN EXPENSIVE LUXURY

Dr. Carrick Says it Cost \$15,000,000 and Is Needless

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 19.—Sickness is a luxury that costs Texans \$15,000,000 a year and the average cost per case of illness is \$95.00, according to Dr. M. M. Carrick, the clean town expert. Dr. Carrick recently said: "There is an economic side to the question of sickness that should be considered, as well as that of the inconvenience, loss of time and suffering it entails. The needless and senseless drain upon the public for the care and maintenance of the sick from preventable diseases should cease. Every public official in Texas should consider the care of the health of the public their first and highest duty, and if every physician co-operated with them in the enforcement of sanitary laws, making vaccination compulsory, for example; if all the people in Texas could and would observe in their daily lives the laws of health as now known to the scientific world, sickness would soon decrease and health would abound. This is the only practical, logical solution of our civic problem."

Loosening Tied-up Money

If ever there was a time when men should advertise, it is now, while the heavy strain caused by accommodations that were usually had is being diverted by European and domestic securities demanding all our spare cash be-dug up. In the absence of accommodation cash must be had elsewhere, and as it is tied up in stocks of goods, that will become shop-worn and undesirable, even if they do not fall into the sheriff's hands, they should be turned into cash. GIGANTIC COTTON PLAN

\$150,000,000 to Relieve Financial Troubles of Farmers

St. Louis, Oct. 14.—St. Louis bankers plan to assist in the work of solving the problems of the farmer, recently begun by business men of the small towns.

The movement is designed to make available a fund of \$150,000,000 to loan on cotton at not to exceed 6 cents per pound, for the purpose of making cotton a liquid asset, stabilizing its price and bringing about normal conditions again.

According to the plan proposed an immense fund of \$150,000,000 is to be raised from which loans are to be made at the rate of \$30 per bale at 7 per cent interest. Of this fund the South is to raise \$50,000,000 while the North furnishes \$100,000,000. The city of Dallas has already subscribed more than \$3,000,000 and more coming in right along. If the promptness of Dallas is followed by other Texas cities it is felt that the amount allotted this state to raise, \$15,000,000, will very shortly be available.

It is estimated that the fund, if completed will afford ample provision for taking care of all surplus cotton of this year's crop. The money is to be distributed from regional agencies, from which the banks of all parts of the country can secure the funds and the farmers in turn can negotiate their loans with the banks. Each section of the country, regardless of the amount subscribed, can secure whatever funds may be necessary to meet its requirements. The central committee is to be located at New York, and to this point all warehouse receipts and insurance papers taken by the banks as security for the money loaned farmers will be sent.

Right of Way for New Road.

Paris, Oct. 19.—Now that practically all of the right-of-way for the McKinney-Bonham-Paris interurban has been secured, it is expected that attention will be turned to other preliminary matters preparatory to the construction of this project. Heavy work on this line is expected to start within a very short time.

War and the Merchant

Far more get scared than are hurt by war and more damage is done by those who get scared than by those who are actually fighting. For instance, in the United States it is safe to say that thousands of level-headed merchants who completed their plans last July for new stock were frightened out of their five senses by the declaration of war at the beginning of August and have been afraid to go ahead since then. These merchants had planned to use hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of new stock for their stores. The result is that although business is going on the same is usual this fall, every one of these merchants is losing the business and the money they figured on making.

Of course war is a very serious thing and equally of course other conditions may make it imperative for the merchant to go slow at this time, as for instance, a dealer may have to get a bank loan and find that he cannot be accommodated to the extent he requires just now, because other securities need it. But this is no good reason why he should abandon his plans or let his goods grow shelf-worn, when judicious advertising and tantalizing prices will draw the cash he needs, away from other merchants, perhaps, but to himself. On the contrary, this is his best opportunity to let loose at persuading prices.

As the days go by and the fall opening season has come along the same as usual these merchants are discovering all over the country that they have made a mistake and should have made clearing out sales do what accommodation was unable to do. It is freely admitted by everyone who is at all acquainted with the situation that our business is bound to prosper as it never did before and that this is no time to carry over stocks of goods that should be turned into cash, even at a sacrifice. It may take a few months to bring about a noticeable improvement, but the future is decidedly bright and the present fairly well up to the average. The merchant who waits for accommodation might a great many times help himself by forcing a part of his goods into cash by advertising even at sacrifice prices.—Ex.

Says Will Add to Meal Barrels

At a meeting of the farmers at Richland Springs Saturday afternoon a resolution was adopted instructing the secretary to notify the representative and senator of this district that the farmers favor a law confining the cotton acreage to fifty per cent of cultivated land. J. H. Webb, S. W. Ballard, N. H. Smith and J. F. Crouch were elected delegates to the county meeting which convenes in San Saba Saturday, December 17. However laudable the undertaking is, a large per cent of the farmers seem to consider the matter a kind of a joke and not worth trifling with, as was evidenced by the attendance at the meeting Saturday afternoon, which was about 35, being probably one-fourth of the farmers who were in town. This movement, if carried out, will add to every meal barrel in the South and every man who is affected by it should show his colors and do what he can to advance his own interests and help his neighbor. If the farmer is not sufficiently interested in his own welfare to attend a meeting that is for his sole benefit, why should he expect others to become interested in him.—Richland Springs Eye-Witness.

Beer Pays Half the Tax

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 19.—The war revenue tax of approximately \$50,000,000 on the annual output of beer is agreeable to the brewers of this city, although this industry already pays a yearly internal revenue tax of \$165,000,000. The stamp tax on negotiable instruments, stocks and bonds, deeds, bills of lading, Pullman car and steamship tickets and insurance policies is expected to yield \$30,000,000 and the remainder will be raised by a levy on tobacco, patent medicines, perfumes, cosmetics, theatre and amusement tickets, etc. The beer tax will yield a revenue of more than ten times that of any other single commodity.

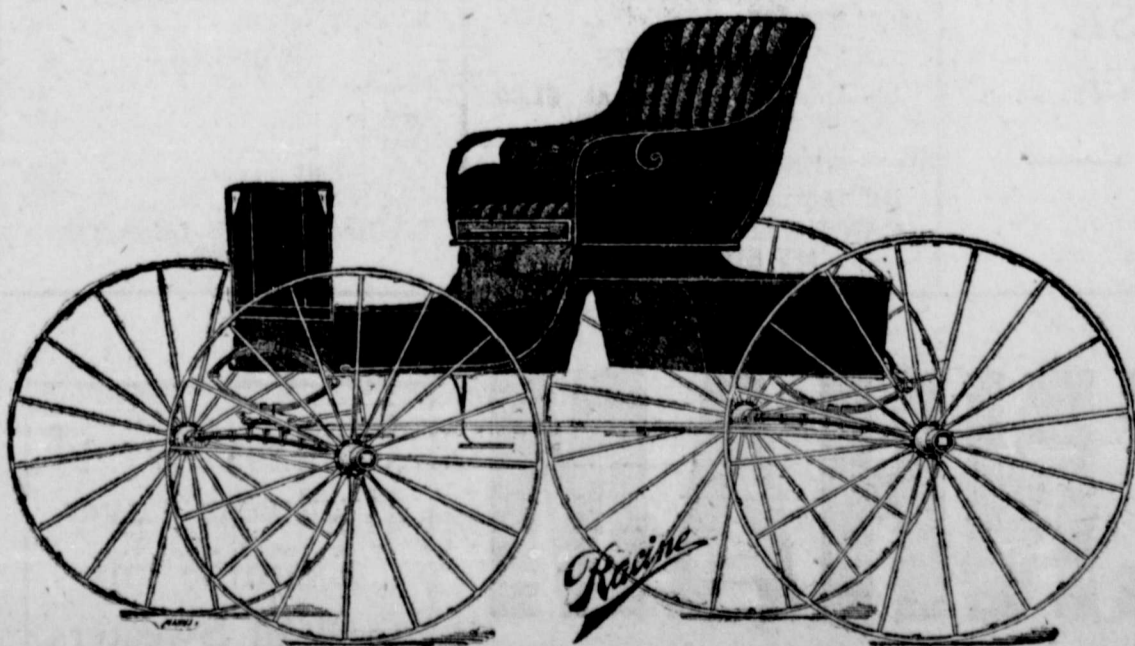
