CLOSES BIG DEALS

Local Real Estate Firm Reports Big Sale.

Manager R. D. Dyer of the McCulloch County Real Estate Exchange, is in Brownwood and San Angelo this week, where he has closed three large deals in the past few days.

He sold a tract of unimproved ranch land in Val Verde county to T. E. Benson of Eldorado. The land is known as the Pecos county school land, and comprises 17,712 acres. A bonus of \$2.25 per acre was paid by Mr. Benson, who will improve the property and place it in charge of his son.

A deal was closed between A. L. White of Loretta and O. R. Smith & Son of Eldorado, the latter transferring their stock of general merchandise, several pieces of town property, store building and warehouses to the former at a total consideration of \$25,000.00.

A tract of 735.7 acres adjoining the town of Wall, in Tom Green county, was sold by Mr. Dyer to D. E. Smith of Brooksmith at \$30 per acre. Will Distribute Free Seed

An instance of encouraging farmers to grow crops other than cotton, peculiarly valuable at this time, and one that furnishes a useful suggestion to bankers and merchants, who have always been interested in the financial side of the crops of farmers is the action of a Dallas bank which is preparing to furnish four or five hundred farmers of Dallas county with enough seed corn, free of cost, to plant not less than one acre. The corn is to be of an early maturing variety, especially selected from small stalks bearing large ears, and is to receive a thorough germination test before it is supplied to the farmers.

The president of this bank says: "We know that the Texas farmer can grow corn if he uses good seed and right cultural methods. We intend to put

out the best obtainable seed and are arranging for its purchase now. We will ask each farmer to bring us in next fall not less than 50 ears specially selected and tested, which will be distributed among the farmers the following year. We expect this selected corn to mature early enough to escape the effects of drouth. The use of a germination test, assuring seed of good vitality, is one of the most valuable requirements in increasing the yield. Another great benefit to the farmer is that they must select the best seed ears for seed and test them when the corn from this distribution has matured."

Dangerous Cheap Loan Scheme

In view of the needs of farmers at this time, the U. S. department of agriculture is issuing a warning to farmers against a kind of cheap loan scheme that is being operated. The agitation for cheaper money for farmers and for a form of long time loan has set the sharks at work to try to use a cheap money bait to separate the farmer from some of his hard earned money.

This scheme as outlined sounds very attractive. The farmer is approached and the company offers to lend him money at 3 per cent and allow him to repay it in easy monthly installments. This sounds attractive; just what the farmer wanted. It furnishes money at a very low rate and allows the loan to be paid back gradually.

If the farmer agrees to the terms he gets a contract to sign. This contract requires the farmer to begin paying off his loan at the rate of \$10 a month at once if the debt is \$1,000, but

he gets no money yet, because the company has no money. It is to get its money by the payments of those who join. You keep on paying in the ten dollars a month and the company says it will let you have the \$1,000 whenever it gets it.

This is what you would call a loan working around the wrong way, backward. Instead of getting to use some extra money to carry on your business, you have to pay out a fixed sum monthly and wait an indefinite period to get this money back. A man wouldn't go into it if he realized what he was doing, but the agents don't make everything exactly plain. They emphasize the loan, the monthly way of paying it back, the 3 per cent interest and your signing the contract. They would rather that you do not find all out until you have signed the contract and at least paid in the first part of the monthly payments.

The kind of scheme the companies suggest could never work out to the benefit of all. It would prove to be a savings bank that paid no interest and after a long wait of several years gave the depositor back his money with probably a sum deducted for handling the business. Still the average investor would do well to get back about what he put in after a wait of several years, because men who are sharks enough to start such a scheme are likely to be unprincipled enough to get away with a lion's share of what goes through their hands.

We want cheap money on liberal terms, and the men who will start a company on a sound basis that will get money to farmers at three, four or five per cent interest and will provide for them to pay back in annual or monthly payment through a period of several to

fifteen or twenty years, will be great benefactors. Still, since unprincipled men are using the cheap loan scheme as a catch it behooves everyone to know what he is going into before he signs anything.—Ex.

Deceased had been a sufferer from tuberculosis for several years, and for some months past had been living in camp with two companions who were victims of the disease. One of his friends died several weeks ago and the other—Robert Carrouth—passed away the 10th of the present month.

Young Reuss was 25 years of age and single. The body was shipped last night from Menard to Cuero, his old home, where interment will take place upon arrival. W. L. Oliver of Menard accompanied the remains.

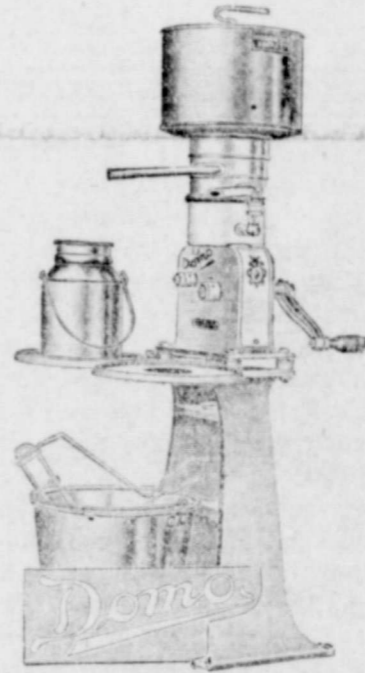
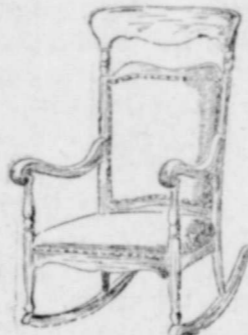

REDUCE COTTON ACREAGE

Said Merchants and Landlords Have Remedy in Own Hands.

The question of reducing the cotton acreage for next year is receiving a great deal of attention and suggestions made indicate that farmers will find it to their advantage to grow less cotton and more livestock next year than ever before.

Secretary of Agriculture Houston, appealed to to have his department take action to reduce the cotton acreage next year, writes, in effect:

"The only help, so far as the department of agriculture sees, is to adopt a plan that will bring home to the farmer the fact that for several years the price of foodstuffs will be high, and that more of such crops should

be grown. Livestock, including beef and dairy cattle, hogs and poultry, should supplement a diversity of profitable foodstuff crops.

"The business men in the towns and cities must extend the same credit and the landlord make the same equitable arrangements with the farmers for growing other field crops, and livestock as were made for cotton production."

Pursuant to this idea, a writer in a prominent daily journal says:

"The only feasible solution of this problem is a very material curtailment of cotton production next year, and as our lawmakers can't or won't legislate to force this curtailment, why would it not be a sensible plan for the merchants associations to take this matter up, and settle the question themselves.

"If every merchant would tell his customers right now that he would not advance one cent of credit next year on cotton, but that he would advance it on other crops or on livestock, it seems to me that it would practically force the farmer to protect himself.

"The merchants can do this through their organizations, and thereby inspiring confidence, to the farmers and every class of business.

"I firmly believe that should the merchants of the South take this action, it would cause a reduction of acreage for cotton of from 25 to 50 per cent. The spinners and cotton merchants, upon realizing that this curtailment was an assured fact and that this surplus would be needed to take care of next year's demand, for cotton and cotton goods, would immediately

begin taking care to supply themselves of the present crop to cover next year's shortage, thereby creating an immediate demand that would undoubtedly boost the price of cotton anywhere from two to five cents a pound from the present prices thereby relieving the present money crisis in the South and putting both the farmer and the merchant in a prosperous condition, and guaranteeing prosperity for the year to come.


Orchards to Supply Soda Water.

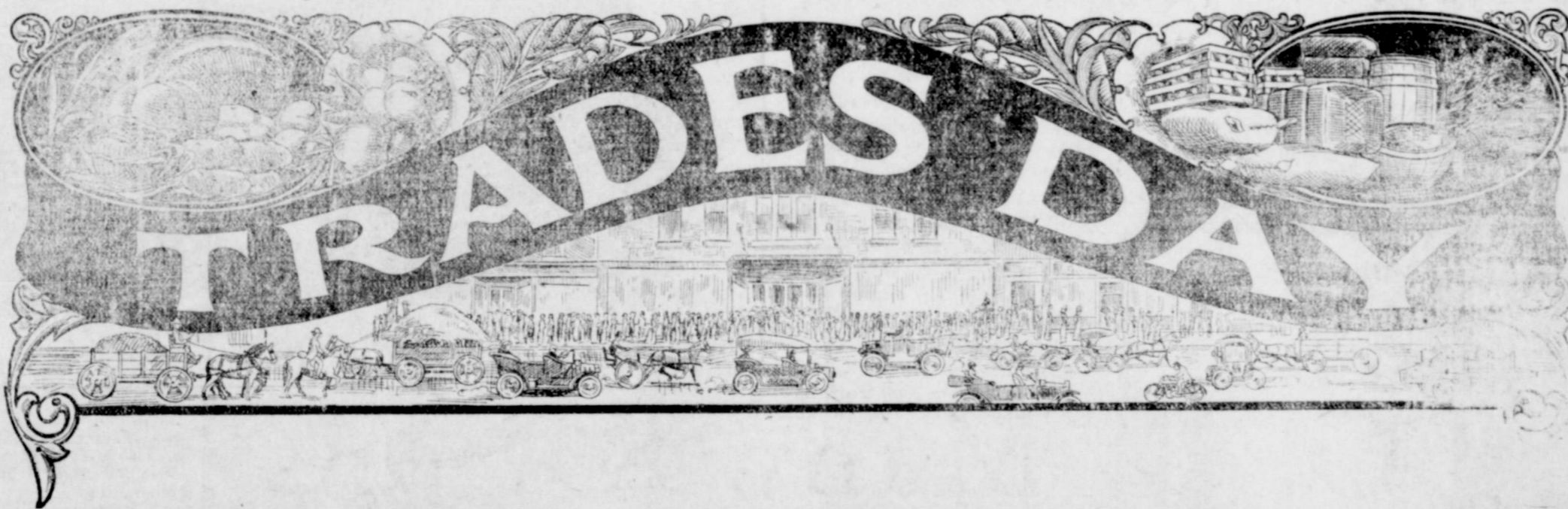

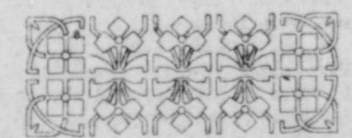

WHOLE SOUTH APPEALS

For Direct, Safe, Business-like Relief by Congress

Few people not actually dependent upon cotton for a living can possibly realize the extent of the dire calamity which broke upon the South with the European war. We have personally seen wagons parading the streets of Northwestern cities begging alms for people suffering from the failure of a single wheat crop. Yet a few thousands of people were then involved; no great industries were threatened and no general catastrophe was possible.

Today the whole industrial, commercial, and social fabric of the south trembles on the verge of collapse. It is time that the reality be unequivocally stated. Temporizing has availed nothing—not even materially postponing the evil.

The South has not and never will become a mendicant. We seek no alms, no bread lines will be formed, no charity will be sought. We seek justice, fair play, the legal protection and assistance constantly granted people in other parts of our common country and engaged in other industries than that which forms the foundation of Southern prosperity.

We speak for the millions of men who produce cotton, the millions of people whose very existence depends upon revenue from this crop, and the millions whose business fate depends upon this single industry.

We are not discussing academic theories. We are not justifying the economic error of a single crop system. We mention the fact, however, that this condition prevails wherever agriculture becomes specialized. Tobacco, hops, grapes, corn, flax and many other crops at times demonstrate the risk involved in this kind of farming. The difference with cotton is not in character, but in the mere size of the enormous volume of business and expanse of territory involved.

Moreover, cotton stands alone in one important particular. It is the only remaining great agricultural export product of this country. It maintains our balance of trade. It brings into our country over six hundred millions of dollars in gold each year. For this reason, in addition to the fact of the great interests in all parts of the country largely dependent upon this billion dollar crop for prosperity, cotton is a national asset. All that pertains to cotton is of national importance.

For these reasons when foreign war suddenly closed the usual markets for 60 per cent of our crop, and private combined resources were known to be wholly inadequate to the emergency, the South was justified in looking to the Federal Government for temporary relief.

Congress passed a few laws furnishing indirect aid. Not one of the plans proposed by the South as offering final solution of the problem or adequate emergency relief has been adopted.

It is important that the people should place the responsibility for this failure to act where it belongs.

On August 14th the Secretary of the Treasury assured a committee of the Southern Cotton Congress that he would support a bill providing for making emergency currency based on cotton warehouse certificates as collateral temporarily available to State banks. The purpose was to thus facilitate loans directly to cotton growers.

Here he showed the effects of his Southern nativity. Immediately New York financial interests, speaking publicly through such Wall street owned organs as the Sun and Times, opposed this measure which would prevent the corraling of all currency in the hands of the money trust. So he called that infamous "conference" of New York cotton gamblers. If there was a single real farmer in the bunch we have failed to discover the fact. These patriots got in their work and went home. Then the Secretary announced that there were insurmountable difficulties in the way.

That is where he showed the influence of long training with "high finance" in New York.

Then the administration began to hear from the South. Result: The Associated Press dispatches of August 27th announced: "The Treasury Department will support the Smith amendment to the Aldrich-Vreeland act."

As soon as the Secretary had time to hear from New York he issued interviews declaring opposition to this measure. These assertions have been repeated frequently and it is generally alleged in Congress that the opposition of McAdoo killed the measure.

This particular bill may not have been the best possible means toward the end sought. That it would have furnished very material relief nobody in the South doubts.

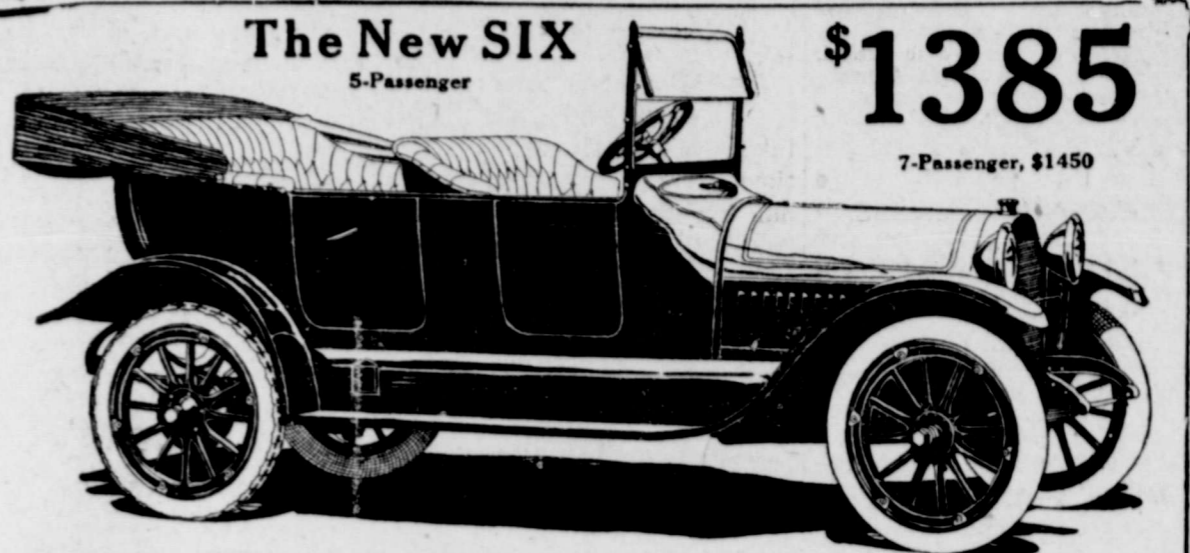
The head of the Treasury constantly refers to the sixty-eight millions of emergency currency issued to Southern national banks as evidence of his efforts to relieve the situation.

We have sought to discover a single cotton grower who has received a dollar of this money directly and have failed to locate him. Today the press makes the Secretary say: "What is really wanted is a restored market for cotton."

We quite agree on this point, but inquire what official steps have been taken to provide this market?

Under ordinary conditions Congress would be chiefly responsible for any failure of legislative action. It is a repeatedly demonstrated fact, however, that the present administration absolutely dominates legis-

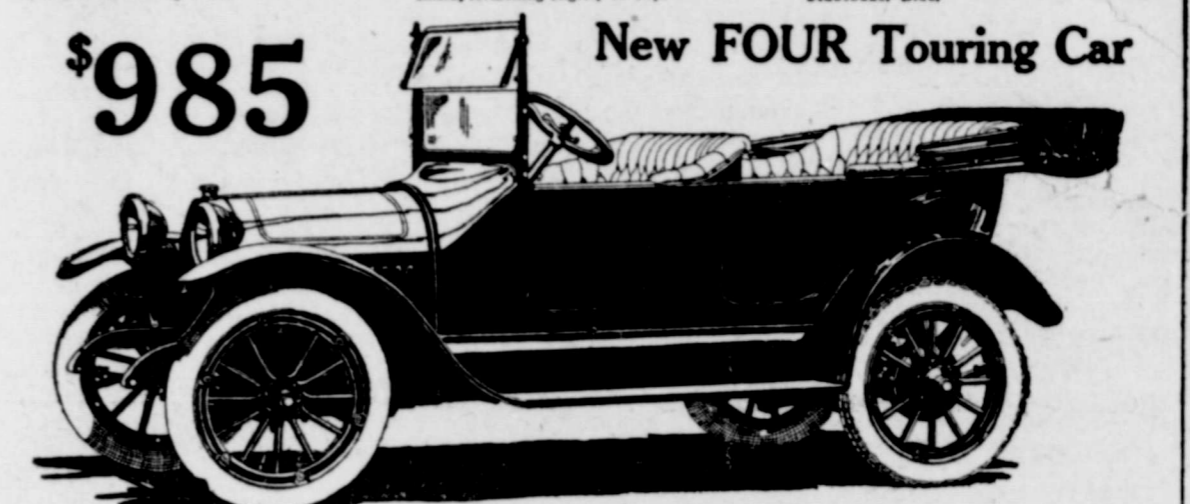

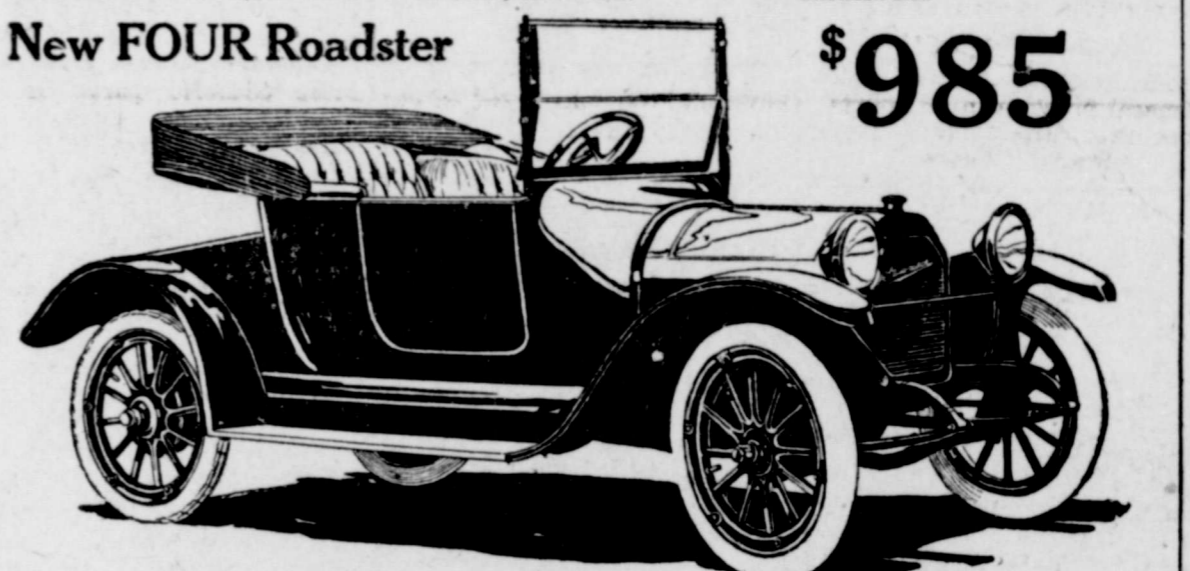

GAME LAWS OF TEXAS

Matters of Interest to Local Sportsmen

Following are the state game law, recently enacted:

The duck season in compliance with Federal law opened Oct. 15, and closes February 1. This allows only shooting of waterfowl, which does not include jacksnipes.

Deer, Nov. 1, closes Jan. 1; limit, three bucks for season; unlawful to kill does and fawns.

Turkey season opens December 1, closes April 1; limit three turkeys for season.

Quail and dove season opens Nov. 1, closes Feb. 1; limit 25 birds in one day.

Prairie chickens closed until 1917.

Rabbits, opossums, coons and bears not protected; squirrel protected only in a few counties—Liberty and Montgomery.

A resident license is required of party shooting in county outside of the one adjoining the one in which he lives. License fee, \$1.75.

Three days consecutive kill of ducks, 25 per day; total of 75 ducks may be shipped or transported on train when party killing same accompanies them and has made the required affidavit.

Possession at any time of the year during which birds are protected shall be prima facie evidence of the guilt of the person in possession thereof.

A day's bag must not contain more than 25 birds either mixed or of one kind.
