A KILLING AT STACY

ELI BROWN VICTIM OF CUTTING AFFRAY

Gary Atkison Lodged in Jail Sunday Charged With Murder.

Eli Brown, a young man about 20 years of age was killed at Stacy Saturday evening about 7:00 o'clock, in a difficulty with Gary Atkison.

News of the tragedy was received here in a telephone message to Deputy Sheriff John Martin at 7:30, and he and Sheriff J. C. Wall left at 9:00 o'clock in an automobile for the scene of the killing.

According to information gathered by the officers, Atkison was drinking heavily Saturday afternoon, when he went into M. J. Stacy's store, where Brown and a number of other men were. He bantered Brown for a "crap" game and when the latter replied that he did not "shoot craps" began cursing him.

Brown is said to have left the store to avoid trouble, but the two men met later and the fight in which Brown was fatally stabbed occurred in the Stacy store.

A long cut in the left side, beginning near the spinal column and extending around to the left breast, a slash across the left cheek about four inches in

length, and a deep stab in the left breast were inflicted by Atkison, the latter wound, according to attending physicians, producing death. After being cut, Brown walked a distance of thirty steps and fell dead.

Brown was a young man of exemplary habits, and had a host of friends in and around Stacy, where he had visited the family of his sister, Mrs. O. B.

BAD CHECKS.

Three Cases of Forgery Discovered Here Last Week

Three cases of forgery were reported to the sheriffs' office the past week, the name of Nollie B. Embry being forged to three checks of various denominations, and the money secured on each.

A week ago last Saturday night a strange young man walked into Mann Bros. store and purchased goods amounting to \$5.00 and tendered in payment a check for \$21.50 bearing Mr. Embry's signature and made payable to the order of Joe Woods. When questioned regarding the check, the man stated that his name was Joe Woods and that he was employ-

ed by Mr. Embry at the gin. He was given the difference in cash and the check deposited in the Commercial National bank, on which it was drawn, several days later. That the signature was forged was not discovered until the check was returned to Mr. Embry, when his pass book was balanced the first of the month.

One of the other checks was for \$15.75 and the third for \$9.35.

No trace of Woods has been found.

Roosevelt Makes a Startling Statement.

Princeton, N. J., Nov. 6. — Colonel Theodore Roosevelt told the students at Princeton recently that he had seen the plans of two Empires now involved in the European war to capture great American seaports and hold them for ransom.


"It is this country's duty," said Colonel Roosevelt, "to put itself into such shape that it will be able to defend its rights if they are invaded. I have seen deliberate plans prepared to take both San Francisco and New York and hold them for ransom that would cripple our country and give funds to the enemy for carrying on war."

What two nations' war plans for seizing American ports for ransom has Colonel Roosevelt seen? That question exercised political and military circles all over the country.

Colonel Roosevelt was seen at Hotel Marquis and asked what nations he referred to. "That was my statement, substantially correct," said the colonel. "I cannot take time to amplify it at present. In a week or so, however, I hope to make that statement the subject of more exact explanation."

Among military men there is not the slightest doubt Colonel Roosevelt saw just what he says he did. Nor is there any doubt in the minds of officers here the nations he had in mind were Germany and Japan, and to the ports of New York and San Francisco they would include Washington.

Another Effect of the War
Leadville, Colo., Nov. 9.—Cadmium, an essential ingredient of very soft metal alloys such as electrical fuses, etc., before the war was heavily exported to the United States from Germany. There are now three American firms making cadmium in one or both its forms. It was known as long ago as 1886 that cadmium was present in the flue and bag-house dust of lead smelters treating ores from Leadville. In another year there will probably be another producer. There is thus a plentiful supply of cadmium in the United States and only a sufficient demand for the metal, which is sold at 45 to 65 cents a pound, is needed for this country to become a great producer.

The new beer tax will yield a revenue of more than ten times that of any other single commodity.

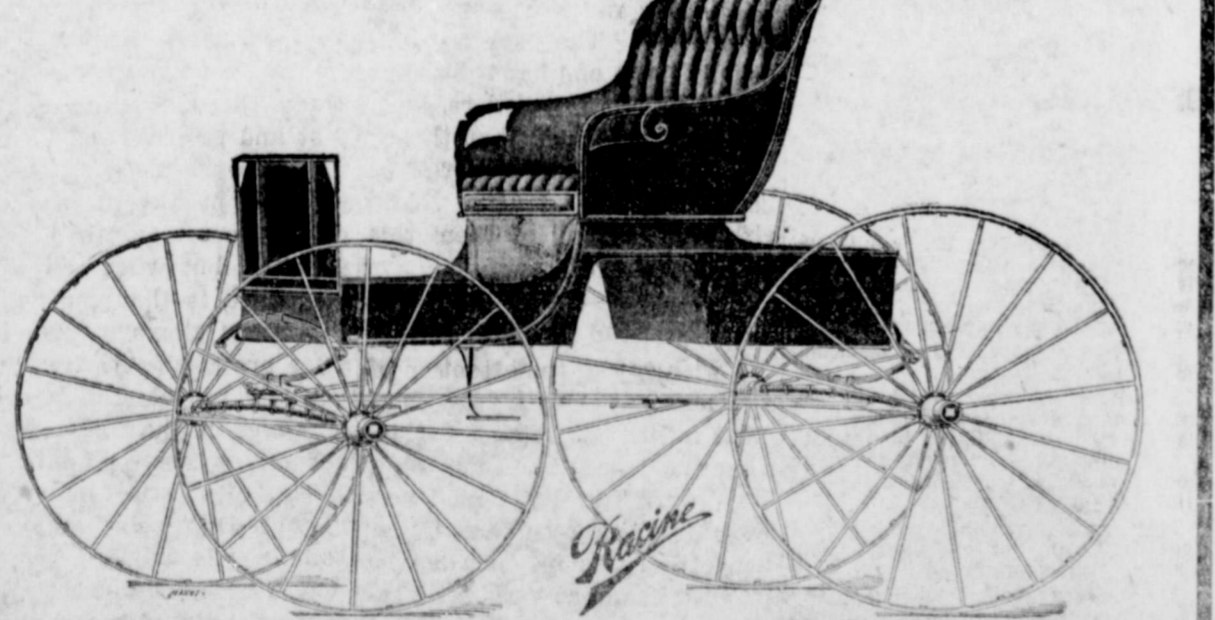

When The War is Over
If the European war lasts as long as some predict the United States need have no fear of increased immigration, because there will be no male population to come over and later send back after their female relatives. What few there are left will be in demand to run the mills and factories and work the farms at home. We are not likely either to have to compete with the cheap labor of Europe. Everything will have to be rebuilt and the laboring class is going to be restless and hard to pacify; the cost of living will be greatly increased and the price of money enhanced so that their scale of wages will have to meet the need for labor. The old law of supply and demand is going to make itself felt. The war is making enormous inroads on their supply of labor and by their destruction increasing the future demand. Thus the demand will far outweigh the supply. And the disbanded soldiers will be hard to persuade to go back and rebuild and start all over again, and will demand enormous rewards for doing it.
