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

Alleged Causes of Pellagra.

The Beaumont Enterprise says: "Roman scientists have published result of an invetigation into the cause of pellagra which proves that the disease is not caused by eating a corn diet, as was long supposed, but by drinking water that has come into contact with a clay oil containing silicic acid. It has been shown that the eating corn or corn products has nothing to do with the disease. When the theory was first adanced, several years ago, that ellagra was caused by eating a iet composed largely of corn products, considerable injury was done to the corn industry and investigators at once set to work finding the causes of other diease in the eating of other cereals. 
Show Increase of More Than




