In attempting to get a buggy out of shed Mr. Sanders grasped the front axle of the vehicle to pull it over so as to pass another, when the shafts were turned in such a way as to catch his hand in the fifth wheel of the buggy. The first finger was clipped off just below the first joint as smoothly as if done with a sharp knife, while the other three fingers were also badly cut.

### ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

#### C. E. Korff Struck by Stray Bullet While Out Hunting

While out hunting in the C. P. Gray pasture, about ten miles south of the city last Friday afternoon, C. E. Korff, a prominent McCulloch county farmer living nine miles out on the London road, was struck in the leg by a bullet from a high powered rifle and both bones of the leg broken.

Just how the accident occurred is hard to explain. Lee Sherrod and Herbert Wood of this city were deer hunting in the vicinity and a short time before the accident, had passed Korff, who was also hunting deer. Sherrod and Wood were on the trail of a deer and just a few minutes after leaving Korff cited their quarry and opened fire with their automatic rifles. After shooting several times they heard some one calling out that they were shot, and upon going in the direction of the calls found Korff lying on the ground with a bullet wound in his leg. The bullet entered the side of the leg, about half way between the knee and ankle, passed entirely through the limb and through the sweat leather of the saddle, but did not injure the horse which Korff was riding.

Mr. Wood immediately went to Korff's home about two and one-half miles distant, to telephone to the city for physicians, and then returned to the scene of the accident with a buggy and conveyed the wounded man to his home.

The accident is most regrettable, and one in which the blame can be attached to no one. Mr. Korff was not in a direct line of range when struck, and it is thought that the bullet glanced off some object before it found lodgment in his leg. Had the ball gone straight to him it would have undoubtedly killed the horse he was riding in addition to wounding the rider, as the rifles used by Messrs. Sherrod and Wood are designed for long range shooting.

Attending physicians stated yesterday afternoon that although both bones of the leg were broken, they did not think that amputation would be necessary unless complications set up, and that the patient was doing well.

## TEXAS CREDIT SYSTEM

Under Present Plan Crop Diversification is Hampered.

Lewis H. Haney, professor of economics in the University of Texas, has been studying farm credit conditions in Texas, and his investigations have led him to the conclusion that the credit system in vogue in this state hampers diversification of crops to a marked degree. After pointing out that by hook or crook the interest paid by tenant farmers in Texas averages about 20 per cent, and at that rate progress and ownership are all but impossible. Professor Haney continues:

"Bad years submerge such tenants. Borrowers on crop mortgage in Texas generally receive but 50 per cent of the

maximum net return, and the average Texas farmer badly needs more farm animals and machinery.

"While more livestock on the farm is a great need, the one-crop system is opposed to animal husbandry. This is partly due to the lack of time to devote to feed crops and partly to the specialization by merchants and bankers of the credit system for the cotton industry. While cotton allows annual settlements, the livestock business requires accommodations of at least two years."

estimated value of the crop, so that their borrowing power even at high rates is very limited. Under such circumstances the tenant is forced into a condition of so great dependence upon the person who "carries" or "runs" him that he loses initiative and hopefulness. The merchant, in order to secure himself, generally specifies that cotton shall be the main crop, with perhaps a little corn for feed; and in this way strongly reinforces the tenant's inertia in the matter of diversification. The crop mortgage system, while largely an outgrowth of the tenant-cotton regime, now keeps that regime fastened upon the South; and the existing credit system is closely bound up with the single crop practice and soil exhaustion. In other ways, too, the credit system makes for poor farming. For one thing, the motive for good farming is taken away when everything the farmer owns or hopes to own is going to pay debts and capital-eating interest rates. Again, the tenant and small owner often have no means to get adequate land and capital to utilize their labor properly. There is tremendous waste all through the South due to a failure to utilize labor power to its fullest extent. A man and family require a certain minimum number of acres, mules and dollars' worth of machinery in order to make the

Says Opium is Replacing Liquor New York, Nov. 30.—Dr. Wright, the eminent sociologist, has created a sensation by showing the increasing quantities of opium that are being consumed in the United States. He declares that the annual requirement for legitimate medical and other purposes is 60,000 pounds, but that last year more than 480,000 pounds were brought into this country. "The use of cocaine, opium and other drugs, I regret to say, largely on the increase in the United States," said Dr. Wright, "Especially is this true of localities where the sale of liquor has been prohibited."

### Aged Citizen Dies

E. Campbell died in the Seton Infirmary at Austin Monday morning. The body was brought home for burial and funeral services were held at the residence Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, interment was in the Odd Fellows' cemetery. Father Ganon performed the ceremonial rites.

The name of Edward Campbell is known to almost every citizen of San Saba country. In fact the life of this man has been so closely associated with the early life of southwest and west Texas that he was known over the greater portion of this territory. Born in Ireland in 1839, he came with his parents to America and to Texas in the winter of 1851-2, the family first settling in Gaudaloupe county. In 1857 E. Campbell became one of the early settlers of Atascosa county, where he engaged in the cattle business until 1876. He then moved to San Saba, built a home in the county seat and located the Campbell ranch on the river about 25 miles above town. The town of Campbellton in Atascosa county was named in honor of this family. Mr. Campbell built the first brick house ever constructed in San Saba town and it is still the family residence.

Almost every enterprise for development and upbuilding of San Saba town and county has felt the beneficent influence of this man. A pioneer character, a man of frank expression, firm and definite convictions, a master of calculation and detail in business, tender and sympa-

thetic in nature; hospitable, charitable and generous, Edward Campbell was an exceptionally strong character and typified the sturdy souls that plucked Texas from the haunts of the wilderness and made it the imperial commonwealth it is today.

In early life he married Miss Mary Jane Tom, a member of one of the most prominent families in Southwest Texas. 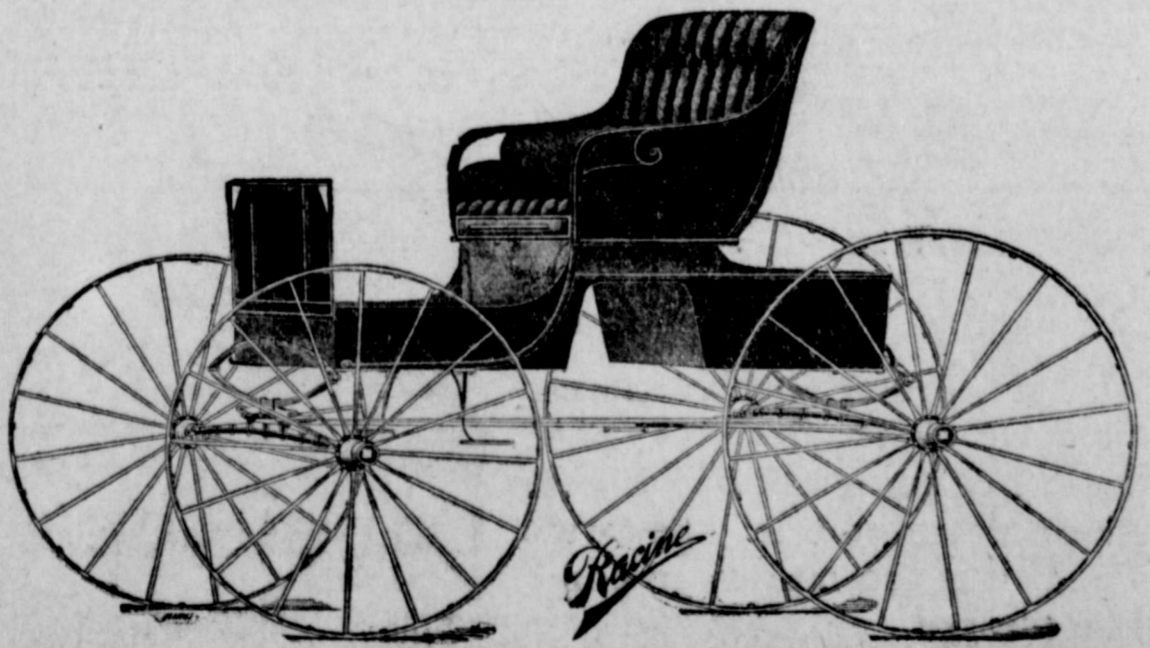

### Causes Much Damage to Cotton

Judging from the report of several local cotton buyers a very large per cent of the Coleman county farmers leave their cotton on the ground without ever turning it from the time it is ginned until they get ready to sell, possibly several months. This causes what is known as "country damage," which already has cost many as much as \$3.00, \$4.00 and \$5.00 per bale.

This can be prevented to a large extent by turning the cotton every few days or weeks, at the outside, or by placing poles under it to keep it off the ground. Of course, this is merely a make-shift by the side of housing it, but most of our farmers have not reached that stage in the game yet. Lower grades of cotton this year are at a big disadvantage and every effort should be made to keep the staple in as good condition as possible.

The Coleman Chamber of Commerce has taken it upon itself to see that the cotton stored in the yards here is turned at reasonable intervals in case those in charge fail to do so, believing its interest in the farmers and others owning this cotton justifies the expense. — Coleman Democrat-Voice.
