"It appears incredible that I should be able to grow 240 bush- D. Mann & Sons. els of corn on an acre of groud, when my neighbors grow only seven to twelve. Many of them I have taught to do the same as I. Others have not followed my advice and are going along in the sameold way.

"Some American farmers would think I was crazy if I told them they could raise 240 bushels of corn to the acre on their farms. They told me the same thing in Mexico, but since I've accomplished the seemingly impossible they simply say I've got wheels in my head all right, but that they appear to be running on the right track.

"Yet it can be done. They can take a piece of land on which they raised thirty bushels of corn last year and raise sixty on it next year, and it does not matter whether it is a dry year or not if they will break the top crust. This yield can be increased so that within five or six years, through proper preparation of the seed bed and the judicious selection of seed, they can raise as much corn or wheat as I can.

Washington, Jan. 25.-Latest quotations of cotton prices in Germany, received by cable from Ambassador Gerard at Berlin, indicate good middling was being offered and accepted for January delivery at about 18.4 cents a pound at Bremen. His message said private firms in Bremen report sales of good middlings from limited stock during the week of December 21 averaged about 20 cents a pound. The Bremen cotton exchange was reported closed and no information was forthcoming regarding prices or amounts of cotton on hand. Hamburg reported cotton selling at about 18 cents a pound.

Cotton was selling in New York Thursday at less than 8 Friday from the Pear Valley the piece claimed and the date cents a pound. Thus it is seen that speculators and shipping companies are reaping the benefits of the high prices paid in Europe for cotton.

Cotton Mill Makes Cotton Goods That Never Paid Freight

Texas has the honor of having the first complete cotton industry in the United States, that is a mill at which the raw cotton is taken from the farmers' wagon and turned out in finished sheets.

There are plenty of mills from Maine to Georgia that make white goods after we ship them cotton in bales, but there is only one mill in the world where they grow the cotton at one end of the plant, take it in, gin it, put it through the different processes of making, bleach it at the other end and ship the finished product-sheets and pilliw cases-direct to retailers.
